Temperature drops of 5 to 10 degrees were forecast in the new day's path.

Now fell in many states being forecast over Colorado caused a low from the Dakotas to Illinois and another low spot off the Carolina coast whitened the snow to New York.

In the south, more rain and snow heightened fears of recurrence of floods.

The snowstorms that covered the middle northwest last night continued today in Wisconsin, where a low of 22 below zero was reported at Superior. Another traffic tie-up was feared in event the wind rose.

By contrast, flood conditions were considered dangerous in southwest Alabama.

Miners employed in Central Illinois today began working on a six-day week basis in an effort to curb threats of an acute coal shortage.

Seventeen days of continued cold weather hereabouts has exhausted dealers' stocks and caused coal reserves of schools, hospitals, railroads and private homes to dwindle to the danger point.

Smaller towns within a 100-mile radius of Springfield were reported facing an acute shortage.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7, (AP)—The capital tried vainly to dig itself out of the worst snow storm since 1923 today, as the fall continued with no prospect of an end before night.

By mid-morning, the snow which began last midnight, had

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proprietorship on pensions to general relief. The law will not become operative if the petitions are filed, and the act will have to be voted on at the November general election.

Aid for the blind is provided in a companion measure, which has not been attacked with a referendum.

Most important of the new laws is that cancelling penalties and interest on delinquent taxes due in 1934 or prior years, provided current taxes are paid in full.

Abolition of the office of budget director and creation of the position of executive secretary to the governor is another measure now in effect.

The state land board may now lease the beds of navigable streams to dredgers of sand and gravel provided a royalty of 10 cents per cubic yard is paid. The money will go to the common school fund.

Deschutes county livestock district No. 1 is now a fact, and the running at large of livestock is prohibited.

Prohibition of wading and bathing in irrigation districts, a health measure to safeguard the only drinking water supplies of central Oregon cities, is another new law.

Establishment of a range livestock experiment station at Burns, control of bubonic plague in eastern Oregon, assessment and taxation of transient livestock, and dissolution of the Nestucca highway improvement district in Tillamook and Yam-

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stopped on the highway, but when they were able to show they were going to definite destinations, they were permitted to go on.

An interesting angle on the Los Angeles blockade was discovered at Dorris Thursday. An officer there said that the 140 policemen on border patrol duty had been spared from the regular L. A. force, and that was partly made possible by putting WPA workers at work on the school crossings where policemen had been stationed.

Thus it appeared the federal government was financing, or helping finance, the spectacular Los Angeles hobo campaign.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 6, (UP)—California's "hobo blockade"—unique move of Los Angeles city police to patrol state borders and shoo away invading vagrants—was watched with growing concern tonight by neighboring states of Oregon, Nevada and Arizona.

The campaign to "save California from the hobo," launched by Police Chief Jim Davis of Los Angeles, reportedly was throwing a backwash of hobo into bordering states which threatened to create critical situations in border areas.

Nevada Protests Officially

Governors of all three states threatened to "act" if the California "hobo ban" creates a congestion of unattached hoboes in their domains, and one—Governor Richard Kirmour of Nevada—lodged an official protest with California authorities.

Dispatches from Sacramento, Cal., said Governor Frank Merriam had received a telegram from the Nevada governor saying:

"For the protection of Nevada and her border counties, I would appreciate your acting in preventing action of Los Angeles police who are threatening to throw back into Nevada indigent residents of other states."

Arizona Orders Check

Governor B. B. Moeur of Arizona meanwhile ordered state highway patrolmen to report any instances of congestion of vagrants tossed back into that state at Blythe, Cal., and the California side of the Colorado river at Yuma, Ariz., concentration

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tion would be increased materially.

Dislocation Seen

"We are opposed to a program which has for its purpose dislocation of agriculture in this country," the republicans declared. "Apparently it is the purpose of the secretary to carry out the conservation program at the expense of the dairy and livestock industry, which now faces a surplus condition."

"We do not attempt here to criticize an expansion of the dairy and livestock industry in a normal and natural manner, but we do object to any governmental program which has for its purpose the payment of a subsidy to one group of farmers at the expense of another group engaged in an honest agricultural pursuit."

The report was signed by Representatives Andrews, Minn.; Kinzer, Pa.; Tobey, N. Hamp.; Marshall, Ohio; Goodwin, N. Y.; Hope, Kas.; and Gilchrist, Iowa.

Representative Holcomb (Iowa) has filed a separate minority report objecting to the failure of the measure to stipulate that land taken out of production not be used for dairy or other production for sale.

The majority's report, by Chairman Jones (D-Tex.) emphasized that the AAA substitute was constitutional.
