

# SNOW SPORTS PACK THRILLS AT MT. SHASTA

Plunging through the air with the greatest of ease can be done on a pair of skis, too, if you know how and have the nerve.

These are qualifications enough to keep most of us pretty well anchored to old Mother Earth, but there is a rapidly increasing number of young fellows (and some young women) who possess the ability and courage to take a ski jump almost as easily as stepping off the curb.

On Snowmen's Hill, on the slopes of mighty Mt. Shasta, there was a gathering of these experts at high flying last Sunday. They were there for the Mt. Shasta Snowmen's big sanctioned meet, and their performance drew a great crowd of spectators, including two scores or more from Klamath Falls, where, as is the case nearly everywhere this year, interest in winter sports is rapidly mounting.

Snowmen's Hill lies almost an even 100 miles from Klamath Falls, as was shown on the map. The route is a long one, but the major interest of the people as a theatre of sports activities. But the points of view of the spectators, the nearest to Shasta country to the west, will help build winter sports interest here in future years.

By the end of next summer, it is expected and hoped, the bit of rough surface between South Sixth street junction and Midland will be eliminated by completion of the Klamath river bridge and the Greensprings Junction-Midland section of the Weed road.

From Midland its a smooth boulevard, on through Dorris, (where they say the Los Angeles city limits begin) and down over the California section of the Weed cut-off. That's a good, travelable road today, but already contracts are let on jobs that will cut out much of the winding road and distance.

The southbound trip is a knock-out for scenery. You head for Mt. Shasta and you keep in that direction until you pass by on the slope at its northern base. It, of course, dominates the picture, but ever yonder may be seen the rugged, snow-covered tops of the Trinity Alps, and meadows, woodlands and low hills stretch out below as one speeds around the "corner" of Mt. Shasta.

Weed is always a good spot for coffee and a sandwich, and then off on the last, short lap to Snowmen's Hill. You spin around Black Butte, into Mt. Shasta City, and a few miles out swing

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## FOUR CANDIDATES OUT FOR OFFICE

MERRILL, Feb. 6.—Four prospective candidates for the Merrill postmaster ship are waiting word from Postmaster General Farley in Washington as to their rating following examinations taken in Klamath Falls early in January. Merrill residents making a bid as successor to Elmer S. Merritt, present incumbent, include Mrs. Inez Gliven, Mrs. Ora Burke, J. W. Scoggins and Orlando Hodges. Merritt's term expires April 1, following a term of 12 years of service.

Under a ruling passed by the postmaster general incumbents are ineligible to take examinations for office, but may be re-appointed.

Merritt has announced acceptance of a position with Mitchell, Lewis & Staver, implement dealers, with regional headquarters at Portland. Local headquarters are to be established in Klamath Falls, and Merritt will act as field representative for the entire Klamath county territory and the Tulake district.

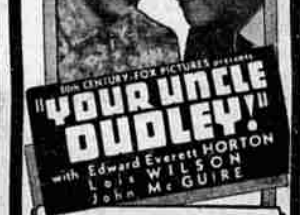
