

SECURITY SEEN IN OUTCOME OF LEAGUE'S WORK

That the future security of the young people of today lies in Geneva and not in Washington, D. C., is the firm conviction of L. C. Stewart, F. Bryant, as expressed Friday night during his lecture at Fremont school auditorium.

From notes taken on various phases of the question of national security it was evident that the audience was not in agreement as to a whole with Bryant's ideas. It was planned, quite evidently, with the idea in mind of setting the listeners thinking for themselves on the future possibilities of keeping the world from armed strife. Also it put the matter of applied sanctions squarely up to the audience with a bright light trained at all times on the past successes and future activities of the League of Nations.

Our national problems will never be solved by means of the Marxian theory, according to Bryant's opinion. And he, along with the rest of the world, considers the United States a key nation in international affairs.

Mrs. Harlan P. Rosworth, who has acted as chairman of the women's committee which brought Bryant to the city, presented Alfred Collier, who introduced the speaker of the evening.

"We in the United States can never combat radicalism, or communism by locking these ideas away, but we must approach them in an entirely different manner. Leadership must come from above in the form of health, and only by combined world effort will this leadership be established," said the speaker.

The committee which worked with Mrs. Rosworth consisted of Mrs. Jean Porter, Mrs. Young, and Mrs. Isabel Brinker.

The business and Professional Women's group; Miss Dorothy Schoup and Mrs. Howard Barnhill from the A. A. U. W. and League of Women Voters.

Garcia Defeats Canadian Champ

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., Feb. 8, (AP)—Cecilio Garcia, rugged little Los Angeles Filipino, pounded out a one-sided 10-round decision last night at the Legion stadium over Gordon Wallace, welterweight champion of Canada.

The 23-year-old Vancouver, B. C., boxer, lean and almost frail looking for his 147 pounds, was no match for the more experienced Garcia, and eked out a bare round—and that by a slim margin.

It was the third meeting of the two. They boxed a 10 round draw in the first engagement and Garcia, after flooring Wallace in the first stanza, went on to win the decision after 12 rounds in the second fight.

He lost little time last night repeating his victory, shaking the shifty dark haired Canadian in the first round with left jolts to the head.

Geniality Reigns as Lamson Trial Opens

SAN JOSE, Calif., Feb. 8, (UP)—Grim lines about his mouth relaxed for the first time since he was brought into court, David Lamson Saturday cheerfully faced opening of his fourth trial on charges of murdering his wife.

A jury of seven men and five women settled back to hear the much-repeated details of the state's case against the former Stanford University Press executive and "campus intellectual."

Bitter word battles which marked the course of Lamson's previous trial from their outset were absent from the opening day of the current hearing. Spectators and counsel alike shared an informal, almost genial attitude.

Oregon Pension Act Referred to Voters

SALEM, Feb. 8, (UP)—Petitions bearing an estimated 12,000 signatures to refer the old age pension law of the special legislative session to the voters at the November election were filed today with the secretary of state. Only 10,232 signatures were needed.

If the signatures are found to be in order, invoking the referendum automatically will make \$1,000,000 available to pay old age pensions on the present basis, attorneys assert. The special session of the legislature diverted the sum from pensions to general relief. The voters last Friday defeated the sales tax, proposed to pay pensions with federal "match" funds.

SUNSHINE PREVAILS IN KLAMATH REGION

Klamath Falls enjoyed bright sunshine and blue skies with only slightly sub-normal temperature Saturday, while the rest of the state, and virtually all parts of the country were suffering from extreme cold and blizzards. The local weather man predicted a continuation of the same brand of fair, cool weather, with brisk winds for Sunday.

The state weather bureau at Portland issued a forecast for generally cloudy weather Saturday night and Sunday, with occasional snow or rain in the northwest and snow in the north-east portions. Slowly rising temperatures are in prospect for the north, with fresh to strong southeast wind off coast, and gales off the northern coast.

The weekly outlook for western states for February 10 to 15 inclusive, is for generally fair weather, except for snows or rains in the Pacific northwest, and by the middle of the week in California in the plateau region. Temperatures will be slightly below normal, rising after the middle of the week, it was predicted.

A new daily air service between Odessa and Bucharest has been arranged by Soviet and Rumanian authorities.
