NEW YORK, Feb. 8, (AP)—Aircraft led a late mild rally in today's brief stock market session. Various mines, rubbers, oils and specialties also improved. Gains were mostly fractional at the steady close. Transfers approximated 1,200,000 shares.

The list stumbled over considerable profit taking in the first hour, but did not give much ground. Selective demand appeared near the finish.

Among the better acting shares at the finish were Douglas, United Aircraft, Sharon Steel, E. S. Steel, Auburn, Goodyear, Goodrich, Coca-Cola, United Stores "A," Cerro de Pasco, Standard Oil of California, Delaware & Hudson and American Telephone. An advance of some 22 points was recorded by Homestake Mining on a few transfers.

Wall street sentiment was still on the constructive side, but a number of commission house customers were said to have adjourned to the sidelines pending the meeting of the supreme court Monday and a possible decision on the TVA.

Further small gold shipments did not seem to excite the financial district unduly, and there was no noticeable revival of inflationary psychology.

Brokers with foreign connections reported London continued on the buying side of American securities, leaning principally toward the utilities and industrials. In former years Europe has gone in largely for the rails.

**Riots Fatal to Many
In Africa, Near East**
BYROUTH, Syria, Feb. 8, (UP)—Seven persons were killed today during nationalist student riots at Hama. Troops opened fire when the rioters refused to disperse. Considerable damage was done by the rioters, especially in the more exclusive sections of the city.

ZANZIBAR, Feb. 8, (UP)—A native policeman was killed and several European and Zanzibar government officials were wounded in rioting here Friday. An Arab mob demonstrating against application of a new law to prevent adulteration of export copra advanced on police with drawn swords and were cut down.
