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News of Klamath Churches

The First Presbyterian Church is located on the corner of North Sixth and Pine streets, and holds services at 11 in the morning and 7:30 in the evening. Sunday school at 10:30. The pastor, D.D., is the pastor, telephone at home, 713-J, and at the church, 429. Mrs. J. E. Clannahan directs the choir and Mrs. George W. McIntyre is the organist.

The organ prelude for the morning is "Larghetto" by Salome; the offertory is "Lore's" "Palm of Pillar," and the anthem, led by Miss Aagot Frigaard, is Handel's "Trust in the Lord." The pastor will speak on the topic, "To Whom Shall We Go?"

The organ prelude for the evening is "Largo" by Dvorak and the offertory is Schumann's "Traumerei." The special music number will be a duet by Miss Mary Thomas and Miss Maxine Elliott. The pastor will speak on the subject "As He Was." This will be an interesting discussion as to how we are to take Jesus into our lives and what He does when He is taken into them.

The Bible school opens at 9:45 with Prof. Everett C. Vanderpool in charge of the main school. Strangers are made welcome in the various adult classes and children will be assigned to classes in accordance with the grades in the public schools.

The Young People's society of Christian Endeavor meets at 6:30 as does the Intermediate society under Mrs. H. S. Cunningham. All young people will be made to feel at home. Some very interesting meetings have been held lately and attendance has been growing rapidly.

Beginning next Sunday evening we are starting a unique service in the nature of Bible exposition.
