

Ashland Scores Fourth Victory over Klamath

PELICANS DROP 25-15 CONTEST

Lithians Emerge Victors in Rough Game on Valley Court.

ASHLAND, Feb. 10 (Special)—Ashland high emerged from the fury of a rough basketball game with Klamath Falls Saturday night, winners over the Pelicans by a score of 25 to 15.

The victory was Ashland's fourth consecutive win of the year over the Klamath quintet and its second in two nights. It served to keep the Lithians' southern Oregon conference record clear.

Reginato Out
Roughness of play was partially responsible for the Klamath loss. The Pelicans were doing all right in the first half—held Ashland to an 11-11 tie at midgame.

Then, at the start of the third quarter, Reginato, who had led the scoring for both teams up to that time, went out of the game on fouls, and Klamath's pace slowed measurably.

By the end of the period the Lithians led, 19-13, and shortly after—a death blow to the last faint Pelican hopes—Giovanni, who rivalled Reginato as ace Klamath player, followed his teammate from the game by the personal foul route.

Not all blame for Klamath's defeat, however, could be laid to the ejection of Reginato and Giovanni. As in their game Friday night, the Pelicans seemed unable to capitalize on scoring chances. Although Musselman, Pelican center, regularly outjumped his opponent on the tip-off, no Klamath player, with the exception of Reginato, sank five in seven tries could connect consistently with the basket.

Mayberry was star of the Ashland team. He scored 10 points to Reginato's 11.

Close Games Indicate Real Fight for State Hoop Championship

Salem beat Corvallis, Corvallis topped Astoria, Astoria nosed out Salem.

That triad of games the past week showed just how closely matched are those three teams which are expected to be among the strongest at the state tournament at Willamette university next month.

Portlanders Get Rest
But besides those three—all get there—will be 13 other teams fighting for the coveted title.

Portland's two entrants, for example, may make much stronger bids than usual, for the Portland officials kept the state classic in mind when drafting the league schedule.

Instead of finishing their gruelling league grind the week before the tournament, the Portland teams will wind up 10 days prior to the state tournament. This will give time for needed rest—mental as well as physical. Often in the past Portland teams have played off first or second place ties Monday of tournament week.

Tillamook Is Strong
Lincoln high, bolstered by mid-year additions, handed the league leading Franklin high Giants their first defeat Friday. Franklin, which has won five and lost one, is crowded by Benson and Commerce with four wins and two losses each.

Salem's rangy five opened the week with a 26 to 24 revenge win over Corvallis, and ended by losing to Astoria, 40 to 35. Corvallis defeated St. Mary's 39 to 11 to stay undefeated in the district seven race, and beat Astoria 31 to 21. Eugene beat Cottage Grove 25 to 21 and Albany 31 to 29 to remain in second place in the district.

Another team to be reckoned with is Tillamook high which has won 18 to 24 games this season.

Palmberg of Oregon State Still Leads Scorers

SEATTLE, Feb. 10, (AP)—Although four teams saw action in three games during the weekend, the three top scorers in the northern division Pacific Coast conference hoop race still held their relative positions today, with Wally Palmberg of Oregon State, and Ed Lovrich and Ralph Bishop, both of Washington, leading the pack in that order.

Palmberg, hitting the hoop for 15 points against Oregon Saturday, boosted his total to 111, the first basketball in the league to go over the century mark, and jumped his average to 11.1 points per game. Continuance of his present torrid pace through the six contests left on the Oregon State schedule would give him a record-breaking new league record. Bobby Galer of Washington set the present scoring mark in 1934, averaging an even 11 points per game for a total of 176.

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W. S. C., IDAHO MEET LEADERS

Cougars, Vandals Ready for Attack on O. S. C., Washington.

SEATTLE, Feb. 10, (AP)—Washington State's third-place Cougars and Idaho's cellarite Vandals started priming their heaviest basketball artillery today, with the objectives in view of spreading war over Oregon State and Washington, respectively.

The Cougars moved into their third-place rating in the northern division Pacific coast conference hoop race last week-end, blazing through Idaho Friday and Saturday with scores of 46-33 and 37-23, while Oregon, in the third place spot last week, was taking a 49-23 shellacking at the hands of the Oregon State Beavers.

Cougars Eye Chances
Slated to meet the Beavers at Corvallis in a two-game series this week, the Cougars face the possibility of driving the second-place holders down a notch and taking the position themselves.

A double victory for Washington State will do the trick, a split series will leave the standings unchanged, and a pair of losses will shove them right back to where they were last week, in fourth place. The two teams broke even in two games earlier in the season.

While the Beavers and Cougars are arguing it out, Idaho, with only a single victory in eight starts thus far this season, will see what can be done about separating the University of Washington Huskies and the northern division. The Huskies, half-way through their 16-game schedule, with several scores but no stumbles so far, are shooting for an undefeated season, something no team in northern division hoop history has ever been able to accomplish.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 10, (UP)—Oregon State took a firmer grip on second place in the northern division by defeating the Washington Huskies 49-23, Saturday in a rough game which saw several Oregon players leave the game on fouls.

The Staters avenged an earlier 29-27 defeat at the hands of the Webfoet by taking the lead soon after the game started, and never relinquishing it.

State Attack Clicks
Clicking with precision not seen on the home floor this season, the Beavers increased the margin to 30-9 at the halftime.

The Staters played a slow, deliberate game in the second half, when the Webfoet came to life and intercepted many passes.

Courtney, Patterson and Howell were ejected in the last half with four personals, and Cackling and Folen of Oregon State were on the verge of being ejected with three each.

Lecy Palmberg, high scorer for the northern division, maintained his pace by making 15 points, at the same time holding Sam Lebowitz, high scoring Webfoet, to one point.

The Staters cashed in on free throws, converting 19 of 22 attempts. Oregon made good 5 of 12 attempts.

Finland Captures First Title of Olympic Games

GARMISCH-PARTENKIRCHEN, Germany, Feb. 10, (AP)—Finland snared its first title in the fourth day Olympic games today as the hockey contingent, definitely settling its heated eligibility row in Great Britain's favor, arranged a second round robin series for the eight survivors of the first eliminations.

The Finns won the 40 kilometer ski relay—four men running 10 kilometers each—in a hair raising finish with Norway second and Sweden third. The United States quartet never had a chance and finished eleventh in the field of 16.

The suspension meted out to Foster and Alex Archer, British hockey stars, definitely were withdrawn at the request of Canada but not without a heated verbal exchange between Avery Brundage, president of the United States Olympic committee and P. Vasser Hunter, British delegate.

When Brundage asked if "in view of Canada's sporting action," Great Britain intended to use the players, Hunter sharply declared that "whether England chooses to use her players, now is her business, nobody else's."

The draw for the second round robin series put America in the "loser" half—against Czechoslovakia and Sweden. Canada's rivals in the other group will be England, Germany and Hungary.

WHITTIER, Calif., Feb. 10, (AP)—Willamette university of Salem, Ore., signed a two-year home-and-home football agreement with Whittier college, Wallace Newman, director of athletics at Whittier, said today.

The first game will be played here next Armistice day.

The Whittier university Bears defeated San Jose State college the past two seasons in its only recent games with California schools.
