POLICE HEARING SET FOR TONIGHT

MANY TRANSIENTS LEAVE CALIFORNIA

TULELAKE, Feb. 10.—California's Border Legion of Los Angeles police on guard here against entry of transients report that already their efforts have been highly successful.

Thursday evening an outgoing freight train was examined by the police and some 45 or 50 transients were located and interviewed. All were on their way out of California. One of these, when questioned as to his destination replied: "I don't give a damn where I land, just so I get out of California. It's too tough down there for me."

His "down there" was found to be the southern part of the state where hundreds of transients are being halted every day, according to reports received.

The police here reported that on an incoming freight Thursday evening only one man was found. He had a few dollars in his pockets and expressed a willingness to rent a room and bed for the night and also a desire to get out of the state.

His statement was that he thought the Southern Pacific train on which he was riding was going into Utah rather than California. The man stated that he knew of the California action while still in the state of Washington, before crossing Oregon by rail. As high as 70 men have previously been on incoming trains through here.

Locally a feeling has been expressed that result of the closing of the border will cause a shortage of help during the farming season. Police on duty here state, however, that they will neither seek work or who will work when given the opportunity. In fact they have offered their cooperation in getting as many men at work as is possible.

It is believed, however, by many that the effect of patrolling will have the effect of weeding out undesirable labor and aid in the securing of men who actually desire jobs.

Mayor Mahoney's almost certain absence from the city contest this year gives rise to strong belief that Police Judge Clifton Richmond will run for mayor. In that event, it is almost a foregone conclusion that Richmond's assistant, Otto Langseth, will run for police judge.

DAMAGE TRIAL OPENS MONDAY

Trial of the case of Iva L. Boor against Dr. E. D. Lamb, in which \$15,000 is sought on the allegation that Dr. Lamb, in treating Mrs. Boor for an infected finger, severed the tendon of the finger, got underway in Circuit Judge Ashurst's court this morning.

Mrs. Boor was on the stand at the noon recess. Previously, attorneys had presented opening arguments disclosing sharp contradictions as to the alleged facts in the case.

While the plaintiff's attorney asserted that Dr. Lamb severed the tendon, the defense attorney declared that he never at any time severed the tendon. He asserted that some weeks after Mrs. Boor first visited Dr. Lamb, she returned for further treatment of the finger, and finding him away, visited the office of Dr. G. A. Massey. Dr. Massey, it was asserted, found the tendon had been attacked by infection.
