WHEAT FALLS OFF IN MONDAY'S TRADE

CHICAGO, Feb. 10. (AP)—Wheat tumbled back today to bottom quotations equaling those current before Argentina in December announced a new minimum for her crop.

Today's break revealed that elimination of Argentina from the export field has been insufficient to sustain Canadian prices. All futures at Winnipeg today reached a fresh bottom price record for the season.

Wheat closed unstable, 1-3/8 to 1-7/8 under Saturday's finish. May 37 to 37 1/8, corn 1-8 to 3/8 off, May 60 1-8 to 60 1/4, oats at 1-8 to 1-4 decline, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 2 cents.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, Feb. 10. (AP)—Steel stocks jumped into the lead in today's market, major issues in this group establishing new five-year tops, with gains of one to three or more points.

In other departments advances ranged from fractions to a point or so. The close was firm. Transfers approximated 2,550,000 shares.

The steel responded to an optimistic batch of news including official estimates of a sharp upturn in the current mill operating rate. The ticker tape got behind floor transactions in the final half hour.

The utilities were quite lively in the morning, but turned quiet when no TVA decision was forthcoming from the supreme court. The power equities, however, generally held fractional gains. Some of the aircrafts, rails and specialties pushed ahead.

Bonds were steady and cotton was a bit higher. Gains were lower. The dollar moved up in terms of the principal foreign exchanges.

Among conspicuous share gainers were U. S. Steel common and preferred, Bethlehem, Youngstown Sheet and Tube, Crucible, Ludlum, American Rolling Mill, Douglas, Boeing, American Telephone, Western Union, Union Pacific, Consolidated Gas, Case, General Electric, Westinghouse, Caterpillar Tractor and General Motors.
