

TRIBAL CHIEF SEIZES PAIR IN ETHIOPIA

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tried to see the chieftain to appeal against the order but was unable to do so because that official was ill in bed.

She wrote that all had been well treated, that when the soldiers had come to the house on Jan. 27, they had taken tea with the family and permitted the five, direct to remain overnight with his family before taking him to Chenchia.

Officials indicated that the missionaries would be allowed to remain at Shama.

Before the Halo-Ethiopian war started last October, Cornelius Van H. Egert, now United States consul-general to Ethiopia, and Sir Sydney Barton, British minister to Ethiopia, accepted a proposal by Ethiopian Foreign Minister Belantien Gesta Herony that any American citizens or British subjects in what was considered a dangerous area could be ordered to go elsewhere.

Government officials described the action of the Gamo chieftain in arresting the two missionaries as "over-consciousness" for the safety of the missionaries.

They deplored, however, what they said was the attitude of the American and the Canadian in declining to obey the local chieftain's orders to leave that district near the embattled southwestern front.

Both the United States legation and Ethiopian government officials said that the Gamo chieftain did not have the traditional heavy chains for prisoners.

Authorities said, however, that the Gamo chieftain had ordered a light dog chain attached to Mr. Street's legs.

No chain of any kind, they said, was imposed upon Trewin. The two men were jailed several days ago but were ordered released immediately after the Addis Ababa government learned of their plight.

DR. LAMB TAKES STAND TUESDAY

The defendant took the stand late Tuesday morning in the case of Iva Boor vs. Dr. Ernest D. Lamb. Mrs. Boor seeks \$15,000 damages, alleging that Dr. Lamb severed the tendon in her finger when treating an infection.

Prior to Dr. Lamb's testimony, Dr. G. A. Massey took the stand for the defense and stated that the tendon had not been severed by Dr. Lamb when Mrs. Boor came to him for treatment because of Dr. Lamb's absence from the city and after Dr. Lamb had treated the finger.

Dr. Massey declared that he found the tendon rotted away by infection, and that he laid it out on the hand, calling Mrs. Boor's attention to it.

Testimony of a medical nature dominated the trial. Aside from the plaintiff, Mrs. Boor, the only lay witness on the stand Monday was Dena Molatore. Miss Molatore was called first by plaintiff's attorney in an effort to establish a claim that some sort of alliance existed between Dr. Lamb and Dr. Massey, a defendant's witness. She then was called by the defense to refute the assertion.

Other witnesses who presented expert testimony for both sides and qualified treatment records offered in evidence were Dr. William L. Pointz for plaintiff and Drs. E. Dietsche and George Massey for defendant.

While the plaintiff's attorney asserted that Dr. Lamb severed the tendon, the defense attorney declared that he never at any time severed the tendon. He asserted that some weeks after Mrs. Boor first visited Dr. Lamb, she returned for further treatment of the finger, and finding him away, visited the office of Dr. G. A. Massey. Dr. Massey, it was asserted, found the tendon had been attacked by infection.

Conviction of violations of this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$100.00, or imprisonment in the city jail for not more than 60 days, or both fine and

imprisonment, according to the discretion of the police judge. The second ordinance passed by the council Monday evening authorizes an application from the city to the county court for an agreement whereby the Kennel club and Humane society shall enforce collection of all dog licenses in the city for the consideration of \$5 per cent of these license fees and penalties.

In the midst of debate, Senator Byrnes (D-SC) introduced an amendment authorizing \$500,000 for the subsidy program. The actual appropriation will be proposed as an amendment to the independent offices bill awaiting senate action after disposal of the farm bill.

McNary Files Bill
Coincidentally a new farm bill was introduced in the senate today by Republican Leader McNary providing for increased tariffs, payments to farmers based on the domestic allotment plan and use of customs receipts to encourage production of new products and find new markets. The measure was offered "by request," McNary said. George N. Peek, who resigned recently as the administration export trade adviser, had drafted it.

The McNary-Peek bill was similar to that introduced last week by Representative Hope (R-Kans.), who later discussed it with Governor Alf M. Landon, frequently mentioned for the republican presidential nomination. The domestic allotment plan proposes subsidy payments to farmers on that portion of their crops consumed domestically.

The McNary-Peek bill would authorize the tariff commission to investigate whenever farm imports increased abnormally. If they found such a situation existed, the president could declare a partial embargo, or levy "compensating fees" not exceeding 50 per cent of the value of the imported commodity.
