

Swiss Win Olympic Bobsled Championship

U. S. FOURTH IN SNOW RACE

Switzerland Takes First Two Places; England Defeats Canada.

GARMISCH-PARTENKIRCHEN, Feb. 12. (AP)—America's bobsledders were overmatched by the Swiss in the fourth winter Olympic today as Ivar Ballangrud won his second speed skating title for Norway and Arthur Larson captured the 18 kilometer cross country ski race.

Olympic Record Broken
Clinging to the advantage they had gained in the first two heats yesterday, the Swiss bobsleds piloted by Pierre Musy and Rito Capadrut, finished one-two in the four men bobsled championship. J. Hubert Stevens brought one American entry home in fourth place and Francis Tyler piloted the other into sixth position.

Musy flashed down the course in 1:19.60, fastest time of the third heat. His performance gave him a total elapsed time of 4:00.83 for three heats.

Ballangrud, who tied an Olympic record in winning the 500 meter speed skating test yesterday, shattered another by more than 20 seconds as he won the 5,000 meter championship in 8:19.6. Bob Peterson of Milwaukee and Eddie Schroeder of Chicago, only American entrants in the race finished 11th and 15th respectively.

England Beats Canada
The United States contingent likewise was distanced in the 18 kilometer cross country ski race in which Scandinavians made a clean sweep of the first six places. Larson was clocked in one hour 14 minutes, 38 seconds for the long grind and best Jörn Hagen of Norway by 55 seconds. Pekka Niemelä of Finland was third.

Meanwhile, Canada's hockey warriors, still smarting over their stunning 2-1 upset at England's hands last night, trounced Hungary, 15-0 before a capacity crowd in the stadium.

So great was the rush that attendants had to close the outside gates 20 minutes before the game started. A Red Cross stand was kept busy attending the numerous spectators who waited as a result of the crush.

Ken Farmer scored five goals and Hugh Farquharson four as the Canadians ran up the biggest score of the tournament.

Winner Gets Praise

Musy, a sports writer, was beset by autograph hunters. "Naturally I'm proud that with my colleagues, Capadrut and his team, we were able to capture the first two places," he said. "We hope thereby that the fame of our country will be advanced."

Among the first to congratulate the victors were Stevens and Tyler who shook hands cordially with Musy and Capadrut, and patted the other Swiss bobsledders on the back.

"We gave the best there was in us," Stevens said, "but in view of the performance of the Swiss teams, there's nothing to do except to congratulate them on a well merited triumph."

Cat Lends Aid In Walla Walla Prison Escape

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Feb. 12. (UP)—"Bugs," the prison cat, was revealed Tuesday as an accomplice in the Walla Walla state prison break of December 9, when eight men tunneled their way out.

Gerald Durning, 32, confessed leader of the break, told the how he trained Bugs to watch for the guard while the men dug.

"Bugs worked for us for three of the 21 months it took to dig through the floor of our cell and under the walls," said Durning. "We made friends with him and he got so he wouldn't go near anyone else. We taught him to stand at the corner of the corridor. If anyone came in sight Bugs would run back into the cell and we would stop working."

After three months a guard moved Bugs into another cell block.

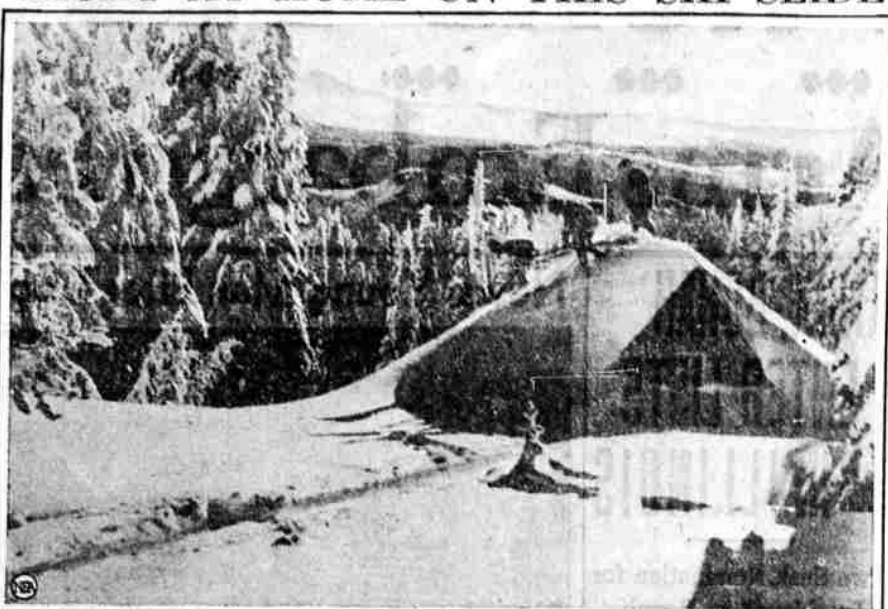
"But before we made our break I fixed up Bugs with a parole," said Durning. "A friend of mine was going out and he took Bugs with him out of stir. I couldn't let a pal down."

Famed Free Silver Supporter Passes

ROGERS, Ark., Feb. 12. (UP)—W. H. (Coin) Harvey, famed free silver advocate for half a century, died here at 9:40 Tuesday night of peritonitis. He was 84 years old.

Harvey, economic sage of another generation, and pioneer advocate of coinage of silver at the ration of 16-to-1—an issue that almost sent the late William Jennings Bryan to the White House—died at his home at Monte Ne, a short distance from here.

His wife and a few close friends were at his bedside.

COACHES RENEW HOOP RIVALRY

Frosh-Pelican Game Recalls State Tourney Battle.

The basketball rivalry between Dwight French, Klamath high school coach, and John Warren, head man for the University of Oregon freshmen, will be resumed here next Saturday night.

The Frosh from Eugene, traveling extensively through the state this year, will play the Pelicans at the high school gymnasium.

The game brought memories of Klamath's stand at the state championship tournament at Salem two years ago. Fighting their way to the finals, the Pelicans lost to the Fishermen of Astoria. In those days Astoria was coached by Warren.

A great collection of former intercollegiate stars has been assembled on this season's freshmen combination. It was one of the strongest ever built at Oregon and already has won two out of three games from the Oregon State teams.

The team will be favored to win from the Pelicans. Friday night Klamath will journey to Lakeview for the second game against the Honkers.

The Dorris A and B team will be here Friday to meet the Wildcats and the Klamath freshmen. A preliminary probably will be arranged for the Saturday night game with the university five, but full details have not yet been completed.

Blind Bowlers Lose New York Pin Tournament

NEW YORK, Feb. 12. (AP)—Five blind bowlers competed with their seeing brothers last night and lost.

The unique match was held in the basement of the community center of the New York guild for the Jewish blind, the blind youths using an iron rail to get their bearings before firing the big ball.

With a handicap of 100 pins, they lost 670 to 654, but if enthusiasm was the measure of success they would have won in a rout. It was the world series and the Rose Bowl game rolled into one for these unfortunates who have never seen a two-base hit or a halfback lug the ball.

They sat on the edge of the bench and intently listened to the crash of wood, trying to form a picture in their minds as to how the pins were falling.

Joe Major was listed as the star of the blind team but he didn't live up to expectations. He complained that "the nervous tension got me."

Joe claims the world record for totally blind bowlers; 233, rolled three years ago.

Herbert Holmes, another member of the team, claimed he once rolled 217. A plump fellow, Holmes took plenty of time in guaging his rolls. As he took his steps before releasing the ball his head pointed directly down at the alley.

As the blind bowlers were going down to defeat in the basement, however, their brothers were doing better with sighted competitors upstairs in the recreation room. The blind brier team won plus 10 to minus 170 while the blind chess players won two out of three matches.

Nicaraguan Mobs Riot Over Slaying

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Feb. 12. (UP)—A riotous mob paraded through Managua streets Tuesday, threatening the electric light plant and attempting to set fire to several buildings as an aftermath of the slaying of a striking chauffeur by a British banker.

The National bank closed its doors as a precaution against looting. Many business houses followed suit.

General Somoza, addressing the strikers assembled in Central park, appeased them somewhat when he announced that Porfirio Perez, district president, had resigned. Police Chief Domingo Melendez was also expected to submit his resignation.

Last Services Held For Charles Curtis

TOPEKA, Kan., Feb. 12. (UP)—Charles Curtis who left an Indian teepee to rise to the nation's second highest post was buried Tuesday with all the honors that his native state could offer.

Funeral services for the man who had been successively county attorney, congressman, senator and vice president were conducted in Representative hall in the capitol. Governor Alf M. Landon, other state officials and the Kansas supreme court headed a throng which filled every seat in the chamber.

Tests Disprove Bubonic Theory

PORTLAND, Feb. 12. (UP)—Fears that bubonic plague might be spread in southern Oregon and northern California were dispelled Tuesday when Dr. William Levin of the state board of health proved by laboratory tests that Jerry Lee Motchenbacher, 5, Dorris, Cal., died of pneumococcal laryngitis.

Specimens of the victim's spinal fluid were sent here for analysis because symptoms of his fatal illness were similar to those of bubonic plague.

Rich Farmer Found Murdered by Road

FERNIE, B. C., Feb. 12. (UP)—The frozen body of Michael Hudock, 35, wealthy farmer, his head battered and a jagged wound along his mouth and jaw, was found Tuesday near a road outside Fernie.

Police said he had been murdered. No motive could be determined immediately. He was last seen alive Sunday.

HOLLIS WINNER OF MAIN EVENT

Pettygrove Beaten in Straight Falls; Taylor Wins.

Winning two straight falls, Ken Hollis, the rowdy from Arkansas, defeated Duke Pettygrove, New Orleans, in Tuesday night's main event at the Klamath armory.

A misdirected Sonnenberg attack which hurled him to the floor in front of the ring-side chairs was the undoing of the southerner in his first Klamath Falls main event. Wobbly after returning to the ring, Pettygrove was hoisted aloft and twice slammed to the floor.

The decisive fall came in three minutes and seven seconds. Hollis won the opening fall in 17 minutes and 20 seconds with a Boston crab hold.

Like all three matches on the program, the main event was rough. Hollis, the leader in the foul tactics, cuffed, kicked and bit his opponent. Pettygrove's attempts at retaliation had little effect on the wild man from Arkansas.

In another straight fall match, Frank Taylor of Toledo scored his second victory over Tiger Taskoff of Bulgaria. Taylor won the first fall in the second round with a future-four scissors. The final fall came in the third round with a head scissors.

Wayne Long, a newcomer from Topeka, gained a victory over Max Glover, Detroit, in the opener. A Sonnenberg and a piledriver won for Long while Glover took his single fall with a leg split.

NEW YORK, Feb. 12. (AP)—Jack Doyle, Broadway's betting "price-maker," says the Detroit Tigers and the Chicago Cubs, pennant winners in 1935, will be the betting favorites to repeat in the coming campaign.

He rates the high-priced Boston Red Sox second in the American league, this calculation being based on the premises that the Boston team lacks the pitching power to beat out Mickey Cochrane and his boys. He expects the Yanks to add new strength to their team through purchases or trades, but says that in any event they will give Boston a run for second place.

Doyle says he won't make the odds on the respective teams until after training is underway in March, as he expects the personnel of several of the teams will be changed before that time.

Anton and Gastineau, giant freshmen, lead Willamette's attack.

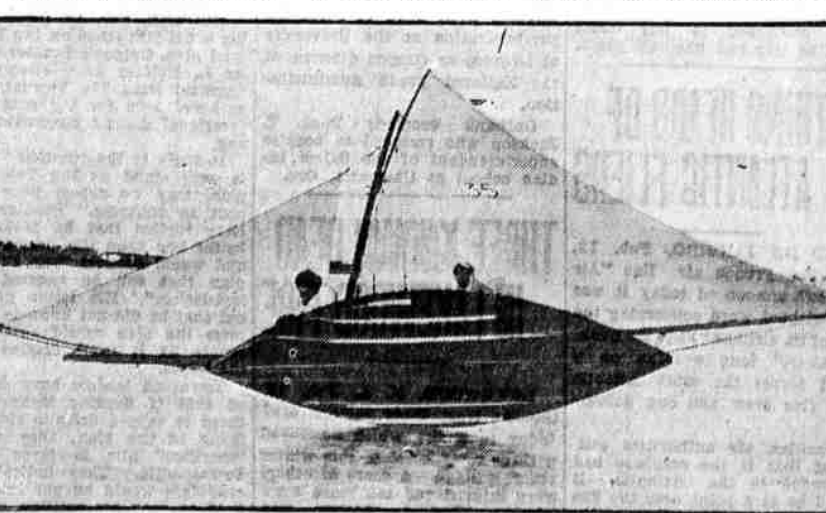
Linfield remained undefeated by eking out a close 27 to 25 win over College of Port Sound Loggers at McMinnville last night to make it two straight over the Loggers.
