Bearcat Grid Sched. Tough; 10 Games Set

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 13. (AP)—Willamette University's football schedule next fall will be the fullest and toughest in the school's history, Coach Roy S. "Spec" Keene announced today. The Bearcats, who have won their last 14 northwest conference games while annexing two championships, will play all the other conference members.

Four other games against stronger-than-conference schools round out the 19-game schedule which calls for a game a week from September 25 until Thanksgiving day. Oregon State College, Fresno State, University of Nevada and Whittier of Los Angeles are the non-conference opponents.

Coach Keene and Graduate Manager Les Sparks announced that negotiations have just been completed for bringing Linfield College and Willamette, co-champions of the conference in 1935, together in a game here October 23. The teams did not meet last season.

"It's the toughest schedule we've ever undertaken," said Coach Keene, "but my boys like to play football and I'm going to give them plenty of games." IRREGULAR WHEAT VALUES RECORDED

CHICAGO, Feb. 13. (AP)—Spreading operations in which May delivery was bought and the new crop futures, July and September, were sold, led to irregularities in wheat values late today.

Bullish speculators became somewhat discouraged because of failure of Liverpool and Winnipeg markets to follow up advances that took place yesterday when United States exchanges were closed. Winnipeg indicated export demand today was relatively slow.

Wheat closed unsettled, 3/4 cent lower to 3/4 higher than Tuesday's finish, May 98-98 1/4, corn 1/2-3/4 up, May 61-61 1/4, oats 1/4-1/2 advanced, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 2 cents.
