

### FUTURE FARMERS SPONSOR BANQUET

MAJIN, Ore.—Against a background of yellow and gold, Malin high school colors, parents of the members of the Malin chapter of Future Farmers of America were entertained at a banquet in the basement of the Presbyterian church Tuesday evening. Places were marked off for 42 at long tables covered with low bowls of marigolds.

Kenneth Holbrook, president of the Malin chapter, acted as toastmaster and during the dinner talks were made by a number of the guests, and by members of the chapter.

County Superintendent Fred Peterson spoke on the attitude of the school board toward vocational programs in the county schools and pledged continued support of agricultural school activities.

Harry Wilson, member of the Klamath county school board, talked on the value of Smith-Hughes work in an agricultural community and C. V. Henckle, assistant Klamath county agricultural agent, Klamath Falls, spoke on the relation of F. F. A. work to the work accomplished by the county agent's office.

William Holloway, director of school agriculture at Bonanza, and Walter Croft, president of the Bonanza chapter, gave brief talks pertaining to the subject.

A. E. Street, superintendent of Malin schools, gave a history of the Malin chapter which is one of the oldest in the state, having been organized 15 years ago.

Short talks included a discussion of shop contests by Laddie Tofoel; public speaking and parliamentary contests by Jack Ratliff; progress of work of the Malin chapter by Halbert Wilson; improvements made in the Malin shop, Emil Potusky; the F. F. A. building trip to Marsh creek, Clifton Jones; the F. F. A. convention at Corvallis last April to which he was a delegate, Tony Suty.

In closing Dr. R. M. Stevenson, pastor of the Malin Presbyterian church, spoke on the topic, "Agriculture As a Profession," stressing the thought that all means of making a livelihood, agriculture is the most important.

The banquet was prepared by members of the Helping Hand society cooperating with members of the home economics classes of the high school.

### Agreement Reached On Naval Limitation

LONDON, Feb. 13. (U.P.)—An agreement for limitation of battleships in sight, it was stated Wednesday after a meeting of British and American delegates rejuvenated the moribund naval conference.

The proposed agreement would limit Britain, United States, France and Italy to construction of two capital ships of 35,000 tons and 14-inch guns for the six-year duration of the prospective treaty.

### Method to Obtain More Land Found By Capitol Board

PORTLAND, Feb. 13. (U.P.)—Three members of the state capitol reconstruction commission, acting as individuals, will ask the Salem city council to execute two deeds in favor of the state, one conveying all of Willamson park at Salem as a site for the new capitol, the other conveying approximately 200 feet of the east end of the tract.

The council will be asked to place both deeds in escrow pending acceptance of one or the other by the legislature.

This indirect method of adding all or a part of Willamson park to the old capitol site received tacit approval of the capitol commission Wednesday. By W. Sawyer, Dr. E. C. Dalton and Dr. H. H. Olinger, members, will make the request as individuals because the state board of control last week indicated it would not go against the legislature's order and extend the capitol grounds beyond the old site—especially in view of the fact that the state would have to assume the approximate \$2500 annual cost of the upkeep of the park. The commission previously had decided that use of Willamson park was necessary.

If the legislature accepts the deed conveying only a portion of the park, the added land will be sufficient to enable the new capitol to be built facing down Summer street.
