New Figure-Silhouetting Designs Hailed in Paris

PARIS, Feb. 15.—Fancy dress costumes and bizarre designs are dead! Long live the new gracefully silhouetting creations that will make the body and make women look Diana-like!

This, in effect, is what the famous couturiers said when they flung open their carefully guarded doors and let us look at their glamorous spring collections.

There is a definite return to simplicity. Plastic Greek draperies are treated in the modern manner. Waistlines are lifted at the front, then allowed to dip backward. The result, of course, creates an illusion of greater length from waistline to hem, and emphasizes the bustline.

Fabrics and colors are the real stars in the fashion spotlight. Daytime dresses (a trifle shorter, by the way) are fitted to insure freedom of movement as well as to be flattering to the figure. They continue to be youthful. The military mode is out. Skirts are straight and slim. Boleros, tuxedo, Norfolk, box and sweater jackets are featured. These vary from extremely short to hip and three-quarters lengths.

Button fastenings arrested attention. In metal, mother-of-pearl, leather, porcelain, these take the shape of flowers, birds, fish, bureau handles, mandarin heads and rattles. Zippers, fastenings which, for late afternoon, are finished with pleats and tucks. Some skirts are cut high and have suspender tops. Sunray accordion pleating is widely used, sometimes for an entire dress or suit.

Blouses supply contrasting color or a note of femininity. Many are in wool, silk prints, mouseline and sheer, hand-blocked linen. They are to be tucked into the skirt and allowed to blouse over the top of it.

Evening gowns are divided into two categories. The first is fitted from waist to knees where fullness is introduced—generally at the back. The second is full and flowing from waistline to hem. Decorative effects are "grafted" rather than added.

The majority of evening skirts reveal ankles at the front. Decolletes show less tendency to nudity. Shoulders and arms often are veiled with sheer boleros or capes. Here the ensemble idea is carried out exaggeratedly. Capes, jackets, boleros match the dress fabric. Some evening coats are long and sweeping and fashioned from heavy luminous taffetas and satins, plain or printed.

Prints express great individuality. These include coat-of-arms, Paris landmarks, dog, bird, fish, insect, animal, vegetable, stamp, coin and fantastic flower motifs, ranging from tiny specks to giant designs. There are multi-colored confetti prints, small and large checks, plaids, zebra stripes, polka dots and chaila figurines.

Gossamer tulle and lace, as well as heavier nets, embroidered cellophane are featured in formal daytime models.

Schlaparelli launches the parachute silhouette with high-waisted girdle skirts and coats with wide hems that are high-bonomed and flaring from underarms.

Paper valentine edging in white and gold tulle appear on evening dresses which flare outward at the hem. Gold and silver mesh form yokes. Wide hair slides hold curls back.

Starched linen and love-letter stamp prints fashion double-duty beach frocks to be worn over romper swimming suits.

Hats include bowler shapes with tied-back veils, immensely high turned-up brims and flatter shapes, trimmed with fruit, feathers and flowers.

Molyneux shows evening gowns in modernized Grecian silhouette with pleating which emphasizes the bustline. He also features back fullness—peacock tail effect.

Heim shows suits for every hour of the day and night, and uses vivid woolen embroideries and braiding.

Marcel Rochas stresses finely pleated black chiffon skirts and frocks, with white or printed jackets. His color combinations are breath-taking. Occasionally as many as four shades are used in one ensemble.

Rosevienne launches wicker yellow and Alpine blue. Schlaparelli likes spice brown and Russian lilac. Molyneux includes much black and navy blue, trimmed with vivid red and green. Also wisteria violet and rich cyclamen shades. He shows long-handled parasols and suede bags manipulated like fabric.

Jodelle and Schlaparelli show ankle-high square-toed boots in suede, with square flat heels and gayly colored ties.
