EUGENE QUINT WINS EASILY

Invaders Establish 21 to 8 Advantage At End of First Half.

The University of Oregon freshmen, representing the picks of last season's interscholastic basketball stars, romped over the Klamath Pelicans, 48 to 21, at the high school gymnasium here Saturday night.

The Frosh led throughout the entire game, and after a few moments of play their superiority was definitely established. At the end of the first half the invaders, headed by Coach John Warren, one-time coach of the Astoria string of state champions, were in front, 21 to 8.

Fourth Olympic Winter Games Come To Close

GARMISCH-PARTENKIRCHEN, Germany, Feb. 17 (P)—The twin villages of Garmisch and Partenkirchen, mecca for a million winter sports enthusiasts during the past 10 days, were recovering today from what was probably the biggest day in their history at the conclusion of the fourth Olympic winter games.

Attracted by the closing events and the presence of Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler and other high Nazi officials, 130,000 people crowded into town yesterday to stand ankle deep in the mud caused by a sudden thaw, struggle with Nazi guards in a riotous scene at the ski stadium after they had seen Birger Ruud add to Norway's numerous triumphs by winning the ski jump and finally to see the colorful closing ceremony at twilight.

The ski stadium was the scene of wildest excitement when members of the Nazi labor service corps blocked the exits for two hours until Hitler and his official party departed. The milling crowd, struggling to leave or to catch a glimpse of the leaders who were shoving and screaming and were held firmly but roughly in check by the guards. Two persons were injured. Several fainted, and many were bruised and scratched in the jam.

Indian Stockmen Called to Attend Special Meeting

Two meetings of Indian stockmen on the Klamath reservation have been called for the purpose of discussing the new grazing regulations recently issued by the secretary of the interior. It was announced Saturday at Agency headquarters.

The first meeting will be held at 1:00 p. m. February 20 at the chapel at Klamath Agency. The second is scheduled for the same hour the following day at the church at Beatty.

Calling of the two meetings follows directly a special assembly of the Klamath council of the Klamath council attended by Frank B. Leake, range supervisor, who was questioned by the committee members on the provisions of the new grazing regulation, and addressed by Wade Crawford, reservation superintendent, who spoke regarding reservation range problems.

Most question was whether reservation grazing lands should be rented to the highest bidder regardless of race, thus throwing the Indian stockman in direct competition with the white, or whether free grazing areas should be retained for the use of tribal members.

Following discussion, the committee approved a motion deferring action on the new regulations until after the 1936 season and adopted a resolution rescinding earlier action so that the committee might be at liberty to make further study of the problem and reach a new decision of a more just nature.

Western Oregon Hoop Teams Dominate Eastern Fives

Basketball in western Oregon, where high school players have more opportunity to pick up the fine points from college stars, still ranks above eastern Oregon ball. Salem's 42 to 26 win over Hood River the past week indicated.

Hood River and Salem rank about tops in their sections. Salem also defeated Eugene 36 to 27 and gave the Oregon State hoops a good game before losing 40 to 31.

Corvallis Stock Rises

The only eastern Oregon team which ever completely overcame the isolation and handicap of smaller courts was Pendleton's 1931 Giants who stampeded to the state championship. Many other eastern Oregon teams have made fine showings, but fell a bit short of the top.

Corvallis high's stock skyrocketed the past week with a 40 to 16 win over University High, a 33 to 26 win over Tillamook, and a 33 to 24 victory over Astoria on the fishermen's own floor.

Franklin Team Strong

Franklin high, Portland leader, gave up-state teams something to think about by scoring an even 100 points in two games. Coach Chappie King's boys beat Roosevelt 49 to 31, and trimmed Grant 51 to 27 for their seventh win in eight league starts.

Benson won both its games to remain in second place, while the sensational Jefferson team, state finalist last year, turned in its fifth consecutive win after losing its first three games. Jefferson and Commerce are tied for third place, only two games behind Franklin.

Grants Pass disturbed the serene southern Oregon league by handing Ashland its first defeat, 24 to 16. Then Medford's fast-breaking team topped Grants Pass 30 to 22. Ashland took its first two games from Medford some time ago, but has two more coming up. The league winner goes to the state tournament without a district playoff.

The giant killers of Bellfountain high, which has but 23 boys, won their 15th consecutive game without defeat to take the Benton county B title and gain entrance in the sub-district B tournament. Oakridge, last year's state tournament sensation, looms as Bellfountain's biggest district tournament hurdle.

St. Helen's high, one of the most consistent winners in the state, will be taken more seriously following a 34 to 31 win over Longview.

Pelicans Still Favored

Roseburg's rejuvenated team beat Myrtle Point 23 to 23. North Powder blasted Baker high 25 to 16 to stamp itself as one of the strongest small schools of eastern Oregon.

La Grande dropped a 26 to 25 decision to The Dalles, which defeated Pendleton 42 to 33. Klamath Falls remained the favorite to represent Central Oregon at the state tournament, but Bend was impressive in a 37 to 17 win over Redmond.

Rules Committee Recommend Forgetting Slow Whistle

PALM SPRINGS, Calif., Feb. 17 (P)—Gridiron fans of the nation will see just about the same brand of college football next fall that they followed in last year's campaign.

Guiding minds of the sport, better identified as the national collegiate football rules committee, met here for three days, talked a lot and emerged with small and a few changes in the rule book.

Slow Whistle Forgotten

For one thing they adopted "a recommendation" which is practically a rule by another name, advising referees to forget the "slow whistle" admonition rendered last year.

Regarded as a boon to so-called modern methods in football particularly in encouraging the lightning-like lateral pass, "the slow whistle" enabled a ball carrier to tear away, kick or better still try a lateral pass, after his progress down the field had been temporarily stopped. Elimination of the tardy whistle means a play will be called dead a fraction of a second sooner than before.

Robert Zuppke of Illinois, a non-member of the committee but a consultant advisor, was among the coaches calling for abolition of the quick blow. Ray Morrison of Vanderbilt, noted as a coach who developed the tricky laterals to a high pitch, declared action on the committee would not affect his coaching system. "I'll teach the same kind of football next fall that I did last year," he said.

HUSKIES FAR OUT IN FRONT

Only Six Games Separate Washington From Unbeaten Season.

Only six games remained between the University of Washington and an undefeated season in the northern division Pacific coast conference hoop race today.

A pair of victories over the trailing Idaho Vandals at Seattle Friday and Saturday night ran the Huskies' victory string to 10 and put them so far out in front of the rest of the league that some sideliners were beginning to wonder if the other four teams in the circuit were in the same parade. The Huskies have now whopped everybody else in the conference at least twice, and Oregon four times, and have two-game series with Idaho, Washington State and Oregon State in that order left on the schedule. Oregon State still has a mathematical chance for the title, but the Huskies will have to stumble four times in their remaining half dozen games before the "miracle" can develop.

Vandals Sink Deeper

The Vandals went down 50-30 and 40-29 last week-end, sinking almost as far into the cellar as the Huskies are ahead, the two losses marking their ninth and tenth defeats. Although losing, Idaho put up a pair of stiff battles, dropping the opener when Washington cut loose with a hard second-half attack, and forcing the league-leaders to turn on the heat in the closing minutes of the second to chalk up the win.

Oregon State held onto second place in the league ratings, showing the Washington State Cougars completely out of the title picture with a pair of wins at Corvallis, 33-26 and 41-26. The double loss dropped the Cougars to fourth place, a half game beneath the Oregon Webfoots.

Cougars Meet Oregon

Washington State, with hopes of getting back their third-place spot, will fight it out with Oregon at Eugene tonight and tomorrow, Washington and Idaho will resume their argument at Moscow Friday and Saturday, and the Beavers and Webfoots will meet at Eugene in a one-night stand Saturday.

Whitman's Missionaries, undefeated in six starts, seemed to have things fairly well in hand in the northwest conference basketball championship they acquired last season.

The Missionaries added a pair to their string last week-end, defeating the Willamette Beavers at Walla Walla Friday 44-37, and repeating the process the following evening, 32-28. The two victories marked the eleventh and twelfth consecutive conference wins for the Missionaries, having gone through their six league games of the 1935 season without a stumble.

Pacific and Albany argued the cellar situation out in a home-and-home series. Taking a leaf from the book of their nationally prominent football brethren, the Albanyites acquired sole rights to the bottom rung of the standings ladder, dropping a close one, 24-22, Friday night, and going down 31-19 Saturday. The double victory gave Pacific its first two marks in the "win" column in seven games.

Willamette's two losses dropped the Beavers into a third-place tie with College of Puget Sound with three wins and a like number of setbacks, well below Whitman's unblemished record and Linfield's three victories and no defeats.

Linfield will meet Albany tonight and Pacific tomorrow night. C. P. S. will entertain the league-leaders Friday and Saturday, and a home-and-home Willamette-Pacific series is also scheduled for Friday and Saturday.

Thomas Shibe, Baseball Head, Dies In East

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 17 (P)—Thomas S. Shibe, president of the Philadelphia Athletics and one of the last of the group of men who put the American league into major league baseball in 1901, is dead at the age of 70.

He died last night of a heart ailment aggravated by a heavy cold which he contracted three weeks ago, just as he began his annual winter vacation in Florida. He was brought home immediately and placed in a hospital, where his condition grew steadily worse.

The question of who will replace the veteran magnate as head of the baseball club was a matter of conjecture.

In some quarters it was thought his brother, John D. Shibe, would take the helm. Others, however, believed that Connie Mack, manager of the Athletics, might become the new president. Although the ownership of the club stock has been kept a secret, it was reliably reported Mack owns controlling interest.

Shibe's interest in baseball also had another angle, that of manufacturing baseballs and baseball equipment. As a partner in the firm of A. J. Reach, Wright and Ditson, Inc., he was a leading factor in the manufacture of baseballs, and that part of the Reach plant was under his supervision.

Shibe is survived by his widow. They had no children.

Dictionary: Down In Pastern— Showing an angle usually forward or outward instead of somewhat straight to the ground as in the erect pastern.

Foreface—That part of the head in front of the eyes. Synonymous with muzzle.

Important—Dog licenses may be paid at the County Clerk's office in the courthouse. One dollar and a half (\$1.50) for males and two and a half (\$2.50) for females. If this is not paid before the first of March there is a penalty of \$1 added to the license fee.

All dog licenses are for the protection of the animal. A lost dog may be identified by his license number and a phone call to the humane society or the county clerk's office will give you the name and address of the owner.

News—The site for the refuge has been selected, a humane officer hired, trees planted for shade, and matters are moving along as fast as can be expected. "By the first of March we hope to be in a position to take care of all unlicensed dogs."
