

# Oregon Webfoots Score Victory over W.S.C.

## Klamath Again Eyes Tournament

Pelicans Virtually Assured Of Fifth Trip To Salem. Regular Schedule Ends This Week. Trouble Dogs Dr. Spears.

It's just about tournament time in Oregon interscholastic basketball and there is little opposition left in this district to prevent the Klamath Falls Pelicans from seeking a state championship at Salem for the fifth season in succession.

Despite a mediocre season, the young Pelican combination has not been defeated in District 3. That's what counts. The team could lose every contest on the regular schedule and then come through to victory in the district tournament to assure itself of a position in the Salem title race.

Only two games remain on the schedule. Friday night the team plays at Grants Pass. On Saturday night it meets the Tigers at Medford.

These games will be Klamath's last opportunity to win a Southern Oregon conference contest.

In this district, however, the Pelicans already have beaten major opposition—Redmond and Bend. Unless these schools have improved enormously and unless some darkhorse contender has developed, the Pelicans should get a trip to Salem.

There is little chance for the team to win the state title. The records of other quintets reveal them as much stronger than Klamath. However, there have been upsets at Salem before, and there may be another one this year.

Bonanza and Chilquiquin appear the strongest teams in the B division. Although Tulake is leading the Klamath-Siskiyou league, it is a California team and will not be reckoned with in Oregon circles. The county tournament will be staged on February 23 and 29 and the top teams will enter their own tournament at Ashland to determine a district representative to go to Salem.

Dr. C. W. Spears is out of a job. It is the first time in his coaching career that the doctor has been ousted. He has coached many teams at many schools in various sections of the country, but each time the change has been made voluntarily.

Because of the circumstances attending the athletic upheaval at the University of Wisconsin, it is possible Spears will have difficulty in landing another college post.

He is a great coach and has produced some great teams. But there is no question that he is a hard man to get along with. That was his chief source of trouble in Minnesota, at Oregon and then at Wisconsin.

Spears has always been bent on winning football games for personal glorification. His own reputation and standing always came first. His consuming personal ambition, probably more than anything else, has put him consistently in hot water.

## Albany College Will Sign New Football Coach

ALBANY, Ore., Feb. 18, (UP)—President T. W. Bibb of Albany College said Monday that the contract of Coach Mack, in whose term as head football coach Albany College won a national "championship" of 28 straight defeats, would not be renewed when it expires in June.

Mack became head coach of football in January, 1934. Albany was well on its way toward the "defeatist" title and only broke the jinx midway of last season.

Students gave Mack a two-thirds vote of confidence when efforts to oust him were made last spring. Student opinion favored his assistant, Curly Miller, of Howard Maple, assistant coach at Willamette, to succeed Mack.

## HOBSON'S MEN WIN, 42 TO 35

Giants Gain Stronger Hold on Third Place in Conference.

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 18, (AP)—Oregon University stood firmly entrenched in third place of Pacific coast conference northern division basketball today.

The Webfoots defeated Washington State 42 to 35 last night for their fourth conference victory in nine starts. The defeat was the Cougars' seventh.

Second Half Fast

The teams will meet here again tonight.

The first half of last night's encounter was a cautious and precise affair but the second half showed a variety of speed and percentage basketball. The Webfoots led at half-time 20 to 13, largely through the efforts of McLean guard, who tossed in four field goals.

In the final frame, the Webfoots streaked to a 11-point lead, 37 to 26, saw the Cougars hit the hoop for eight points in quick succession and then spurred again to a substantial margin and staved off a Cougar charge.

Ken Purdy, Oregon guard, took scoring honors with 12 points. Nelson, capped 9 for the Cougars.

## San Francisco Seals Ready to Defend Coast Title

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 18, (AP)—Frank "Lefty" O'Doul steeled the long-shot San Francisco Seals to the 1936 Pacific Coast League pennant in his first season as a manager, but the former big league star is not so optimistic over the coming campaign.

The "man in the green suit" reminds one and all that Joe Di Maggio will be missing from the right field outpost this year. Di Maggio's graduation to the Yankees will be a severe blow to the Seals.

The Italian youth not only was a league leader in hitting last season, but his all-around play in the field was largely responsible for the championship.

Same Pitching Staff  
The pitching staff will be bolstered by three seasoned hurlers, Sam Gibson, Win Ballou and Phil Collins, obtained from the St. Louis Cardinals.

Collins, a right-hander, is expected to be a consistent winner in the Coast League. His delivery is tantalizing. His baseball nickname, "Fidgety Phil," given him years ago when he joined the Philadelphia Nationals, is descriptive of his action on the mound.

O'Doul hopes Ken Sheehan, tiny southpaw, will be ready for regular duty this season after steady improvement the last two years. Bob Cole, youngster, has pitched sensational ball in the local winter league. Another young fellow, Ed Stutz, is reported dissatisfied with his contract, and has been given permission to make a deal for himself.

Catching duties will fall mainly on the shoulders of veteran Larry Woodall, with Bill Salkeld and Vince Monzo, a pair of youngsters, taking up the slack. Salkeld was purchased from the Sacramento club. Woodall is a clever receiver, and had a good year last season, while both Salkeld and Monzo are bright prospects.

The infield should show improvement over last year's corps. Les Powers, Art Garibaldi and Lenny Backer, who formed three-quarters of the 1935 inner works, will not be back. In their places will be Harley Ross, former Cleveland first-sacker; Brooks Holder, up-and-coming youngster, and Steve Barath, whom O'Doul thinks is a prospective major leaguer.

Boss comes from New Orleans, is a seasoned first baseman, with a great fielding record and a 300 minor league hitting average. Holder will fill in at second. With the steady influence of Hal Rhyne at shortstop, Holder is expected to live up to Class AA requirements from the start. Barath, replacing Backer at third, had considerable experience last season. Utility duties will fall to Frank Gira, who held the same position last year.

With Di Maggio breaking into the big show, the outfield will be manned by Ted Norbert at left, Joe Marty at center and John Thomas and John Graves fighting for the right field berth. Thomas was farmed to Des Moines last season, while Graves had a fine season with Muskogee.

Colorful George Wilson Favored to Capture Main Event.

George "Wildcat" Wilson, who has carried to the wrestling ring the same tactics that made him nationally famous as a fullback at the University of Washington, comes back to Klamath Falls tonight to tackle Ken Hollis, Arkansas, in the armory main event.

A top-notch hero when he appeared here months ago, Wilson has brought even more dash and color to his manner of wrestling. The former all-American football ace has traveled through Europe, acquiring a vast amount of experience and adding a long list of new holds to his attack.

Wilson, fast and powerful, is rated a favorite over Hollis. While Hollis has been successful in the majority of his matches here, he has displayed no great talent as a wrestler. He has relied upon roughness rather than science for his victories.

Duke Pettigrove of New Orleans, beaten by Hollis a week ago, will attempt a comeback against Ted Christy of Los Angeles. Pettigrove, however, was on the short end of the predilections. The southern California grappler, under suspension in the neighboring state because of roughness, has a wide reputation as one of the most effective heavyweights on the coast.

Back from southern California, Frankie Peck will open the card in a hour match against Wayne Long of Topeka. Both men are clean and fast and their match should equal or better the expected action in the windup and main event.
