Ransom Quiz Given

"I would have dropped the baby and run like hell in my automobile," Hauptmann replied.

"But there could have been no accident if you went out the front door?" asked Leibowitz.

"I guess that's right," Hauptmann acknowledged.

"What would you have done had you got the baby away?" the lawyer asked.

"I would have taken him to a nearby farmhouse," Hauptmann said.

The source said the lawyer then questioned him regarding the ransom, and the conversation was as follows:

"How would you have collected the ransom, had you left the dead baby behind you?" Leibowitz inquired.

"Would you have taken the sleeping suit to prove you were the kidnaper?" Leibowitz asked.

"I don't know," Hauptmann replied.

"I guess that's what the kidnaper would have done."

Leibowitz then went into Hauptmann's alibi, including the story of his having received \$15,000 of the ransom money from Fisch.

"If you were Fisch, what would you have done with the ransom money?" the source quoted Leibowitz.

"What would you do if you knew that the police all over the world were looking for this money and that if you were caught in this city or on the high seas or in Germany you would have been brought back and held for the Lindbergh murder?"

Spelling in Notes Discussed

"I guess I would leave it in a safety deposit box," Hauptmann was quoted.

"You know, Fisch had one."

"You would not leave the money with a casual friend? Not even if you felt you might die in Germany?"

"I guess I wouldn't do that. People who are sick like Fisch are never very sure that they are going to die."

Leibowitz spent about an hour discussing the spelling in the ransom notes, the source said.

He did not, however, touch at all on the handwriting and he made no specific request for Hauptmann to change any part of his original story.

"He did, however, deal at length with the spelling 'light' and before he finished Hauptmann was very confused and stammering," the source continued.

Hauptmann did not tell the lawyer that he was charging any part of his story and when Leibowitz left, the prisoner begged him to come back.

Liggett's Widow Fears for Life

Cann Weeps Joyfully

"Minnesota bureau of criminal apprehension and every other available agency will concentrate on an effort to detect and apprehend Walter Liggett's slayers," the governor asserted.

Blumenfeld's relief and joy at hearing the verdict was too great to suppress. When District Judge Arthur W. Solover had read only to the words "not guilty," Cann started to rise from his chair. He was pulled back by his counsel, Thomas W. McMeekin. Cann and McMeekin wept as the judge read the verdict.

The kid embraced his wife and kissed her. Then he broke through a circle of friends and rushed to the jury box to kiss the hands of the four women jurors and shake hands with the men.

Almost at once he was swept by his friends out of the court room, and a few minutes later was on the streets again, free for the first time since the night of the slaying.

Mrs. Liggett, informed of the verdict, prepared a statement for interviewers, in which she said, "The Minneapolis police force has done nothing." She criticized the testimony of four policemen called by the defense. After she testified as an eye-witness that she named Blumenfeld as the slayer the night her husband died, they testified she actually said "Either Governor Olson's mob or kid Cann got my husband."

Firemen succeeded today in quenching an underground blaze that had raged nearly 24 hours, and utility company laborers plugged temporarily the five mains which had fed the flames.

But the menace of the gas remained, and 4,000 persons were kept away from work in the danger zone.

Chamber Protests Reclamation Limit

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the Klamath project amended to provide that beneficial use, and not less than three acre feet per year, shall be regarded as the duty of water in the project.

The Klamath Irrigation district resolution, it is understood, endorsed a "beneficial use" policy, without fixing any definite amount.

At the chamber meeting Wednesday it was pointed out that when two acre feet was allotted to lands, they were used for grain and pasture purposes, and that agricultural development in this region had been along lines that required use of greater amounts of water.

Probably an amicable settlement will be worked out, it was learned after the meeting.

YOUTH CHARGED WITH BURGLARY—Gilbert Mason, 24, was arrested by city police officers shortly after midnight Tuesday, and charged with breaking in the No-Delay Cleaners' plant on South Sixth street.

A radio call was received at headquarters reporting that someone had broken into the cleaning establishment, and the search was rushed to the scene. A search of the premises, according to officers' reports, revealed Mason hiding behind a line of clothes in the place.

The report accused him of chopping a panel out of the rear door with a double bladed ax found at a woodpile behind the building.

A South Sixth street restaurant adjacent to the No-Delay Cleaners was entered and robbed Tuesday night.

Entrance to the restaurant was gained by removing a glass from a side door, reaching through and unlocking it. The door was re-locked and the glass put in place by the thief or thieves following the robbery, according to police reports.

Included in the merchandise and provisions stolen from the lunchroom were five cartons of cigarettes, several pounds of bacon, dried beef, link sausage, beef steaks and a quantity of bread and eggs.

Mason was taken to the county jail, where he is being held pending filing of burglary charges.

HOUSE PROBE OF TOWNSEND PLAN ORDERED

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Townsend as a medical practitioner, but contended:

"If the Townsend plan should become law, no one may hope to escape its throttle-hold."

"You people who are growling under taxes that you think are heavy, stop and listen to this," said Bell. "You haven't seen anything yet."

No Reflections Cast—The Missouriian referred to the two per cent transaction tax by which the Townsends propose to raise funds to pay a pension of \$200 a month to all persons 60 or over.

"There are thousands of those who have sincerely and earnestly worked for and advocated real and constructive programs of human betterment," said Bell.

"We also find our charlatans and quacks who are willing to offer anything, no matter how impossible, or fantastic, or extravagant, so long as it catches the fancy of the public and so long as it means a personal profit and enrichment of themselves," Bell added.

The Missouriian said the late years of depression with widespread human want and suffering and unemployment "have been a fertile field in which these quacks and charlatans, these false prophets of social reform have promoted their schemes and rackets, representing vast sums in unholy profits at the expense of tens of thousands of good and faithful, but deluded followers."

"I want to say I cast no reflection whatsoever on Dr. Townsend as a medical doctor," Bell told the house. "I assume that when he was in pursuit of his duties as a doctor of physical ills of humanity he was a good doctor, but as a doctor of the ills which afflict our social structure he is a charlatan and a quack."

Bell added the Townsends propose to levy a transaction tax to raise the \$24,000,000 annually which he said would be necessary to pay the pensions on the basis that about 10,000,000 people would be eligible.

Bell estimated a two per cent transaction tax would mean at least \$800 in taxes from each family in the United States annually.

FEDERAL BUILDING CHANGES ASKED—The Klamath county chamber of commerce has filed a written request with Admiral C. J. Peoples, director of the procurement division of the treasury department, for enlargement of facilities at the Klamath Falls federal building.

Senator Charles L. McNary has been in touch with the chamber and is helping at the Washington end of this effort.

In letters to Peoples, Secretary Reynolds of the chamber of commerce stated that the census bureau and department of justice had sought space in the federal building and found none available, that there is a demand for space there for army and navy recruiting services, that the forest service quarters there were cut, and that the national park service could use more space.

The plans for the present federal building apparently were prepared with the idea that the structure might later be enlarged. Rooms could be added on the roofs of the lower wings of the present structure, at only moderate expense.
