Ten Thousand See Match in South

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 20. (P)—Vincent Lopez, Mexican claimant to the heavyweight wrestling title, defeated George (The Great) Calza of Italy last night before 10,400 fans at the Olympic auditorium.

Lopez took the match in straight falls, winning the first with elbow smashes to the mid-section and jaw in 8 minutes 30 seconds, and the second by the same tactics in 31 seconds.

Calza applied successive headlocks before the first fall, but Lopez squirmed loose. Lopez weighed 210, Calza 230.

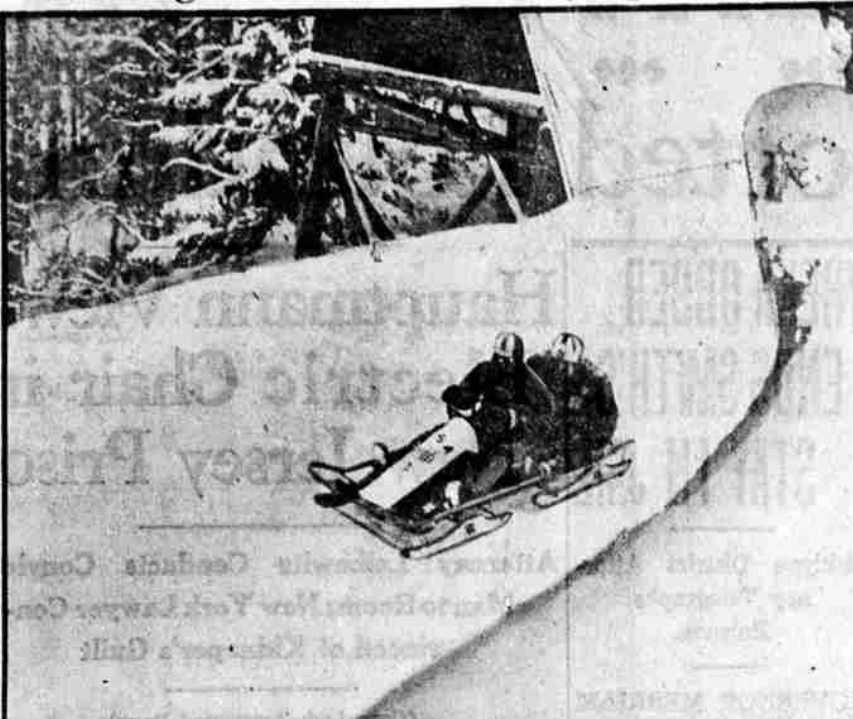
Portland Finds Way To Beat Court Rule

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 20. (UP)—Portland drivers will not get much joy out of the supreme court's invalidation of the city's maximum speed limit of 25 miles an hour. Police Judge Donald Long said Wednesday.

Instead of being charged with speeding when they drive too fast for public safety, operators will be charged with reckless driving, which exacts a more severe penalty on conviction.

Incidentally, Long said, anyone convicted of reckless driving must insure his vehicle before he is permitted to drive again.

Big Northwest Ski Carnival Set February 29

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 20.—Winter sports enthusiasts will have opportunity to witness a great field of men and women ski experts in competition for honors at the Pacific Northwest championship slalom and downhill tournament to be held on Mt. Hood, Saturday and Sunday, February 29 and March 1, under auspices of the Cascade Ski club of this city. This tournament is one of a series for this season, authorized by the Pacific Northwestern Ski association and it is attracting many entries from big clubs on the Pacific coast and in western Canada.

Entries are assured from the Washington, Seattle and Spokane Ski clubs and the Bend Skyliners in addition to entries from the local club. Several of the fastest runners of British Columbia and California will enter and information has been received that a number of the famous ski racers of Banff, Alta., will participate.

The races will be staged on the new courses on Tom, Dick and Harry ridge adjacent to Multnomah Hill ski bowl and will be used for the first time in competitive events in this tournament. Skiers who have tried out these courses say they are the most sporty in the Pacific northwest, if not on the entire Pacific coast. The downhill course is 7,500 feet long and in this distance the drop is 1,400 feet, or approximately 18 per cent, making the course sufficiently speedy for the most daring skier.

Downhill events for both men and women will be held Saturday, February 29, starting at 1 p. m. and slalom events will be staged Sunday, March 1, starting at 10 a. m.

The Mt. Hood Loop highway is being kept open for travel from Portland to the scene of the tournament by the state highway department and an abundance of parking space for machines has been provided within walking distance of the race courses.

Wage Claim Suit Tried Wednesday In Circuit Court

An assigned wage claim suit brought by the Oregon bureau of labor against George Noble and Joe Bessler, Langell valley horsemen, was on trial in circuit court Wednesday.

Plaintiff, representing Bill Stepp, Fred Water and others allegedly employed by defendants in staging a rodeo at Yreka, Cal., asks sums totalling less than \$200 for services rendered and allegedly unpaid for by defendants.

(By The Associated Press) The Seattle Seahawks held a tighter grip on the lead of the Northwestern Hockey league today while the Vancouver Lions were forced to give up second place to the Portland Buckaroos as the race for league honors rounded into the home stretch.

Last night's hockey wars saw the Lions go down to a bruising 5 to 3 defeat before the Seahawks at Seattle while the Portland Buckaroos, formerly but one point behind the Lions in third place, grabbed the second rung with a 2 to 1 victory over the tail-end Tigers in a slow struggle at Calgary.

Big Train Will Attempt to Duplicate Prowess of Washington

FREDERICKSBURG, Va., Feb. 20. (P)—Prompted by elvish pride and just plain curiosity, residents of this historic city today showered hushes of iron washers into the Rappahannock river.

Unable to wait until Saturday when Walter Johnson tries his arm against the legendary grower of George Washington in hurling a dollar across the river, the citizens are trying to settle the matter among themselves—but with iron washers, not silver coins.

All tries have fallen short of the mark. Official records show W. H. F. Cole, Commonwealth's attorney—half way across.

Carlton Massey, city engineer—two-thirds.

Hon. F. Pitts, president of the chamber of commerce—half way.

Charles H. Lewis, druggist—three-quarters.

Asked by Representative Sol Bloom's contention that the river was too broad in Washington's day for anyone to throw anything over it, city surveyors were dispatched to the river bank near the old Washington farm.

"372 feet," said an official announcement.

But up in Washington, Bloom countered with: "I don't care how far the distance is today, it was 1320 feet when Washington lived there. I'm still betting 20 to 1 Walter

Johnson can't throw a dollar that far."

To prove his point the congressman cabled the British public records office, where old colonial maps are housed. He said a reply revealed a distance of 1320 feet.

"Wrong," came back Commonwealth's attorney Cole. "This and the English calculations flood Fredericksburg off the map."

Disregarding the wrangle over the distance, Johnson, famous for his baseball, assured citizens he will make the throw on Washington's birthday.

From his Germantown, Maryland, home he sent word: "I am still practicing with a dollar against my barn door. Arm getting stronger, barn door weaker."

While the controversy raged and hardware stores did a brisk business in washers, activity broke out in another quarter. Fierce bidding developed over future possession of the dollar Johnson hopes to hurl across the river.

Banker John F. Gouldman, Jr., who donated the dollar, offered \$5 to anyone who retrieves it.

Wilbur Wallace, of nearby Spottsylvania raised the bid to \$20. A local automobile company hiked it to \$30. Indications are that the final bid will be triple that amount.
