PRICES GO UP ON WHEAT MART

CHICAGO, Feb. 20. (AP)—Higher prices on wheat formed the rule today, with Liverpool quotations showing for the second successive day greater advances than had been expected. Winnipeg reported fair export buying of wheat. Demand from overseas was apparently affected by unfavorable European crop news.

Wheat closed firm at the same as yesterday's finish to 1/4 higher. May 95 1/2-99, corn 1/4-1/2 off. May 61 1/4-1/2, oats 1/4-1/2 up, and provisions 5 to 12 cents down.

BOSTON WOOL

BOSTON, Feb. 20. (AP)—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—Trade was very quiet on domestic wools in Boston as limited stocks were not being offered at prices users were willing to pay. Spot Australia and Southern American wools were moderately active at prices steady to slightly stronger than were paid last week. Cashmere received by private concerns in Boston indicated a strong rising price tendency in wool markets of Australia and South America.
