COLLEGE HOOP CROP SIFTED

Committee Seeks Representative for Olympic Games.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 21 (AP)—The Portland baseball club sets out for the Pacific Coast league pennant this year behind a new manager whose main problem between now and opening day is to produce an infield staff capable of carrying on from where the 1935 squad left off.

It is no simple task assigned to Max Bishop, the new pilot. Last year's infield quartet, which included Harry Davis at first, Chalmers Cissell at second, Chet Wilburn at short and Gil English at third, ranked as the best in the league.

Bishop, former second sacker for the Athletics and Red Sox, will run the team from the key-stone base. His predecessor, Cissell, managed the club from the same position. Bishop's fielding will compare favorably with Cissell's but he probably will fall short on the latter's hitting ability.

Replacing the smooth fielding Davis at first base will be Bill Sweeney, sound minor leaguer. With Baltimore last season he was well up among the batting leaders of the International league. The shortstop job is still open. It will be a tough job to fill the shoes vacated by Wilburn. Fred Bedore, purchased from Indianapolis, will hold down third. He's experienced. A few years ago big league clubs were after him.

Plans for the final trials to be held in Madison Square Garden the first week in April call for five college teams, survivors in ten districts throughout the country, to clash with the winner and runner-up in the A. A. U. tourney. Right now there's very little indication as to what teams will get the call.

Teams Seek Titles

In addition to the endless argument over the comparative basketball strength in various sections of the country, there's the fact that most of the outstanding teams are too busy trying to complete their seasons successfully to give much attention so far to the question of entering the Olympic trials. Others may eschew the prolonged N. C. A. A. playoffs in favor of the A. A. U. tourney.

At present there is plenty of room for argument whether Long Island university is stronger than Purdue, Notre Dame or Arkansas and so on down the line but such basketball hotbeds as Indiana, the Missouri valley region and New York's metropolitan districts seem to have the best prospects.

Hobson Plans New Lineup to Meet Beavers

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 21 (AP)—Coach Howard Hobson will place still another new University of Oregon combination on the floor in effort to defeat the Oregon State college basketball team here tomorrow night.

The teams divided their first two games, but Oregon State is in second place in league standings, well above the third place Webfoots.
