Roseburg was one of the warmest spots in Oregon with a minimum temperature of 50 degrees last night.

While snow fell at higher levels in eastern Oregon, rain fell at Bend during the night and washed away the last traces of four inches of fresh snow. The temperature at daybreak was 41 degrees.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 21. (AP) — Rain of cloudburst proportions swelled the Sacramento river today and at Colusa, 135 miles north, the overflow was expected to inundate the entire countryside.

The weather bureau here forecast the approach of another storm with more precipitation.

It was estimated the river, now at 24 feet, will rise to 27 or 28 feet, the danger mark for Colusa, within 36 hours. The stream at Kennett was at 14 feet and rising rapidly.
