

Idaho Vandals Upset Washington, 40 to 33

Candidates Needed in Big Leagues

Trading Takes Spark Out Of Many Clubs.

Quite a few of the big league pennant race machines are going to need replacement parts this year; otherwise, they're going to miss fire on a couple of cylinders and wind up among the also-rans.

Trades during the off-season have so wrecked the machine of several of the teams that their managers are burning plenty of midnight oil over their problems. They're hoping against hope that some of their rookies will fit into the shoes of tried and true veterans stranded since the close of '35.

One fellow who's doing plenty of figuring is the ancient and honorable Connie Mack, who peddled everyone but the bat boy to Tom Yawkey. First and foremost, Connie must fill the expensive sandals of James Emory Fox, the Sudlersville seeder who played plenty of first base for the A's and also did very well at the plate.

If Jim Oglesby, the west coast rookie from Los Angeles, can do three-fourths as well as Fox, Connie will feel that there still is something worth living for. Oglesby hit .350 in the coast loop last year, and experts contend he won't be so far under that mark in his first year under the big tent.

The Red Sox, Indians and Browns are pretty well fixed, having traded or sold no established star during the year without having acquired others in the deals.

Problems of the Yankees and Tigers aren't so difficult, although you couldn't call finding someone to replace Tony Lassetri at second for the Yanks, and Marvin Owen at third for the Tigers, a trivial matter.

Chicago has two problems on its hands. One is to fill in for Al Simmons. The other is to replace Jimmy Dykes at third.

The White Sox outfield now shapes up with Rip Radcliff, Mule Haas and Vernon Geddie. Washington's going duty. But Haas isn't the felder he once was, and Dykes may have to call on Mike Kreevich, who comes up from Kansas City with an average of .345, for service.

Should Dykes, as rumored, retire from active duty this year, he probably will be forced to call on Joe Mauer, up from Toronto, where he hit .372 last year, or Charley Uhar, a free agent from Cleveland.

Washington is faced with replacing Heinie Manush, the outfielder sent to Boston. Of course, Carl Reynolds, acquired from the Red Sox in the deal, will fill in the Dutchman's place. But if he flops—he hit only .370 last year—Bucky Harris probably will call on Dee Millea, a swift rookie from Chattanooga, who swatted .344 last season.

In the National league, the Braves and the Phillies can be passed off with the remark that they ought to go out and get whole new teams, although the Boston bunch especially needs pitchers who can make up for the loss of Frankhouse and Brandt.

Bill Terry is going to find it tough to find a replacement for Tarzan Parmelee, despite the fact that he gave up on the fireball flinger and traded him to the Cards for Burgess Whitehead. The replacement may come in the person of Clem Duesaw, a southpaw who pitched 41 consecutive scoreless innings in the Middle Atlantic league year before last. He comes up from Nashville.

Brooklyn probably will have to get a better first-stringer than Babe Phelps before the season is far gone. The Blimp is not the catcher Al Lopez was. Stengel has two rookie receivers in camp, Ray Beres from Sacramento and Walt Millies from Chattanooga. Chicago must replace Freddie Lindstrom, even though he didn't play the entire 1935 season. Tuck Stainback is by no means a sensational outfielder, and the job may fall to Johnny Gill, the oft-tried minor leaguer.

The Cards, due to Bill DeLancey's illness, make a new catcher. Ogorodowski, up from Columbus, is labeled a coming major league star, and Frisch probably will give him plenty of work this year.

Frankie is plenty worried about second base, too. With Whitehead gone, and his own wits not as young as they once were, the former Fordham Flash doesn't figure to play the full season, and may have to depend on Lyle Judy, sensational minor league base stealer.

Pepper Martin is going to the outfield, and Frisch will be forced to gamble further by putting Charley Gelbert, coming back after a short round, three years ago, at third. Cincinnati's problem lies in the way out, and George McQuinn, who comes up from the Yankee farm at Newark, and Lee Scar-

Football Coach Killed in Auto Wreck in North

ABERDEEN, Feb. 22 (AP)—A collision early today between two automobiles and a truck killed John Mashin, about 35, weather-wax (Aberdeen) high school football coach and Virginia Doyle, 14-year-old Aberdeen girl who thumbed a ride to her death.

Five others—a girl, two women and two men—were injured. Mashin, with Miss Esther Jasker, 20, Aberdeen, was returning from an Olympia basketball game when his car collided with a truck driven by Floyd Janney, Montezuma, accompanied by his wife.

A car driven by Charles Wilson, Aberdeen, carrying Vincent Bowman, Aberdeen, Miss Doyle and her girl hitchhiker chum, Mary Anne Tice, 13, also of Aberdeen, crashed into the wreckage of the Mashin machine and the truck near the east entrance to the city.

Wilson received a fractured right forearm; Bowman a fractured skull; Miss Tice, lacerations; Miss Jasker, fractured ankle and rib, and Mrs. Floyd Janney, scalp wounds. Floyd Janney was not hurt.

Investigators learned Wilson and Bowman a few minutes earlier had given a ride to both Miss Doyle and Miss Tice, who were hitchhiking to their Aberdeen homes from Montezuma.

PELICANS WIN FROM CAVEMEN

24-22 Victory First For Klamath In Conference Competition

GRANTS PASS, Feb. 22. — (Special) Expert passing, almost phenomenal in its speed and accuracy, Friday gave Klamath Falls its first victory in three games with Grants Pass this season and its only southern Oregon conference win of the year to date.

Final score was Klamath Falls 24, Grants Pass 22, indicating a pretty close game.

It was even closer than that. At the end of the first quarter the teams were tied, 5-all. At the half they were tied, 12 to 12. At the close of the third period, Klamath was ahead, 19-18, and the margin by which the Pelicans won was the greatest lead held by either outfit at any time during the game.

Reginato and Putman were the Pelicans whose passing brought victory. Not a single point did the Klamath quintet score on long shots from the floor. But it was unnecessary that they should, for every time a Klamath player arrived unguarded in the vicinity of the enemy basket, Reginato or Putman engineered a set-up for him.
