Imagine a woman endeavoring to cross a busy thoroughfare dressed even in a modern version of a crinoline! On the other hand, we may see modernized versions of the ruffs beloved of the 16th and 17th century carried out in soft lingerie trimmings.

Next season more than ever before, I think the essentially elegant woman will adopt two very distinct types of dress—informal and formal. 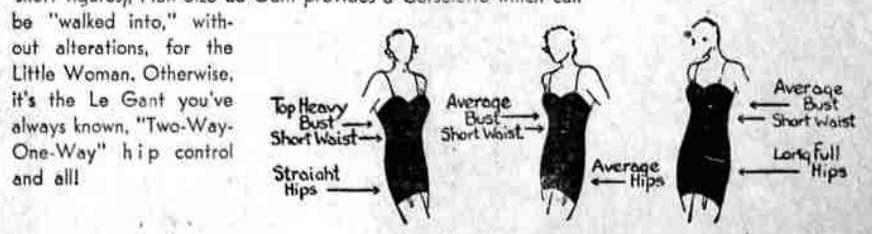
