Communists Picket Foreign Consulates

NEW YORK, Feb. 22. (UP)—Eight hundred communist pickets demonstrated before the German, Italian and Japanese consulates here Friday, protesting against alleged preparations by those countries for war on Russia.

More than 150 pickets marched in front of the Italian consulate shouting "down with Mussolini."

"Smash Hitler's war plans," the mob in front of the German consulate yelled.

Three hundred paraded before the Japanese consulate.

EPIDEMIC IN INDIA
CALCUTTA, India, Feb. 22. (AP)—Four hundred persons were reported to have died here in the last fortnight during a smallpox epidemic. An undetermined number of deaths also were caused at Dacca, India, where the schools were closed.

30,000 Prisoners Granted Freedom By Spanish Edict

Copyright, 1936, by United Press. MADRID, Feb. 22. (UP)—The government hurriedly granted amnesty freeing 30,000 political prisoners from scores of jails Friday as a desperate attempt to stop radical riots and save Spain from possible Bolshevism.

A score of persons have been killed since Sunday's election and more than 100 wounded or injured in nationwide disorders. Holy images and crosses were trampled. The red flag of communism headed shouting processions of victorious radicals and a woman was stabbed to death when a village butcher's sons refused to salute it.

Only yesterday Manuel Azana, the new premier, said amnesty could not be granted before March 16, when the new parliament meets. So grave did the situation become overnight, however, that President Niceto Alcalá Zamora today signed and sent to the permanent committee of the cortes a proclamation of amnesty.

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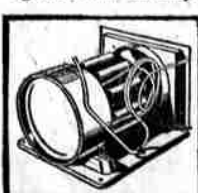
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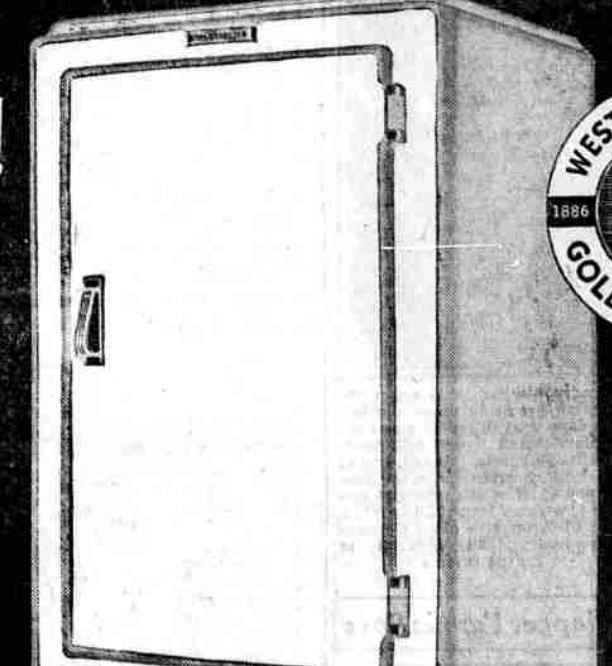
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
