KLAMATH WINS BY BIG SCORE

Northern Californians Badly Beaten Here Saturday Night.

Stanford, Troy Deadlocked for Southern Title

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 24. (AP)—Stanford and University of Southern California are tied again today for lead of the southern division conference, after week-end basketball upsets which dented California's title hopes, but still left a possibility of a three-way tie after final games next Friday.

Fighting Bruins of U. C. L. A., who have lost nine games, put on a powerful burst of sharpshooting in a wild five minute overtime period at Berkeley Saturday night, and turned back California, 32 to 25.

Stanford and U. S. C. split their two-game series.

Both games at Berkeley were overtime affairs. The Bears won Friday's game, 34 to 32.

The Trojans of Southern California went into first place in southern division standings Friday night with a 45 to 35 victory over Stanford.

Stanford won the Saturday game, 46 to 42. The Indians wind up the southern division race next Friday with California in the last of their "big games" at Berkeley.

Farley Taunts Alf Landon in Topeka Speech

TOPEKA, Kan., Feb. 24. (AP)—Postmaster-General James A. Farley Saturday carried Franklin D. Roosevelt's campaign for reelection to the doorstep of Governor Alf M. Landon, a leading contender for the republican presidential nomination.

Speaking to several thousand at the annual Washington day democratic banquet, Farley reviewed "Three Years of Roosevelt" and took two direct slaps at Governor Landon.

In defending the administration record he arraigned Herbert Hoover and charged the republican party and its "subsidiary," the American Liberty League, with fomenting an "economic fear campaign" against President Roosevelt.

"Kansas got its fair share of federal money and I am informed by Senator McGill and your three democratic congressmen that it has turned the tide," he said referring to criticism that Landon balanced Kansas' budget with federal funds.

His second barb at the Kansas executive was a reference to salary cuts among school teachers and college professors.

"Perhaps it was necessary," he said, "but the policy of the Roosevelt administration has been to save the schools of the nation wherever possible."

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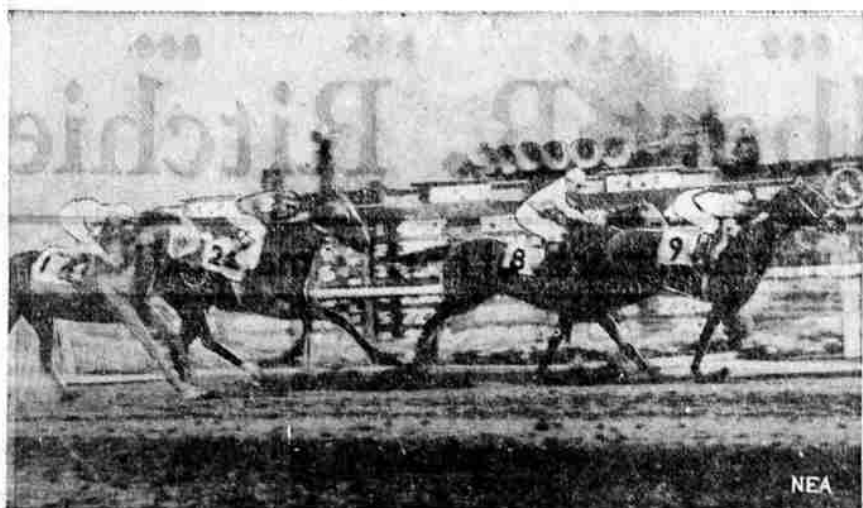
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Top Row Wins

Oregon High School Quintets Begin Final Drive Toward State Tournament

High school basketball teams round the turn this week and start thundering down the gruelling home stretch toward the state basketball tournament.

Ashland high moved to the threshold of qualifying for the state classic at Willamette university March 18 to 21 by defeating Medford 21 to 14 the past week. One more league win will give Ashland the southern Oregon championship and state meet entrance.

Crucial Games Coming

However, most other teams face a long and slippery stretch, often through sub-district and district tournaments.

This is the critical week in the Portland prep league which sends its two top teams to Salem. The race doubled in excitement last week when Franklin fell to a second place tie with Jefferson and Benson took sole leadership.

Jefferson, which has won seven consecutive games in a stirring comeback, meets Franklin Tuesday. Then the Jeffs, led by all-state Jake Hergert, match scoring lore with Benson Friday.

Salem, host team in the tournament, dropped a 46 to 35 decision to McMinnville the past week but beat Astoria 33 to 26.

Pendleton New Threat

Bellfountain's undefeated string ended at 15 games with a 22 to 16 loss to Corvallis coach the Giant Killers beat in early season. Falls City followed suit and beat Bellfountain 39 to 16.

The district "B" tournament starts off opportunity for the Salem trip.

A new eastern Oregon threat is Pendleton which beat La Grande 45 to 26. However, observers doubt the Buckaroos will be consistent enough to gain a two out of three series from Milton-Freewater and then lick

the winner of the similar series between The Dalles and Hood River, and go to the state meet.

The Dalles has been the tournament representative the past five seasons, and is improving steadily.

Corvallis High, rated by many as the team to beat in the state tournament, could qualify for the big show by defeating Eugene, league runner-up, Friday, and coasting to wins over less threatening league rivals.

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Frankie Gailuci and Joey Dodge meet in one of the starround preliminaries.

University of Oregon and Oregon State rest until Friday and then unleash their pent-up feeling in a basketball battle at Corvallis.

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
