

WINTER MOVES INTO SOUTH OREGON AREA

degrees above zero. Maximum reading for the day was 36 degrees.

A new low record in barometric pressure was made last week and over the week-end here, according to local weather men. At no time did the instrument rise above 29.50, which is unusually low.

The extreme low for barometric pressure was struck at noon Monday, when it marked 29.29, an extreme for this portion of the state.

More Snow Due

No let-up from the storm seemed in sight Monday, and the local weather man predicted continued unsettled weather, snow, and cold winds.

The state weather bureau forecast is for snow in the east and rain or snow in the west, no change in temperatures and moderate to fresh changeable winds.

Information from the highway department office and from the Oregon Motor Association disclosed that every main road in Oregon was open to traffic but utmost caution was indicated at slippery spots in many parts of the state.

Pacific Highway Open

Chains were required on the Columbia River highway and on the Evergreen highway on the north bank. There were many slippery places and ice was covered by snow.

The Pacific highway was open and in fairly good condition clear through to the California line. Tire chains were not needed there this morning.

WINTER AT MEDFORD

MEDFORD, Feb. 24. (AP)—Near-normal conditions prevailed in the central and upper Rogue river valley today. Snow whitened the melting foothills, and residents of this city awoke this morning to find a skiff of snow on the ground.

The mercury dropped to 32 degrees. Friday with a maximum of 63 degrees was the warmest since last October 27. State police reported that it was snowing hard this morning at Sexton mountain, north of Grants Pass. A foot of new snow fell at Crater Lake Sunday.

Snow was general throughout the mountainous areas of southern Oregon and northern California.

SEATTLE, Feb. 24. (AP)—Automobile traffic crept over the avalanche-buried Snoqualmie pass today, scene of the loss of three lives two nights ago, as state police and Coroner Otto H. Mittelstadt said they were convinced that other persons had been lost.

A short stretch was still held to one-way traffic this forenoon, but rotary plows were expected to have it completely open by noon.

"That will tell the whole story," Mittelstadt said. "It is now doubtful if any other persons were killed."

State highway officials again talked of the need of snowsheds at the "danger points." One such 150-foot shed is in use east of the summit.

Snow fell generally over western Washington last night, bringing a fall of six inches at Everett and four inches here and at Bellevue. It was the two above at Wenatchee and five above at Ellensburg, as cold and snow visited eastern Washington.

RIVER DOWN

SALEM, Feb. 24. (AP)—Immediate flood danger from the Willamette river appeared past today as the water began slowly receding after reaching a mark of 123 feet yesterday.

Precipitation dropped off, only .64 of an inch of rain and snow being recorded in the past 48 hours.

Minimum temperature this morning was 31 degrees. The maximum Sunday was 45.

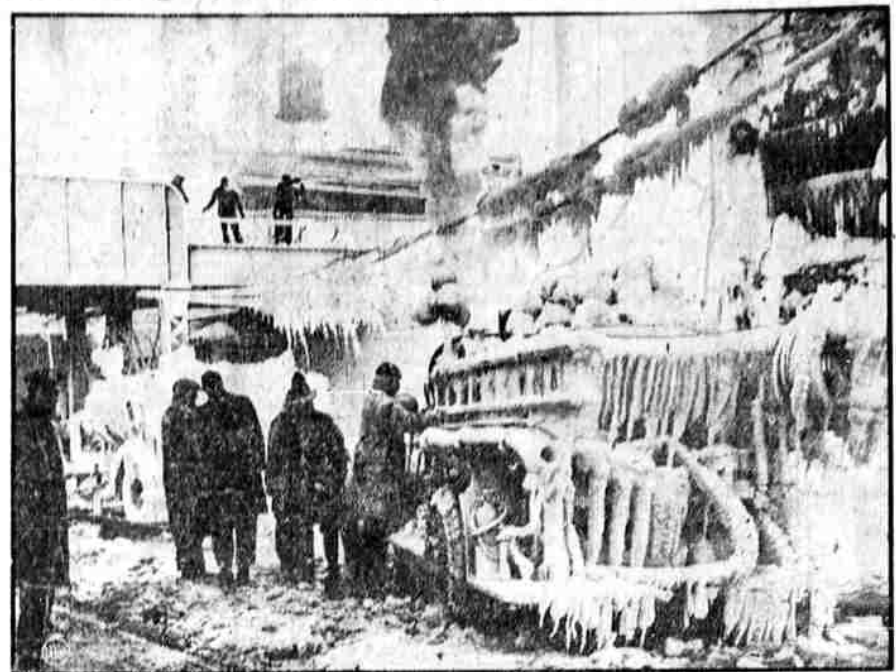
