

Huskies Drop Close Game to Cougars, 36 to 35

Spears' Fortunes Decline

Doctor Departs from Big Time Coaching Job with Big Time Salary.

Dr. C. W. Spears, just rounding the 40-year mark, has gone from the very top to the bottom of the football coaching rate sheet.

From Dartmouth to West Virginia to Minnesota to Oregon to Wisconsin to Toledo, a school little heard of outside its own small circle, the doctor's name became lost in the shuffle of second-rate football teams and second-rate coaches.

With the dropping off of his prestige on the heels of many defeats at Oregon and even more at Wisconsin, the doctor has suffered a tremendous financial setback.

When he came to Oregon, he received a fat salary of \$11,500. This was a combination pay for a combination job—professor of physical education, physician at the campus hospital and football coach.

The \$1,500 for his duties at the infirmary was a gift. The doctor never went near the place in his three years at Eugene.

To get back into the Big Ten, Spears was willing to accept \$10,000 on a year-to-year basis at Wisconsin.

Now he's getting paid \$1,000 for coaching Toledo's football team and \$3,100 for teaching physical education.

Doc was a dictator—or attempted to be a dictator—at every school he coached. No one ever doubted his great knowledge of football and even the persons who liked him least regret the conditions that have topped him from the ranks of the leaders.

Nearly every year some B high school gets ambitious and wants to show up the big brother.

Wednesday night Tulelake, champion of the Klamath-Siskiyou conference, will meet the Klamath Pelicans at the high school.

CONTEST GOES INTO OVERTIME

Oregon State Now Within Striking Distance of Leaders.

PULLMAN, Wash., Feb. 25, (AP)—What looked like a walk-away for the Washington Huskies a week ago in northern division coast conference basketball competition, assumed the aspects today of a possible race down the stretch.

A thrilling 36-35 overtime victory over the Huskies last night by the Washington State Cougars buoyed the hopes of Oregon State supporters that the Beavers, with a wagon-load of luck, might be able to overtake Washington. It was the Huskies' second loss in 13 games, having dropped their first of the season to Idaho Friday.

Washington will meet W. S. C. here again tonight, then finish the season with a pair against Oregon State in Seattle.

Huskies Stage Rally

The Huskies staged a brilliant second half rally against the Cougars last night, to tie the score at 33-33 before the final gun, but a free throw and field goal in overtime won for the Cougars.

W. S. C. led at the half, 23-13. The Huskies led only once during the game. Ed Lovrich put them ahead briefly at 35-34 in the overtime period, but Captain Jack Holstine's basket put the W. S. C. back on top for victory. Lovrich, kept on the bench at the start because of a cold, ran wild for 16 points after getting in the game, 12 of them in the last half. The Huskies scored 16 field goals to the winners' 12, but had only three foul conversions to W. S. C.'s 12.
