SEATTLE TEAM LOSING GROUND

Washington Now Only One-Game Margin in Front of Beavers.

The Huskies lost their second in a row to Washington State last night, 47 to 28, the worst defeat handed them thus far.

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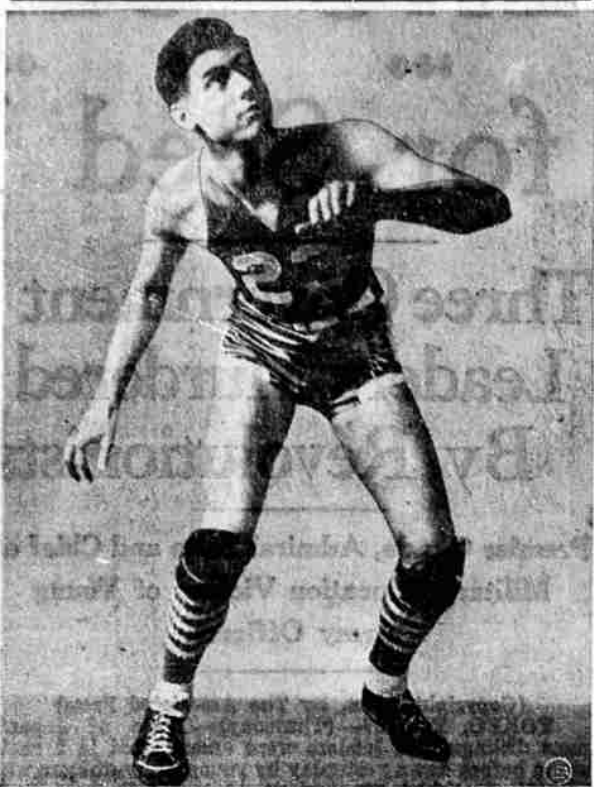
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Out for New High Scoring Mark



William (Spindley Bill) Kinner, center of the University of Utah basketball team, is out to set a new mark in the Western division of the Rocky Mountain Conference. During his four years of collegiate competition he has piled up 1075 points, with four conference games to go on the '36 schedule. He gathered his point total in 84 games, getting 51 points in four recent contests.

Palmberg Still Contender for Scoring Record

SEATTLE, Feb. 26. (AP)—Bagging ten points against Oregon last week, Wally Palmberg, Oregon State's chief basket bomber, was 30 counters away from a new northern division Pacific Coast conference scoring record today, and had three games left in which to get it.

The Beaver veteran ran his total to 147 points for an average of 11.2 per game, miles ahead of his nearest competitor in the standings. The present northern division scoring mark, set up in 1934 by Bobby Galer of Washington, is 176—an even 11-point average for the 16 games.

Ed Lovrich, Washington forward, fared not so well in two clashes with the Idaho Vandals last week, and saw action in only one of the two Washington State games, but clung to his second place rating nevertheless.

He garnered 25 points in the two series to jump his total to 124, an 8.8 average for 14 games.

Ivar Nelson, Washington State center, Merle Fisher, Idaho guard and Earl Conkling, Oregon State center, were putting on a three-way battle for the "honors" in the personal foul department.

Nelson has the edge so far with 33, with the other two in the runner-up roles with 37 each.

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WILSON DRAWS WITH COWBOY

Wrestlers Each Gain Fall in Tuesday Night's Main Event.

A main event that could have been won or lost on time ended all-square for George "Wildcat" Wilson and Cowboy Dude Chick at the Klamath armory last night.

A capacity crowd saw Wilson, the former all-American fullback from the University of Washington, saved from an early defeat when the Wyoming ringer rider gave him an extra five-minute rest. Wilson was toppled for the opening fall in two minutes and 56 seconds.

With three minutes to go before the close of the match, the ex-Husky star opened up with a rushing Sonnenberg attack. The cowboy was bounced around the ring from rope to rope and only the timer's signal that the one hour limit had expired prevented Wilson from gaining the deciding fall.

The powerful cowboy, never defeated in Klamath Falls, trapped Wilson on his shoulders, gave him a long spin and then thumped him to the floor for the first fall. Sick and weary, it appeared Wilson could never get up to resume the match.

Urged by the crowd, Chick reluctantly agreed to give his opponent an extra five minutes to the regular rest period. It is doubtful if he could have made much of a show for the remainder of the event.

Wrestling cautiously to regain his strength, Wilson took the second fall in 28 minutes. It was accomplished with a series of flying tackles after he had escaped Chick's second attempt at an airplane spin.

The whirlwind finish was the climax of the match. Twice Wilson avoided a spin by climbing on the ropes. Then, just as the match drew toward a close, he hurled himself on the cowboy with a series of football tackles.

Christy Beats Peck. Referee Ray Frisbie taught one of the ruses as he dashed to to end the match at the close of the time limit.

Popular Frankie Peck, San Francisco, lost to Ted Christy, Los Angeles, in the semi-windup. The Los Angeles ruffian took a fall in the second round and again in the fifth with full Nelsons.

Peck, retaliating in roughness, earned a fall in the third with a body press. The bell saved Christy from an Indian deadlock at the end of the first.

Duke Pettigrove of New Orleans, won his first start here by taking the opening event from Wayne Long of Kansas. Long won the first fall in the opening round with Sonnenbergs. Toe holds in the second and third brought victory to Pettigrove.

Portland, Ore., Feb. 26. (AP)—Bill Anton, high scorer in the Portland Prep league last season, returned to Portland in the role of a college player for the first time last night and paced the Klamath-Siskiyou basketball team to a 38 to 24 win over University of Portland.

Stanford Permitted To Invest in Stocks

SAN JOSE, Cal., Feb. 26. (UP)—Stanford university received court permission Tuesday to convert part of its trust funds into common stocks as a hedge against possible currency inflation.

In handing down his decision Superior Judge William James took cognizance of testimony by former President Herbert Hoover that a Stanford alumnus, Hoover testified that the threat of currency inflation was so real that the university trustees should be allowed to prepare for it.

Hoover's testimony pointed out that endowed colleges, such as Stanford, had most of their investments in bonds, real estate loans and similar securities which would be adversely affected by inflation.

Jury Frees Woman Of Murder Charge

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 26. (UP)—Mrs. Amy Dumbrell, grey-haired matron tried for the murder of her husband, John, Tuesday was acquitted of the charge by a jury of seven men and five women after they had deliberated four hours.

The jury received the case at 12:45 p. m. today after hearing pleas by defense counsel in behalf of the defendant, who previously told the court how she had shot her husband, a prominent San Francisco fraternal leader and branch bank manager, after discovering he was "consorting with another woman."

Al Spina Gains Knockout Victory In First Round

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 26. (AP)—Al Spina, Portland featherweight, blasted young Tommy to the canvas six times in a wild two minutes and 19 seconds to score a stunning knockout victory here last night.

Spina, 123 1/2, spent less than a minute feeling out his Los Angeles opponent. The Portland Italian then closed in and clipped Tommy, 123 1/2, squarely on the chin for a no-count knock-down.

Tommy bounced up, but Spina met his rush with a crashing blow that sprawled the little Filipino over backward for the count of two. Another terrific blow and the desperate Filipino was down for the count of four. Back again he came for more, and got it.

Spina knocked his groggy opponent clear through the ropes. Young Tommy gamely crawled back at the count of seven after Tom Loutitt threw out the towel. Tommy's seconds tossed in.

MANAGERS QUIT AT UNIVERSITY

Rosson, Stoddard Resign From Athletic Posts; Curtailment Seen.

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 26. (AP)—Urging reorganization of the student activities set up, and acknowledging no inclination for the task, Hugh E. Rosson, graduate manager of University of Oregon, and N. Thomas Stoddard, assistant, resigned, effective June 30.

Both men expressed the desire to aid in acquainting the new men with the duties of their offices between now and the end of the school year. Loss of compulsory student fee payments will necessitate retrenchment, they said.

Rosson pointed out that he accepted the position in 1930 "to aid in the solution of the acute financial problems." He said "considerable progress has been made through extensive reduction of indebtedness and through yearly presentation of our program of student activities, even in years of intense economic stress."

"It is my belief that the problems now facing the associated students in the financial administration of student activities must inevitably be met by change and reorganization of the present system and that effective consideration of such plans should be had with regard to soundness of principle, efficiency of operation and staff personnel."

"In view of the fact, therefore, that I desire to devote my future to other interests, I hereby tender my resignation."

Rosson, former assistant professor of law here, recently was admitted to the Oregon bar. Stoddard's title was changed to assistant graduate manager of athletics last year.

Huskies Prepare for Hoop Games with Orangemen

SEATTLE, Feb. 26. (AP)—Washington is taking the Oregon State basketball threat seriously. Ed Lovrich and Bob Egge were "saved" last night against Washington State when the Cougars defeated the Huskies, 47-28, for the forthcoming series with the Beavers.

Washington State's team was the strongest from W. S. C. the Huskies ever met.

Those were three high-lights of a long-distance conversation between Coach Hec Edmondson of the Huskies and Seattle sports writers after last night's defeat.

Lovrich is out with a cold and Egge was forced to retire with a charley horse.

Explaining his use of replacements, when he saw W. S. C. could not miss he "conceded the Cougars the game rather than take chances of having one of our men seriously crippled."

Southern Oregon Beats Mt. Angel

ASHLAND, Ore., Feb. 26. (AP)—The Southern Oregon Normal basketball team rested in preparation for a road trip today, after defeating Mt. Angel college, 33 to 28 last night in the last home game. The Sons will play at Crescent City tomorrow night and meet the Humboldt Junior College at Eureka Friday and Saturday.
