

TULELAKE ROADS IN BETTER SHAPE

TULELAKE, Feb. 26. — Old Sol appeared over Tulelake Saturday and added his warmth to a wind which was rapidly drying muddy roads and if weather conditions continue unchanged for the next three days, residents will again be able to travel.

Roads of the Tulelake area have been practically impassable except for gravelled portions nearly the entire period so far this month. Rain has fallen nearly every day for three weeks and with a slight amount of frost in the ground up to this week water stood in pools over the area.

Thawing of the ground has permitted this water to settle the soil and heavy winds and sunshine are again drying the area.

Burris Short, Siskiyou county maintenance man, is operating the county grading equipment and crowding roads as rapidly as possible to facilitate draining of additional rain water expected before spring actually breaks.

Short plans to keep as many roads open in the Tulelake area as is possible under the present weather conditions. Intentions are for a considerable amount of regrading during the spring and arrangements will be made for additional drainage where such is needed.

Under the program as outlined by Gordon Jacobs, county supervisor, Tulelake will be provided with additional travel facilities this year which will materially aid in moving of crops next fall and winter.

Much gratification has been expressed to the county men for their fine cooperation in the townsite of Tulelake where the streets are being cared for by county equipment and have been kept passable to a larger extent than in any previous year.

CASCADE SUMMIT, Ore.—A snow carnival was held here Sunday when six hundred and thirty people came to Cascade Summit on a special train, run by the Southern Pacific company from Eugene. The carnival was sponsored by the Okeidai society of Eugene.

Cascade Summit now has 104 inches of snow, twenty-four inches of this having fallen in the last two days. The Southern Pacific company used its snow equipment, including the rotary snow plow. The upper half of Lake Odell is frozen over, while the lower half is still open.

High Officials of Park Service Die In Auto Accident

DEMING, N. M., Feb. 26. (UP)—Roger Toll, superintendent of Yellowstone national park, and George M. Wright, head of the wild life division of the national parks service, were killed when their car, driven by Toll, collided head-on with another machine eight miles east of here Tuesday.

An unidentified youth, riding in the other car, was killed, and three other persons in that machine, which bore a Connecticut license, were reported in serious condition in Deming hospital. Their identities unknown because they could not be questioned.

Both cars were completely wrecked, as they struck with terrific force. It was estimated that both must have been traveling at speeds approaching 60 miles per hour.

Sheriff R. G. Franey, who with his deputies aided in taking the injured persons to the hospital, said his investigation of the accident indicated that a rear tire of the Connecticut car had blown out, causing it to swerve into the path of Toll's car.

He said that the Connecticut car plowed almost half way through the Toll machine.

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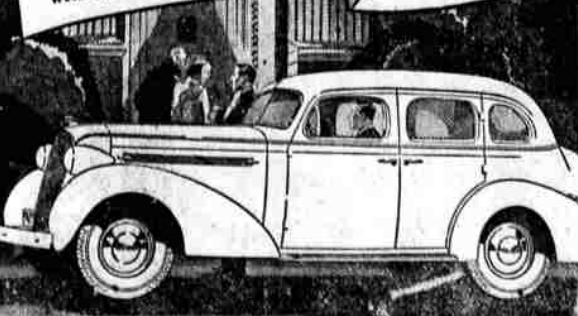
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
