Conference Ends Lively Season

Chiloquin, Tulelake Divide Honors. Teams Ready to Open Annual Tournament.

These teams, with the exception of Tulelake and the Dorris Bulldogs, open the annual county B tournament at Klamath high school Friday afternoon. The California are eliminated because of their out-of-state status.

Because of the general evenness of the county teams, one of the closest tournaments in several seasons is expected.

Tulelake and Chiloquin, the two leaders, have veteran squads. Speed and size counted much for their showing in the conference.

Tulelake lost its single game to Chiloquin, while Chiloquin was beaten by Merrill.

Malin high school, champion in 1934 and 1935, is one of the leading dark horse contenders for the tournament title. Bonanza's heavy team should figure strongly, too.

Merrill has played both good and bad all season. If the team plays at top form it should be one of the tournament threats.

Henley, the Klamath Wildcats and Keno, low finishers in the league play, had green material. They were strong enough, however, to cause trouble all through the schedule.

Henley held Chiloquin and Tulelake to one-point margins.

League coaches generally figure Chiloquin and Bonanza as the chief tournament favorites. Malin, Merrill and Henley are the teams looking forward to upsets.

The tournament opens at the Klamath high gymnasium Friday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock.

The committee to study the reorganization necessitated by falling off of student fee payments will include President C. V. Boyer, two student members of the associated students' executive council, a faculty member and an alumnus. The group will consult with Dr. Frederick M. Hunter, chancellor of higher education regarding a new program and successors to the retiring officers.

Northern Californians Gain Triumph Over High School.

Tulelake high school's fast, well-balanced basketball team upset the Klamath Pelicans, 31 to 27 in a hotly fought game on the high school floor last night.

Co-champions of the Klamath-Siskiyou conference, the Tulelakers displayed excellent basketball in their triumph over the hoop representatives of the bigger school.

They were cheered to victory by a large delegation of supporters from the south-end country. An aftermath of the tense situation that prevailed at the game was a small riot that developed as the crowd was breaking up.

The ancient school prank of removing air from tires had been brought into play on the bus that carried the Tulelake team, reportedly in retaliation for some similar stunt at Tulelake. One thing led to another until altercations started. They finally ended, however, with no serious damage done. City police were called, but it was all over by that time.

Klamath took the lead early in the game, but the visitors found their stride and it stood 6 to 6 at the quarter. They were still on even terms at the half, but in the last period the Honkers began climbing. That period was definitely theirs, and it all ended, 31 to 25.

It was a fast, rough game. The Tulelake team represents a B school, while the Pelicans, in the A class, are defending champions in district 3 of the state high school athletic association.

Oregon Quints Seeking Entry In Tournaments

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 27, (AP)—College and independent basketball teams will hold separate state tournaments next week, and the two winners will meet for the Oregon championship and right to represent Oregon at the National A. A. U. tournament at Denver.

Williamette, Linfield, Pacific, Mt. Angel, University of Portland and the three normal schools were expected to enter the collegiate tournament at Eugene, March 6 and 7.

At the same time eight independent teams will swing into action on the Jefferson floor in Portland. The committee made drawings last night.

Union Oil of Portland will meet the winner of the Hood River independent tournament; the Portland City league winner will play the Longview, Wash., tournament winner; Multnomah club will play the Townsend club of Eugene, which won its district meet, and the Portland City league runner-up will meet the winner of the Astoria tournament.

The state championship game will be played here March 10. The next day the winner will leave for the National A. A. U. tournament.

This playoff is separate from the Pacific Northwest Olympic tryout tournament for colleges, which probably will be held a few days later.

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PADRES READY TO MAKE BOW

San Diego Club Prepares for Start of Coast Baseball Year.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 27, (AP)—San Diego's Padres, a team with a new name but manned by familiar faces, makes its bow in Pacific Coast league baseball this season.

Owner Bill Lane transferred his Hollywood club to the border city as the culmination of disputes over rentals at the Los Angeles ball park and apparently he plans to start with practically the same outfit that finished so poorly in 1935.

New Players Added

Frank Shellenback, serving his first term as manager last season, was not entirely responsible for the club's mediocre showing, which included last place finish in the second half. The old spitball pitcher won quite a few games himself but the team machine wasn't hitting on enough cylinders.

Thus far Lane has added two new players of the experienced variety. They are George Hockette, left handed pitcher, and Lou Holman, a third sacker.

Hockette was turned over as part of the deal in which Bobby Doerr and George Myatt were added to the Boston Red Sox for future delivery. While never a regular with the Red Sox, Hockette's minor league record indicates he will offer succor to the balance of the Padre's mound staff.

Pitchers Fairly Strong

Holman was received from Tulsa of the Texas league in a trade for Jim Loney. He is a driving hitter and may be an improvement over the temperamental Loney who failed to measure up to expectations.

The pitching corps appears fairly strong, with seven veterans and one youngster. They are Manager Shellenback, who probably will lead the rest of his charges in victories; Herman Pillette, Beryl Horne, Archie Campbell, Wally Hebert, Ed Weil, Jack Hill and Hockette.

Doerr has written of a "star inside the present moon," but no one ever will see such a sight. A star in this position would be behind the moon, totally eclipsed.

Beavers, Oregon Meet on Friday in Crucial Tilt

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Feb. 26. — What has developed into one of the most important basketball games of the season for Oregon State will be played here Friday night when the Grappling meet their traditional rivals, the University of Oregon Webfoots, in the final contest of their annual four-game series. It will be the final home game of the season for Oregon State.

The four-game series between Oregon and Oregon State now favors the Grappling 2 to 1. Oregon won the opening game at Eugene last month by the score of 29 to 27. Oregon State took the second here, 49 to 23, and the third at Eugene last week by the score of 25 to 26.

The race for the northern division conference championship has simmered down to two teams, Washington and Oregon State. The Huskies are leading the race with 11 wins and three defeats. The Grappling, in second place, have nine wins and four defeats.

Washington has only two more games to play and both of these are with Oregon State. Oregon State's only other game is the aforementioned contest Friday night with Oregon.

In order to get a clear title to the championship the Grappling must win all three games. Should the Grappling lose to Oregon they then must win both games with Washington to gain a tie with the Huskies for the championship. In this case a playoff would be necessary.

Oregon's probable starting lineup for the game here Friday night includes Sam Liebowitz and Dave Silver, forwards; Chuck Patterson, center, and Bud Jones and Ron Rourke, guards.

Oregon State's starting lineup is Wally Palmerberg and Hub Tuttle, forwards; Earl Conkling, center, and Bob Bergstrom and Cliff Polen, guards.
