Ambassador Grew of the United States visited the foreign office today and conveyed the condolences of the Washington government to Japan over the assassinations of Premier Okada, Finance Minister Korekiyo Takahashi, Admiral Makoto Saito, lord keeper of the privy seal, and Gen. Jotaro Watanabe, director of military education.

Later the American envoy visited the homes of the victims and expressed his condolences directly to the families.

At the Saito home, the Viscountess Saito, with her hand bandaged as the result of a gunshot wound, was able to receive the ambassador.

The Viscount and Viscountess Saito were dinner guests of Ambassador Grew in the American embassy a few hours before the assassinations.

Embassy attaches said that so far as they knew no American individuals or interests were harmed in the uprising which showed no anti-foreign tendencies.

ANTICIPATED 1936 BUILDING TREND

FORECAST BY LOCAL AUTHORITIES



Klamath Falls is a bright spot on the northwest's 1936 building map. It was revealed yesterday by a special survey made by Pacific Northwest Building Data. The survey of 1936 anticipated building trend in 31 key northwest cities supplements a previously announced study of building permit volume for the period 1926-35.

This and 27 other cities, out of a total of 34 key northwest cities surveyed, expect to record a substantial increase in building construction during the new year.

In four of the remaining six cities, building activity is expected to remain at approximately the 1935 level. One city is "planned" uncertain. Only one community predicts a decrease, and that because of an abnormally large public building program last year.

Local building authorities in each of the 31 cities were consulted by Pacific Northwest Building Data, which is published by the research department of the Equitable Savings & Loan association, Portland.

"Shortage of desirable residences" is the summary of the anticipated 1936 building trend for Klamath Falls.

"Forces behind the current revival of building activity are many," explains the statistical production. "Four stand out most prominently:

(1) "Increase in rents. This has made home ownership increasingly attractive to tenants.

(2) "Shortage of desirable homes available for rent or purchase. Throughout the northwest, home vacancies are far under normal. Prospective purchasers or tenants have few homes to choose from and are, therefore, in increasing numbers turning to new building.

(3) "Growing realization that the depression's bargain building prices are fast disappearing.

(4) "The availability of a growing volume of mortgage funds."

Heavy Snowfalls Improve Outlook

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Willamette valley probably will run from 10 to 15 per cent, whereas the normal loss is about five per cent. The eastern Washington loss also will run about 10 to 15 per cent. It was necessary to clear away 18 inches of snow before lambing could be started in eastern Washington.

Irrigation Sources High. Compensating the losses, spring and summer ranges were expected to be greatly improved this year over the 1935 conditions.

Likewise the ground will be thoroughly soaked and more subterranean water will course beneath the surface, aiding non-irrigated farming tracts and eastern Oregon wheatlands.

Irrigation reservoirs over the state probably will be filled to capacity, it was indicated. However, the greatest single benefit will be to hay and range crops, Herum said.

Snow at Olive Lake in the Blue mountains is deeper than in any other recent year, the forest service and weather reported. On February 24 a measurement showed 58 inches there, compared with only 29 inches in 1935 and 21 inches in 1934. Similar snow supplies cover all the Whitman forest and eastern Oregon peaks and hold rich promise for the coming summer.

The latest measurement at Crater lake was 152 inches of snow, compared with 128 inches in 1935 at this time and only 31 inches in dry 1934. The snow should prove a font of wealth both for the Rogue river valley on the west and the Klamath district on the other side of the divide.

No recent measurements have been made at the Cascade summit between Eugene and Bend. However on January 31 the snow was 72 inches deep, a mark not reached in 1935 until after the snowy month of February.

More snow is being added almost daily to the bountiful supplies now hugging the high slopes.

LADDER BACK IN LIMELIGHT. TRENTON, N. J., Feb. 27 (AP)—The ladder allegedly used by Bruno Richard Hauptmann in the Lindbergh kidnap-plot today in efforts of private investigators to prove the crime has not been completely solved.

From an authoritative source it was learned two investigators have asserted "proof" that part of the evidence linking the condemned Hauptmann to the ladder was "framed" and that a report of this will be made shortly to Gov. Harold G. Hoffman.

The same source said the investigators claimed they were able to show through violet ray tests, that four nail holes in joists in Hauptmann's Bronx attic-holes which the state contended matched four holes in "rail 16" of the ladder—were made about the time of Hauptmann's arrest.
