Shavian Wit Fails

As Charlie Chaplin

Keeps Him Waiting

HONOLULU, Feb. 27. (UP)—Charlie Chaplin kept George Bernard Shaw waiting 25 minutes for a luncheon Wednesday, an indignity that left the sharp-tongued celebrity sputtering volubly but to small avail.

Shaw walked sedately out of the Royal Hawaiian hotel to keep an engagement with the comedian.

When Chaplin failed to appear promptly, Shaw began walking up and down. A crowd of tourists gathered.

Shaw glared. The tourists gaped. He walked faster. The tourists' mouths dropped lower.

In desperation he called a taxi. Glancing at his watch from time to time, "QRS" took up a doubletime march beside the cab. Still the tourists gaped.

Finally he hopped into the cab and left word that he would meet Chaplin at the cafe they had selected for their luncheon.

Charlie eventually strolled out of the hotel, his white hair crisply unfrayed, and entirely at ease. After inquiring his way to the cafe he leisurely made his way there, and sat down with Shaw without offering any apology for his tardiness.

Reporters who later talked with Shaw agreed that his usual cold steel wit and sarcasm had come off second best against Charlie's nonchalant treatment.

CITY SUED BY RIVER ANGLERS

PORTLAND, Feb. 27. (UP)—Columbia river commercial fishermen seeking to end pollution of the Columbia and Willamette rivers Wednesday filed their first action against a municipality.

The complaint, signed by Arvid Mattson, secretary of the Columbia River Fishermen's Protective association, named the city of St. Helens and was filed in Columbia county.

Co-defendants were the Fir-Tex Insulating Board company and the St. Helens Pulp and Paper company.

A permanent injunction preventing the city from further contaminating the river with a domestic sewer system is asked.

The suit is the first of many to be brought against municipalities of both streams from Astoria to Cottage Grove. Mattson emphasized. It supplements 17 injunction suits against industrial concerns now pending in federal court here.

The suit today declared that spawning salmon on their way upstream are killed in large numbers by chemical and domestic wastes which destroy the oxygen content of the water; that fingerling salmon on their way to the sea from the spawning beds are killed by lack of food caused by deposits of pollution on the river bottom which destroy marine life on which the fingerling feed.

Gill nets are rotted by chemicals. Industrial wastes, the fishermen charge.

An end to pollution to save the \$25,000,000 salmon industry, the complaint avers, because fishways to be constructed at Bonneville dam are of doubtful value and the dam will soon become a barrier to the salmon runs. New spawning grounds must be made.

National and Local Markets

CONSTRUCTION TRADE LEADS PACIFIC COAST

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 27. (UP)—Getting off to an unusually swift start, the heavy construction industry established a lead over other major divisions of far western economic activity in the early weeks of this year.

That, in effect, is the announcement of the Federal Reserve bank of San Francisco.

Contract awards for public works, the statement said, "were the greatest in January since April 1933." That month, incidentally, was the banner month in far western history.

Sales of new automobiles were reported "higher than in any January since 1929," and petroleum production "was at the highest level in five years" but had declined sharply this month under voluntary curb.

All around business was described as "relatively well maintained." Industrial production declined less than usual in January and kept well ahead of last year. Building, receded in total amount, but residential construction and modernization work expanded. Employment surged seasonally in California, but held above the usual decline in Oregon as the lumber industry continued active.

Increased output of Douglas fir and redwood lumber more than offset lower production in the western pine region.

Retail trade kept 3 per cent higher than a year ago.

Intercoastal traffic slackened, but freight carloadings held at the December level, in contrast with the usual January decline. The coastwise seamen's strike diverted considerable lumber handling to the rails. Agricultural prices held relatively even.

DECLINE QUOTED ON BUTTER MART

PORTLAND, Feb. 27. (UP)—Declines of 1c to 1 1/2c per pound on butter cubes and 1c per pound for butterfat were made here by the late session of the produce exchange.

Rates were reduced 1c per dozen with lower prices generally on the open market.

More new potatoes arrived, Hawaiians being the latest. Florida stock was still popular, and selling at \$2.75 to \$2.85 per bushel hamper generally.

Further climb in Mexican tomatoes prices was shown here with latest arrivals selling to \$4.75, a sheer rise from \$3.50 a few days ago. There is better quality now being offered.

More Roseburg cauliflower was arriving, with quality slightly better. Sales of 2s are generally around \$1.75 per crate, with 1s in a limited way to \$1.90.

Asparagus were down, selling around 60c per dozen.

Carload peas in hampers in from Pima and of quality. Priced around \$3.25 for 28s for No. 1 grade.

Old potatoes and onions about steady.

Fancy Utah type and bleached celery being offered from south, with prices a trifle lower.

PRICES HIGHER FOR MAY WHEAT

CHICAGO, Feb. 27. (UP)—Higher on May wheat but lower on new crop months, July and September, formed the rule in late dealing today.

A feature was purchases of May against sales of deferred months. The fact that low temperatures were less severe today than many traders had expected and that there was a let-up in dust storms were basis for selling off of July and September.

What closed irregular, 3/4 off to 3/4 up compared with yesterday's finish, May \$1.00 1/4-1/2, July 91 1/4-1/2, corn at 1/4 decline to 1/4 advance, May 60 1/2, oats unchanged, and provisions varying from 2 cents setback to 10 cents gain.

RAILROADS REPORT PICKUP

NEW YORK, Feb. 27. (UP)—A substantial pickup in the railroad earnings for January was indicated today in statements of the first 33 reporting carriers.

Their net operating income showed a gain of 42.9 per cent over January. The aggregate was \$25,343,473 against \$17,732,272.

Gross income was up 12.5 per cent, with totals of \$176,703,401, compared with \$126,927,712.
