### Tulelake Students Would Drop Athletic Relations With Klamath High School

The principals of Klamath Union and Tulelake high schools agreed Friday morning that it would be in the best athletic interests to discontinue games between the two schools until some future date.

As long as student and spectator feeling was at such an uncontrollable point, they considered it necessary to call a halt until previous incidents had been forgotten.

Both principals expressed mutual regrets over the situation and agreed that the fault was about equal on both sides.

The executive committee of the Tulelake high school student body Friday recommended discontinuing athletic relations with Klamath Union high school.

The action, although not representing any formal expression of sentiment by school officials, urged that athletic contests be dropped "for the period of one year, longer if necessary."

The incident is believed an aftermath of the Klamath Pelicans-Tulelake basketball game here on Wednesday night. Tulelake won, 31 to 27. A minor disturbance

among students and spectators occurred after the contest.

Lloyd Emery, Klamath principal, said Friday that the school regretted any misunderstanding developing out of the game. The high school, he said, played the game with good intentions, following Tulelake's request.

The Pelicans, an A division school in the Oregon high school athletic association, rarely schedule contests with B class institutions.

Tulelake is the regularly scheduled opponent of the Klamath Wildcats. Some difficulty arose during the basketball season and the Wildcats had trouble filling their agreement due to the understanding that road conditions into the Tulelake country were such that it was inadvisable to travel.

When the Wildcats did play at Tulelake, it is alleged here that the air was released from the tires of the school bus.

The Pelicans, playing a heavy schedule with district three rivals and members of the Southern Oregon conference, accepted the contest with Tulelake as an expression of good faith toward that school.

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### BEAVERS NEED WIN TONIGHT

Oregon State Seeks Victory Over Webfoots in Hoop Race.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 28. (AP)—The Oregon State basketball quintet, defending champions of the northern division Pacific coast conference, looked longingly toward another title today.

Two barriers—one formidable and the other previously unbeatable—remained in the way, the University of Oregon and the University of Washington.

Huskies Have Two Left The Beavers will attack the first barrier here tonight. A win would further increase the possibility, growing late, that the Staters might edge out the Washington Huskies for the northern championship. A loss would remove all hope of other than a tie to throw the race into a playoff.

The Beavers have won nine games and lost four, with three to go. The Huskies have won 11 and lost three, with but two to go and both of them against Oregon State, other northern division quintets are out of the picture as far as the title is concerned.

Oregon State has won twice and lost once to the team it meets tonight. No love is lost athletically between Oregon's two leading schools and it is a safe bet the university five will throw everything it has in an attempt to dim the Beavers' title chances.

Oregon Team Unchanged The Beavers were given no more than a mathematical chance at the top rung until Idaho and Washington State topped the Huskies three games. But the picture has altered and Coach "Slats" Gill is finding his early-season prediction coming true.

Weeks ago he commented that no team stays the same, that the Huskies appeared to be so good they could get no better and therefore must slip, and that Oregon State was still on the road up. How well his views finally will be carried out will determine the title.

Gill announced Palmberg and Tuttle will start at forwards. Conking at center and Bergstrom and Folen at guards. Palmberg leads the division in scoring.

Coach Howard Hobson of the University of Oregon said he probably would start the same five which put up a spectacular but losing game against the Beavers last week, including Liebowitz and Silver at forward, Patterson at center, and Jones and Rourke at guards.
