Members of the county board appeared to shy from the federal assistance part of the program, favoring rather an independent organization under state law.

Returns to Tulake—Clifford Shuck has returned to his home in Tulake from the Hillsdale hospital.

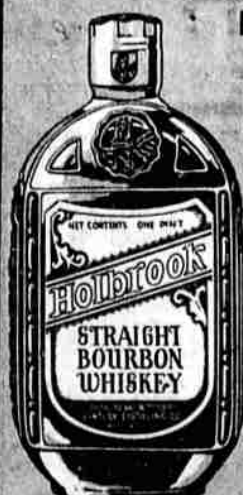
At Yreka—Attorney David R. Vandenberg made a business trip to Yreka Thursday.
