Chile Frustrates Attempt to Seize Control of Army

SANTOAGO, Chile, Feb. 29. (UP)—The government Friday frustrated an attempt by a group of civilians and former army officers, led by ex-Captain Eusebio Peheler, to seize control of the army and possibly the government. Fifteen ringleaders were arrested.

The planned coup was staged at noon when the group entered the war office, opposite the Palacio de la Moneda, and took control of army headquarters. The plan was to capture General Oscar Novoa, commander in chief, but he had already left the building.

The rebels remained in control of headquarters until arrival of a group of traffic policemen who aided in arresting them.

The government had been forewarned of the plot, set a trap and awaited the arrival of the group. No effort was made to apprehend them until they had entered the war office.

Guards had been strategically posted and as soon as the rebels were inside the guards blocked escape.

ENFORCEMENT OF JUVENILE LAW PLANNED

Juvenile Officer Carl Cook declared Saturday that he plans vigorous enforcement of the new ordinance passed by the city council with the purpose of keeping minors out of places where alcoholic beverages are sold.

Cook said that he will arrest any person under 21 years of age going into these establishments and attempting to purchase liquor.

"If I find that the minor was permitted to enter the place without being honestly questioned by the owner I am going to wear out a warrant for the owner, and I will make every effort to have his license revoked by the state liquor commission."

The new ordinance makes it possible to punish minors attempting to purchase liquor, as well as including the Knox law restriction against selling to minors.

"I believe in placing some responsibility upon the young people," said Cook. "As it is, the proprietor has no protection against minors who lie to him about their age. There are youngsters who look older than they are, and if they prevaricate about their age, the business man may be fooled."

Cook said that the fact that minors are found in so-called "beer joints" will, in most instances, be cause enough to justify action.

"I must say in fairness that many boys and girls have taken advice about going into these places and attempting to buy beer or wine," said Cook. "Also some of the proprietors. But I have had cooperation from am through warning and talking. If any one thinks I am not going to enforce this ordinance, he is badly mistaken."

Famed Pilot Scans Arctic Wastes for Girl on Long Mush

PRINCE GEORGE, B. C., Feb. 29. (UP)—Pilot Joe Crosson, seeking traces of Mary Joyce, 27-year-old roadhouse proprietor, missing in the northern wilderness with a dog team and an Indian guide, took off from Prince George late Friday for Whitehorse, Y. T.

Earlier Crosson, who last summer flew the bodies of his friends, Wiley Post and Will Rogers, from Point Barrow, Alaska, to Seattle, piloted his new plane here from Loon lake, Wash., near Spokane, in three hours.

Mrs. Joyce started early in the winter to "mush" from her hunting lodge at Taku, Alaska, to Fairbanks. She has not been heard from since she left Burwash Landing, Y. T., February 9, and was six days overdue at Tanana Crossing, Alaska. It was thought stormy weather might have delayed her.

Mrs. Joyce had a five-dog team, pulling a sled loaded with supplies, and was accompanied by Jimmy Allen, an Indian guide.

Joe Kimsey, Linkville constable who has announced his candidacy for the democratic nomination for sheriff, on Saturday outlined his platform and the background of experience which he believes qualifies him for the office.

Kimsey was in one sheriff's office in Colorado for 14 years. He served two years as deputy under Sheriff Burt Hawkins in Klamath county. For three years he served with the state livestock theft prevention bureau. He is now in his second term as constable.

"If I am elected," said Kimsey, "I will give Klamath county an economical service as is

compatible with maintenance of efficiency in the office. I will employ efficient office help. As for the employment of relatives, I have none in this part of the county."

"My ideas are that the laws are not applicable to only certain individuals, but that they are made for everybody. I will handle their enforcement with that in mind."

"I solicit any investigation of my character and my past record. I intend to campaign vigorously for the nomination, and, if nominated, for election as sheriff. But that does not mean I am going into a mud-slinging campaign. If I had to do that, I wouldn't run. I am going to make a hard, clean campaign."
