

Malin Mustangs Capture County Hoop Title

Tribute To Malin's Coach

Roland Parks Turns Out Consistent Winners at South End School. Good Coaching, Excellent Training Bring Championships to Mustangs.

Good coaching, combined with excellent conditioning has made Malin the most consistent winner in Klamath county high school athletics.

Simply because he is coaching at Malin, a school little known outside of the county, has not been handicapped at Roland Parks in establishing an outstanding record. Malin has been a dominant team, both in football and basketball, for many seasons.

Malin finished the Klamath-Siskiyou conference in fourth place behind Chiloquin, Tulelake and Bonanza. The Mustangs had a record of five victories and three defeats.

A basketball team that has trained rigidly and learned the fundamentals gets stronger as the season progresses. Malin did just that, and when it went against Chiloquin in the finals last Saturday night, it was playing its best ball of the year.

Malin's showing every season is a tribute to the coaching leadership of Parks.

Klamath county will have some strong representation at the B district tournament in Astoria this coming week end. Victory for one of the Klamath teams would send it to Salem for the state championships.

Parks did not know Saturday whether or not his team would enter. Now, however, since the county title has been acquired, it is very possible Malin will be right in the fight.

Chiloquin and Merrill have both expressed their intentions of entering. Bonanza, too, may play.

Unbeaten League Teams Strive to Maintain Records

CHILOQUIN'S TEAM BEATEN

Merrill Gains Consolation Pennant From Klamath Wildcats.

Malin high school, displaying some of the most finished ball handling seen here this year and shacking its opponent with a tricky zone defense, defeated Chiloquin 21-17 on the high school court Saturday night, to win the Klamath county B division basketball tournament.

Merrill won the consolation championship from the Wildcats, walloping the Klamath Falls team, 27 to 16.

No Question of Victory There was never any question about Malin's victory. The Mustangs flashed from the opening whistle to take a 5-1 lead at the quarter. Whenever they got the ball, they got a shot; and usually when they got a shot, they made a basket.

Chiloquin, on the other hand, decidedly went nowhere during the entire first half. The boys from the reservation city scored only four points during the opening periods, and two of those were made on gift throws. Meanwhile Malin was running up a 13-point total.

In the second half, Chiloquin appeared finally to solve the zone defense and came from a long way behind to wind up only four points behind Malin. The Mustangs, already confident of victory, eased in, satisfied with merely maintaining a safe lead.

Harry Hundley, Malin forward, led the scoring with 12 points. Giles tallied nine to head the Chiloquin list.

It was understood Saturday night that both Malin and Chiloquin would enter the district B school tournament at Astoria next weekend. Winner of the Astoria tournament will advance to state title play at Salem later in the month.

Merrill Wins Easily Merrill's consolation victory over the Wildcats, led by Wilbur Haskins who scored 10 points, was an easy one. The Wildcat attack never did get well underway, and Merrill threw in a second team in the last half to make the game a fair match.

Score at halftime was 19 to 5. Dudley and Bellotti, with four points apiece, turned in the best scoring performances for the losers.

Reber Individual Star Recapitulation of game scores at the close of the tournament showed Ehle Reber of Malin as high scorer for the meet with 32 points in three games.

Sixteen Strongest Teams in Oregon Will Enter Big Event.

By the Associated Press High school basketball teams will drop by the wayside thick and fast the next two weeks, leaving 16 outstanding teams to enter the state tournament.

Salem, host team, and Ashland, Southern Oregon league winner, already have qualified for entrance to the basketball battle royal at Willamette university March 18 to 21. Corvallis high is as good as in, needing only a league win over one of two teams previously defeated.

Portland Race Tight Ashland clinched tournament entrance honors by defeating Grants Pass 28 to 8 the past week, while Corvallis eliminated its only serious rival with a 31 to 20 victory over Eugene.

This week will determine Portland's two entrants, except in case of a tie. Benson was favored to defeat both Commerce and Lincoln and repeat as Portland champion. Franklin was favored to whip Lincoln and Roosevelt to be the runner-up and second tournament entrant from Portland. Both Benson and Franklin beat Jefferson last week to stay at the top.

It just won't seem like the same old state tournament without Astoria high there, but rough sailing lies ahead before the Fishermen can qualify. St. Helens' team of six-forties beat Astoria 35 to 30 the past week and is given a slight edge over the Fishermen in the district tournament.

Roseburg May Win Out The Fishermen are marvelous tournament players, but a point for St. Helens in the tournament will be on its floor instead of on the immense Astoria court as usual.

Hood River defeated The Dalles 46 to 24 to even their district semi-final playoff series at one each. The Dalles won the first game 36 to 23. The winner of tonight's game meets Milton-Freewater for the right to go to the state meet. Mac high wins over Pendleton.

A possible new face at the state tournament is Roseburg which defeated Marshfield 23 to 20 to tie up the Coos-Douglas race.

Tillamook defeated McMinnville 29 to 24 to remain slight favorite to win the district six tournament. La Grande was a slight favorite to beat Baker and smaller schools for the district one title.

Klamath Falls probably will nose Bend out in district three. Milwaukie and Gresham are district four standouts.

It's hard to pick the B winners, for the B teams are so much more numerous than A teams, and only four district champions will be crowned. Admittedly taking in too much territory in attempting selections, here's how it looks:

Pleasant Hill, one-time tournament winner, and Bellfountain are standouts in the sixteenth district, comprising the upper Willamette valley.

Falls City and Mill City, last year's district winner, are among outstanding B teams in district 15, northwestern Oregon.

The southwestern Oregon entrant to the state tournament will be the winner of the southern Oregon Normal school invitational tournament this week.

Myrtle Creek, Glendale, Gardiner (last year's winner), Malin, Chiloquin and Merrill are among the better known entrants, but no telling what will happen when

Olympic Hoop Tourney Set for Northwest

PULLMAN, Wash., March 2. (AP)—J. Fred Gohler, northwest of the Olympic games basketball elimination, has announced the Pacific coast representative will be determined at a four-team tournament in Seattle March 26 and 27.

The Washington State college athletic director said the champions of the northern and southern division of the Pacific coast conference will qualify automatically for the Seattle tournament. Open tournaments will be held in both north and south to select a second team in each district.

Bohler said the northwest tournament for Washington, Oregon, Idaho and western Montana, will be held at Corvallis March 13 and 14. Entries must be in Bohler's hands by March 4. The southwest district tournament will include California, Arizona and Nevada. Bohler did not announce where it would be held.

The winner of the Pacific coast honors at Seattle will go to the Olympic tryouts at New York April 3-6.

Bohler said freshmen and fourth year competitors will not be eligible for the tournament under the governing collegiate rules. He said the rule had discouraged entry by some of the smaller schools.

Bend and Klamath will be the leading contenders for the championship. A number of smaller schools are entered but unless an upset occurs none is considered a match for the Pelicans or the Lava Bears.

The daring Portlander wove between the flags down the half mile course at breakneck speed to gain the combined two-day championship with a perfect score of 200.

Second in the two-day combined points was Paul (Sonny) Seava, Jr., who placed third in the slalom event after taking eighth Saturday in the downhill meet. Seava is from the Washington Ski club of Seattle.

Hans Grage, also of the Washington ski club, followed Havam in second place among the slalom entrants, to pick up enough points for third ranking in the combined championships.

Top honors in the women's events went to a hard-riding, 16-year-old Seattle girl named Dorothy Hingham of the Washington Ski club. She took first place in the Slalom event after winning the downhill competition Saturday. She gained 200 for a perfect score.
