QUINTS ENTER 2 TOURNEYS

Klamath, Malin, Bonanza, Chiloquin, Merrill in Running.

This week, tournament time for the high schools of Oregon, will see five Klamath county teams begin the final fight for entrance into the state tournament at Salem.

Chief of these teams and the one team considered to have the easiest path is Klamath Falls. The Pelicans go to Bend Friday and Saturday to settle the issue for District 3.

It is not known just what teams will be entered, but there is no doubt but what the fight will be between the Pelicans and the Lava Bears of Bend.

Malin, champion of the Klamath county B division, will be the section's leading representative in the B district tournament opening Thursday at Ashland.

The winner of this elimination will be entered in the state finale at Salem. Chiloquin, runner-up to Malin, has also decided to enter the Ashland event. Merrill, consolation winner, and Bonanza are also understood to have sent in their entry blanks.

Big League Ball May Be Extended To Pacific Coast

LOS ANGELES, March 3. (AP)—Ford C. Frick, president of the national league, foresees the inclusion of Los Angeles and possibly San Francisco, in major league baseball within a few years.

The young executive, here on a vacation tour, pointed out that Cincinnati had flown its players to Puerto Rico for training and has hired a special plane to transport 60 men back for the season opening.

"This action indicates baseball owners are gaining confidence in plane travel," Frick commented. "Before long they will be equally willing to fly regularly to the coast. Or perhaps streamlined trains will be equally rapid for the purpose."

"In any event, the Pacific coast is rapidly becoming fertile ground for major league operation. I feel sure the time is coming when both circuits will see the wisdom of extending to this section of the country."

Bandits Hold Up Hollywood Bank, Make Rich Haul

HOLLYWOOD, March 3. (UP)—Two bandits, armed with machine guns, forced their way into a Hollywood branch of the Bank of America Monday, lined customers and employees against the wall and fled with \$10,000 cash, according to police reports.

The holdup was accomplished with speed and precision, almost at the moment the bank closed.

Two of three bandits were inside the bank before anyone was aware of their presence. While one of the gang trained a machine gun on bank employees and customers lined against a wall, the second scooped ready cash from the teller's cages.

Wilson's sensational finish last week against Chick makes him a favorite over Rogers. The former Washington fullback nearly upset the cowboy in the closing minutes with a Sonnenberg attack.

Rogers, wrestling here for the first time, is regarded as one of the most scientific performers on the coast.
