

Chiloquin Continues Championship March

Going to Bat for the Sportsman

Wildlife Institute Works Against Diversion of Funds.

Long-suffering fishermen and hunters, who have stood by helplessly for years watching politicians divert the money from their license fees into road building, agricultural activities to suppress the bean beetle, and maybe their own pockets, are due to get a break soon.

The reason is that the American Wildlife Institute is going to bat for the outdoorsman in a big way—with the intimation that it's going to be the political knell for any public officer who seeks application of these funds for anything other than for conservation and propagation.

Probably more big names than in any other organization are among the leading lights of this association. Behind it is a wealth of millions, and every dollar is ready to be put on the line to get better fishing and hunting, and preserve those sports for posterity.

Glancing over the roster, one finds such men as Thomas H. Beck, president of Crowell Publishing Co.; Walter P. Chrysler, of Chrysler Motors; R. J. Reynolds, of tobacco fame; Powell Croyle, Jr., president of the Cincinnati Reds and radio manufacturer; Frederick Ewing, oil man; K. R. Kingsbury, of Standard Oil; and others equally influential and wealthy.

Such men as these are not giving their time to a project to which there attaches any prospect of failure. They're putting on the heat in federal and state circles where it will do the most good, and Nimrod and Waltonians are going to be better off for their action.

Plan of campaign of the Institute includes five points:

- 1.—To work with federal, state, and other agencies for preservation and restoration of forests, fish, animals, and birds.

- 2.—To serve as an advisory and co-ordinating organization to unify any further work of independent groups.

- 3.—To observe and protect interests of sportsmen through suggestion and promotion of methods for making wild life more plentiful, thereby avoiding the further depletion which would inevitably result in more drastic control and restriction of hunting and fishing.

- 4.—To initiate and assist movements designed to help nature in her normal process of replenishing forests and wild life.

- 5.—The Institute has no membership dues. It expects that all outdoorsmen will become associates by virtue of moral support and pressure brought to bear on political figures.

In the latter point there is plenty of power. There are nearly 8,000,000 licensed fishermen in this country, and about the same number of licensed hunters. These men, grouped into one solid unit, could exert powerful voting strength.

It isn't going to be very long before the sentiment of anglers and hunters will be felt in state and national elections.

Woods and waters have become a great asset to states in the last decade or two. Those states that have good fishing and hunting have reaped rich revenue from tourists who spend millions in vacationing in spots where they can indulge in their favorite outdoor sports.

Year after year these natural resources have been drained, due to lack of funds to replant, restock, and conserve. Left uncared, this condition might result in leaving forests and waters sadly depleted.

It appears that this calamity is to be avoided through the influence of the American Wildlife Institute. It's up to the hunters and fishermen to get behind and push.
