

GOVERNOR WILL STUDY PROGRAM FOR PENSIONS

SALEM, March 5 (AP)—Governor Martin left for Portland today to meet with Elmer R. Goudy, state relief administrator, to pass upon the final draft of the state's proposal for funds to match federal old age pension money.

Goudy was here earlier today and presented his program to both the governor and the attorney general, but neither one would make public the plan until final approval is given by the state relief committee and the governor later in the day.

Governor Martin said that final draft of the program will be taken to Washington by Goudy some time this week in an effort to gain approval of the federal government to enable Oregon to obtain old age pension funds.

The proposal was worked out after the defeat of the sales tax at the special election which was to have raised funds for old age pensions and which would have been matched by the federal government. The defeat left the state without old age pension funds other than that outlined in the original 1935 act, under which the state and counties were operating but which was declared insufficient to match federal money.

Should this proposal fail some persons predict the necessity of calling a special session of the legislature, if the state is to take advantage of the federal assistance. Others believe the government may match the funds on other basis. This will be determined by Goudy on his trip to the national capital.

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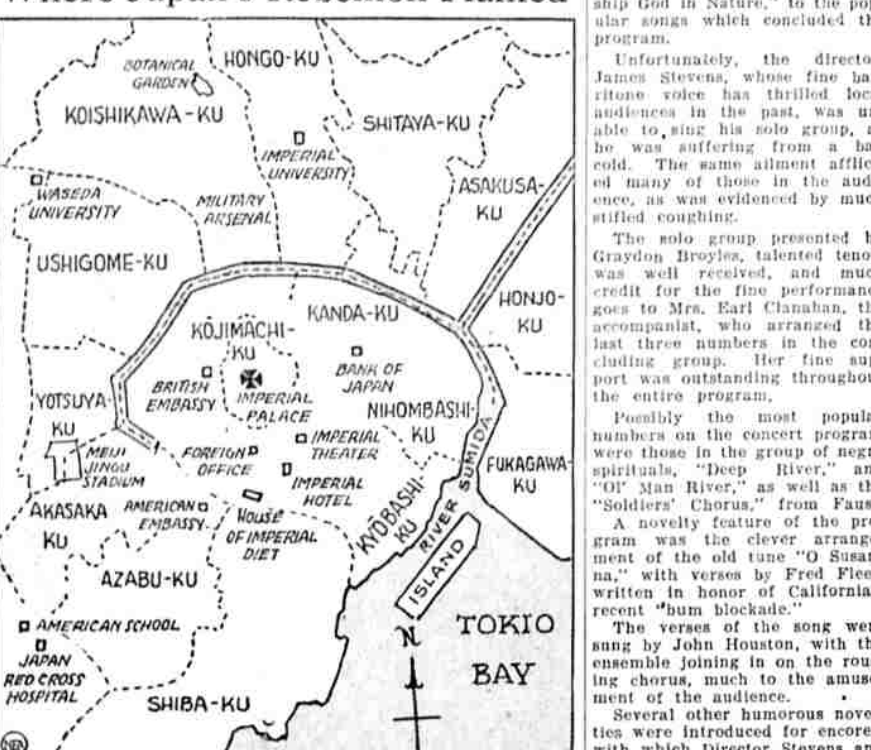

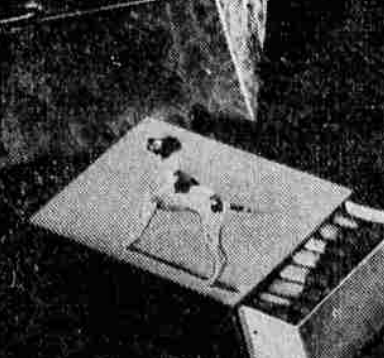

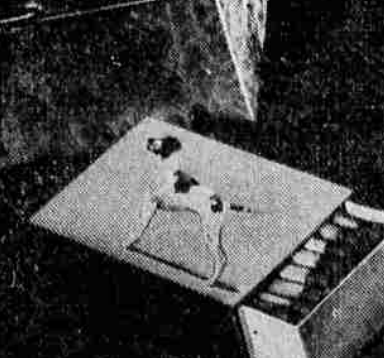

SENATOR BORAH OPENS DRIVE UPON TRUSTS

WASHINGTON, March 5 (AP)—In cooperation with Democrat Senator Van Nuys of Indiana, Senator Borah of Idaho, candidate for the republican presidential nomination, today took the first step in his "trust busting" campaign by urging passage of a bill to end alleged "discrimination" in favor of chain stores.

He and Van Nuys are joint authors of a bill, introduced yesterday, forbidding "any person, engaged in commerce" to make price discriminations through discounts, rebates, allowances.

Borah, who declared a demand for elimination of "monopolistic" practices would be the best issue for republican campaigning, said the bill was aimed at monopoly.

"Yes," he said in response to a question, "the bill is part of the anti-monopoly program."

"They tell me that the big houses give rebates and other allowances to purchasers. That hurts the little merchants who can't buy as much as the chain stores."

Senator Robinson (D-Ark), the majority leader, is author of another bill designed to protect small merchants. This bill has been approved by the senate judiciary committee.

A convention of independent merchants from many sections, which convened here yesterday, continued to work out today plans to curb chain stores.

They were encouraged by speeches of four members of congress yesterday, and hoped that President Roosevelt would be of similar viewpoint when their delegation called on him at noon.

Farmer Acquitted on Murder Charge

SALEM, March 5, (AP)—A circuit court jury early today freed John Kyle, Broadacres farmer, of first degree murder charges for the slaying of Hugh Jean Sloan, his neighbor, on January 2.

After deliberating for 10 hours the jury's verdict was "not guilty." Four verdicts were possible, first degree murder, second degree murder, manslaughter and acquittal.

Throughout the case Kyle admitted the fatal shooting, but said he killed his "best friend" in self defense.

Child From Alaska Shows Improvement

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Restaurant Cook Arrested Here on Larceny Charges

Paul Robert LaSelle, cook in a Klamath Falls cafe, was arrested by state police and lodged at the county jail here Wednesday night on a larceny by bailer warrant issued on complaint of J. V. Kindig, salesman at the Bulek used car lot.

According to Kindig's account of the affair, he "sold" LaSelle a second hand sedan, then permitted him to drive to the bank for money to make the purchase.

Instead of going to the bank, LaSelle allegedly drove to Chiloquin, then on north along the Forest Lumber company road. On the return trip and in a reportedly drunken condition, he is said to have run off the road at its junction with the Sprague River highway.

LaSelle's attempts to regain the road only caused the car to slip back farther, until finally it lodged against the railroad tracks at the foot of the road-bed.

There, according to state police reports, LaSelle abandoned the car and hitchhiked his way back to Klamath Falls.

He was arrested while sleeping in the basement of a house on Sargent street, where he was assertedly a roomer.

LaSelle was arraigned before Justice W. B. Barnes Thursday morning and took time to plead and get an attorney.
