

EX-PRISONERS' RECORDS STUDIED

SALEM, March 5, (UP)—Cases records of prisoners pardoned or paroled from the state penitentiary during the last seven years are being studied as part of a national survey being conducted by the United States attorney general's office.

J. M. Brown, who is in charge of the survey in Oregon, Washington and Idaho, conferred with Governor Martin and Warden James Lewis on the study, which will be started immediately.

The attorney general's office is conducting the nation-wide project with a view to recommending uniformity in laws relating to criminal procedure in the several states, according to Brown.

The United States has been divided into 11 regions for the survey. Two departments of justice men, the director and supervisor, who is a statistician, are assigned to each project. The detailed work of the survey will be done by WPA workers.

The study of pardons and paroles is only one of many researches into the states' criminal laws contemplated by the department, Brown said.

M'NARY DENIES CCC TRANSFERS

SALEM, March 5, (UP)—CCC camps will not be re-allocated throughout the nation on the basis of population, in the opinion of Senator McNary.

Reports from Washington had said congress was preparing to order the reallocation, which would transfer nearly all of Oregon's camps to more populous eastern states.

McNary's wife, in answer to pleas of Oregon citizens for retention of the CCC program on its present basis to protect Oregon's timber resources, was as follows:

"Conferred with forest service and director of conservation corps, and am confident that no allocation will be made on a basis of population. Am very hopeful there will be only slight reduction in number of Oregon camps to meet general demand for entertainment throughout entire country.

"Later, should there be any attempt to invoke population on basis of CCC camp allocation) will fight it vigorously."
