

# LIBEL SUIT DEFENDANTS FILE DENIAL

gives a resume of his arguments before the jury, and admits that he said the "actions of the plaintiff were no more than those of a mind sick from use of narcotics." He says, however, that he was commenting on the testimony and its probative force as was his privilege, and he denies malicious motives and all conspiracy charges.

Radio station KFJI and its manager, George Kincaid, filed their answer also through Gannon. After making general denials of certain parts of the allegations in the Irwin complaint, the answer pointed out as a separate defense that the radio station is a lawful corporation, federally licensed, serving the public of Klamath Falls and Klamath county.

It cited the situation that existed at the time of the Meyerle trial, and said that large numbers wishing to attend and hear said trial could not do so because of the size of the courtroom. The radio station, the answer said, was requested by many persons to broadcast the proceedings.

During the trial, the answer said, the radio carried an accurate report of the proceedings, without attempting to color them, and at the close broadcast directly from the courtroom the closing arguments of attorneys on both sides and the court's instructions.

The radio station answer made allegations concerning Mrs. Irwin's testimony.

Judge Ashurst's answer, filed by Arthur Schapp and Henry Perkins, attorneys, called attention to the first radio broadcast from a courtroom, with Judge Wilson of The Dalles on the bench.

Judge Wilson presided at the Horace Manning murder trial here in the spring of 1934. George Kincaid and station KFJI were allowed to broadcast prosecution and defense summations in that case.

In consequence, Ashurst's answer affirmed "that the said Fred Wilson is an eminent jurist in said state of Oregon, with a reputation for honesty, integrity and learning; and relying upon the precedent established in Klamath county by said jurist, this defendant informed the said George Kincaid that he had no objection to said installation (of broadcasting equipment), if he obtained the consent of the district attorney and the attorney for defendant."

No thought of injury Ashurst also alleged that he did not discuss with either the prosecutor or with Attorney David R. Vandenberg what either expected to say during the trial or in his address to the jury, and that "he did not have any knowledge of what the said David R. Vandenberg would say to the jury."

He said that he had no interest in the murder case except to give the defendant a fair and

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six cents, and besides you think of it as a part of the price of cigarettes.

Every time you buy a new automobile, you contribute something like \$100 to the government (more or less, depending on the price of your car) but you don't realize you are paying it, thinking of it as a part of the price of the car. It is the same with gasoline taxes.

**CIGARETTE TAXES**, gasoline taxes, theater and other amusement ticket taxes, automobile taxes, etc., are a definite tax, levied by government and added to the price of the article. You can compute all of them, if you'll take the trouble.

But in a larger sense, ALL taxes are added to the price of what you buy, because they are a part of the cost of doing business and MUST be added to the selling price or those who are engaged in business will go broke.

The higher the taxes the higher prices must be, and the higher prices are the less our money will buy.

**A LOT OF US**, whose direct taxes are not too terribly burdensome, fall into the habit of thinking of money spent by government as manna from heaven that does everybody good and costs nobody anything.

That isn't true. Taxes enter into the cost of everything we buy, and if taxes are too high PRICES will be too high.

If prices are too high, wages can't go far enough.

Strike moves were marked by comparative peace. Disorders decreased, although four men were arrested in the Bronx on a charge of damaging two apartment buildings.

The main strike, that of building workers called last Sunday by the Building Service Employees union, progressed slowly, with strike leaders withholding their threats to "pull" elevator operators and other workers in the Grand Central zone, district of many of the city's tallest buildings.

The report from the British minister stated that Melley said Italian planes had flown over the Red Cross unit on many occasions, not only at Quorum but when it was on its way there from Waldia.

"It is most obvious," said an authoritative source close to the government, "that the Italians knew what the unit was."

This source added that late in January the British embassy in Rome was instructed to tell the Italians that Melley's unit was proceeding from Dessye to Waldia and from there to Quorum.

WASHINGTON, March 6, (AP)—Testimony that Henry L. Doherty, head of the Cities Service company, made a profit of \$18,000,000 by selling 200,000 shares of company securities in March, 1929, was received today by the senate lobby committee.

The sale was made, testimony showed, just before employees of the system were "invited" to buy the concern's issues on the installment plan.

Robert Burns, Cities Service counsel, was the witness. He said the sale was made at the importings of Doherty's associates that his holdings be made "liquid" in the event of his death, explaining the utility leader had been so ill since 1926 that his life had "been despaired of."
