

PETERS AFFILIATED WITH MUSIC GROUP

Z. Peters has announced his affiliation with the First National Institute of Allied Arts of South Bend, Indiana, a national institution teaching music in 46 states and more than 1200 cities.

In taking over his duties of teacher for the institute, Peters feels that he brings to Klamath Falls and vicinity a new opportunity for the development of the study of music.

Peters is well qualified for the work, having studied under some of the finest teachers of music in the United States and Europe, among whom are Hother Wanner and Antonio De Grazi. Peters is an accredited teacher and is well known to the people of Klamath Falls through his pupils who have appeared in several recitals and musicals throughout the city. Many will recall that at one time he had charge of the orchestra in the old Opera House.

The First National Institute of Allied Arts is the largest and most soundly established organization of its kind in the world and has one of the most modern methods of teaching known to the music world of today, using illustrations, pictures, characters, and games to incite the interest of its students. As this is a copyrighted method, Peters will be the only teacher in this vicinity to teach it. In addition the institute has a plan whereby a limited number of students will be given instruments free of charge.

W. Arthur Erskine, J. F. Dunn, Mrs. Dunn, Finis Tyers, John C. Jones, Mrs. Jones, J. E. Kalliff, D. B. Sanders, Dick Tebbets and Carl Harman of the institute will be in Klamath Falls for the next few weeks assisting Prof. Peters in organizing the classes.

News of Oregon

FOREST GROVE, Ore., March 6. (AP)—Funeral services for Joseph Lankton Carter, 91-year-old Oregon native, were to be held here today. He died at the Masonic home yesterday.

Carter was born in 1845 at the Methodist mission founded by Jason Lee a few miles south of the present site of Salem. He served as superintendent of schools at La Grande a few years after graduating in 1868 from Oregon Institute, now Willamette university.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 6. (AP)—Representatives of civic organizations and the Oregon Food and Beverage Dispensers will meet here within two weeks in an effort to formulate a plan to halt sale of beer to minors. It was decided in a session at the courthouse.

Judge C. H. Gilbert of the circuit court, who called yesterday's conference, declared more children are obtaining beer than ever before. The group discussed the possibility of fining minors for attempting to purchase the liquid.

ASTORIA, Ore., March 6. (AP)—Prices for raw salmon for the April 1 commercial fishing season on the Columbia river will be set at a meeting of the Columbia River Fishermen's Protective association March 10, officials of the union announced.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 6. (AP)—Portland's population increased 1,450 over the same period a year ago, the new city directory indicated today. The director set the population at 316,511.

ASTORIA, Ore., March 6. (AP)—A meeting will be held here March 12 to discuss proposed improvements to the channel of the Columbia river, Col. T. M. Robins of the United States engineers announced.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 6. (AP)—Mrs. John Vuckell lost a race with the stock here. She was en route to a hospital when the ambulance aide signalled the driver to stop. A three-pound boy was born just outside the building. The baby was placed in an incubator.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 6. (AP)—The Oregon Humane Society has electrocuted 3,008 dogs in the past 12 months—and there is no indication that the law, Harry Daniel, president, said in refuting statements of veterinarians that 6,000 were killed.

Daniel said 128 "strays" were returned to their owners and homes found for 114. He agreed with veterinarians that owners should be fined for allowing their pets to run loose in violation of the city ordinance.

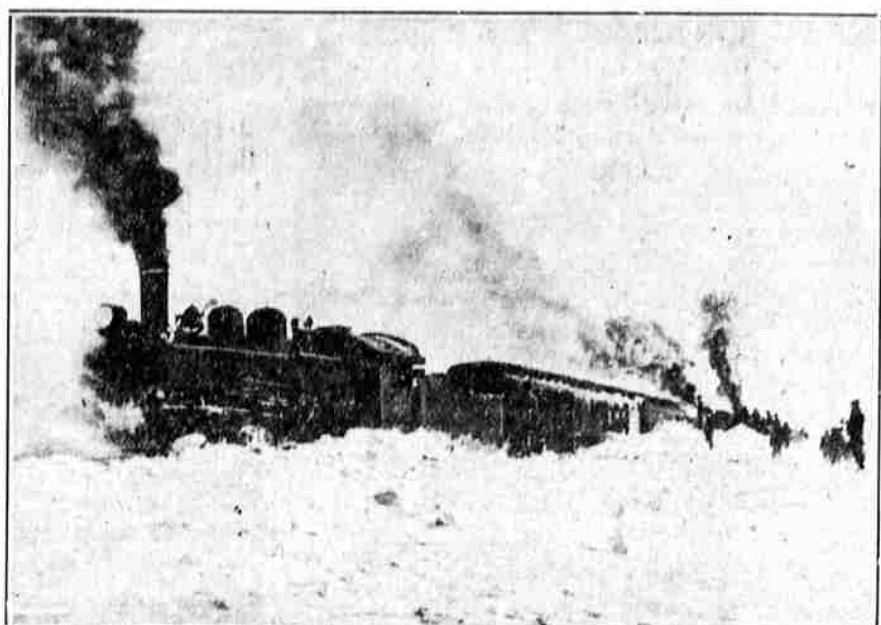

Union's Purse Opened to Aid Finance Strike

CHICAGO, March 6. (AP)—Unlimited financial support was promised for the New York elevator strike Thursday by Jerry Horan, president of the International Union of Building Service Employees.

He sent the following telegram to George Sealie, international vice president, in New York: "Flying from Chicago first thing in the morning with Vice President Gus Van Hook with unlimited funds at our disposal to carry on your grand fight. We must win."

Horan said there was no danger of the New York strike spreading to Chicago.

"Chicago is 100 per cent organized in our field and all flat and apartment hotel janitors are satisfied with the union scale. We are in complete agreement with the Chicago realty board and there has been no talk at all of a sympathetic walkout to aid New York," he said. "I am going to New York merely to aid the cause there."
