Porto Rico in Toils of Political Battle

SAN JUAN, P. R., March 6, (UP)—National guardsmen were mobilized Thursday following arrest by the federal government of Pedro Albizu Campos, nationalist leader, on charges of conspiracy, inciting insurrection, and recruiting forces against the United States.

The nationalist party president surrendered this morning in federal court. Yesterday he warned the United States district attorney that riots and bloodshed would result if he were jailed. He said he would be unable to restrain his followers. He offered to give himself up if he were admitted to bail.
