

TREASURER WILL BID ON BONDS

LAKEVIEW, Ore.—The Lakeview city council at its meeting instructed the town treasurer to bid for, plus accrued interest, for as many of the bonds which are soon to be sold to finance the sewage treatment and disposal plant as the council may have to sell. This move has assured the construction of the project. The government has offered to make a grant of \$10,000 and to buy \$25,000 worth of bonds.

This loan and grant are expected to fall short of the low bid when bids are opened on March 6. The decision of the council to use a sinking fund which was established for another bond issue in order to raise additional cash will make it possible to award the contract on March 6 regardless of whether or not there are any other bidders on the \$40,000 bond issue, the bids for which will be opened on March 14.

The disposal plant contract has created keen interest among contractors. Bids have been received from Klamath Falls, Portland, Boise, Idaho, and Modford.

**Army Engineers
Develop Mighty
Defense Weapon**

WASHINGTON, March 6, U.P.—A powerful mystery gun, so "kickless" that a glass of water balanced safely on the weapon's barrel during bursts of fire, is being developed by the army and navy in another move to make American coastal and strategic interior cities invulnerable to hostile air attack.

The weapon, the United Press learned, combines the best features of the machine gun and of artillery pieces. It is said to be capable of hurling one pound, high explosive shells to the edges of the atmosphere at the rate of 150 shots a minute. The projectiles are fitted in the nose of the bullets with detonating fuses so sensitive that they explode the shells upon contact with any substance harder than the air.

The explosive carried in these projectiles is sufficient to blow the wing off a modern bomber if a wing surface is hit.

Proceeds from the dances will go towards establishing a scholarship fund for women entering the university.

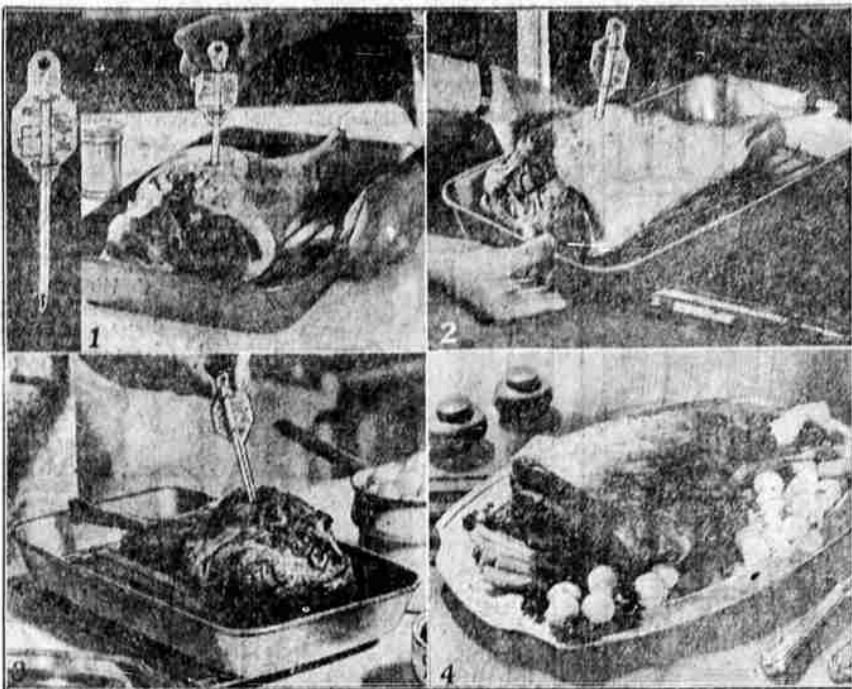
**Stewart-Lenox May

SCIENCE POINTS WAY TO PERFECT ROAST



YES, even Friend Husband can now turn out the perfect roast. The experienced cook has no advantage over the beginner.

All because today roasting meat has become a matter of mechanical precision. A better knowledge of cookery acquired through thorough research, plus the very latest in kitchen gadgets, has put this business of roasting on a scientific basis—and it's as easy as falling off the proverbial log, say the experts.

In the upper left-hand corner of the illustration above is the meat thermometer which plays a big part in this story of roasting, because it eliminates

any uncertainty as to when the roast has reached the proper degree of doneness. The steps in its use are simple, as shown by the pictures.

1. Inserting thermometer in the center of the thick end portion of a lamb roast.
2. Placing roast, with thermometer inserted, in a moderate oven (300°-350° F.).
3. Removing roast from oven when column has reached point marked "Lamb" on metal plate.
4. The perfect roast—a delight to the appetite and to the eye.

Communist Chief Pledges Jobs for All at Big Wages

NEW YORK, March 6, U.P.—Comrade Earl Browder, former Kansas accountant now absolute head of American communists, Thursday pledged everyone jobs paying \$36 to \$230 a week within two months, if a majority vote the communist ticket in the November election.

Browder, dark visaged secretary of the communist party—the same office Joseph Stalin holds in Russia—spoke over a Columbia national network. Columbia gave him five minutes on the air, as part of its policy to so recognize each legally registered political party, despite protests from several sources.

Looks Like Hitler
The communist leader, whose toothbrush mustache and black forelock are reminiscent of Adolf Hitler, proposed a common political front of all workers in a new farm-labor party to accomplish the communist program.

"It would not yet take up the full program of socialism, for which many are not yet prepared," he said. "It would pledge itself to carry out a program of help for everyone already agreed upon."

But his ultimate aim, he stated, is to remake the United States "along the lines of the highly successful Soviet union, on the basis of socialism."

Determined, Thorough
Will this program include violence, confiscation of wealth and bloody revolution, as in Russia? "When we have the support of the majority of the toiling people," Browder said, "we will put that program into effect with the same firmness, the same determination, with which Washington and the founding fathers carried through the revolution that established our country; with the same thoroughness with which Lincoln abolished chattel slavery."

The farmer-labor government proposed by Browder would do these things:

1. When a capitalist closed a factory, the government would reopen the plant and pay union wages.

2. The government would outlaw the "yellow dog" contract and company unions.

Wars Impossible
3. The government would tax the rich to care for the poor.

4. The government would guarantee the equal rights of negroes.
5. The government would provide for the millions of unemployed youth.
6. The government would stop the rising tide of reaction.
7. The government would "drastically remove the dictatorial usurped powers" of the supreme court.
8. The government would make it impossible to drag us into imperialistic war and would join with world peace forces.

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American Dies in Effort to Escape Brazilian Officers

RIO DE JANEIRO, March 6, (U.P.)—Victor Allan Barron, American from the west coast, killed himself or died attempting to escape from police Thursday after he had given information leading to the arrest of Luis Carlos Prestes, Brazil's No. 1 communist and leader of the unsuccessful revolution in the northern provinces last November.

Barron was arrested several days ago in the government's drive on extremists. His passport showed him to have been born in Oregon. His mother lives in Alameda, Cal. He is reported to be the son of Harrison George, communist secret agent.

After learning of Prestes' hide-out, strong detachments of police surrounded the building. The red leader made no resistance when he and a woman companion, said to be his secretary, were arrested. He was taken to police headquarters.

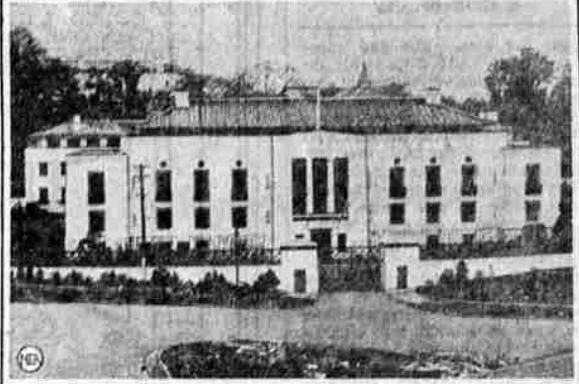
Taking advantage of the excitement over Prestes' arrest, Barron either jumped or fell from the third story of police headquarters. He was killed instantly.
