A series of experiments has been started in Switzerland to determine the movement of glaciers. The tests will last 250 years.

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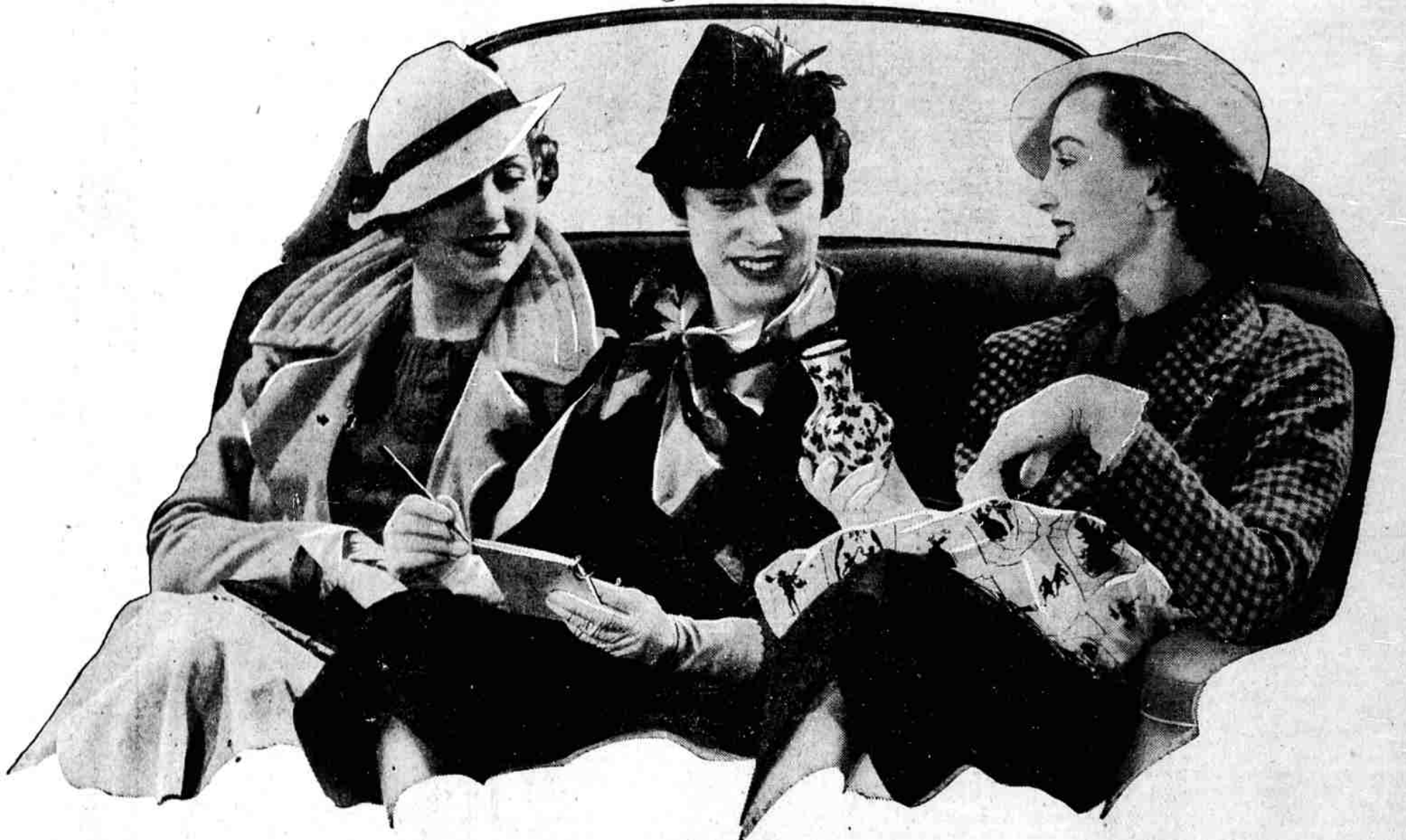
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
