

HITLER SENDS GERMAN ARMY TO BORDERS

Reichstag at the stroke of high noon.

Standing on the rostrum of the Reichstag, at the very moment when some 2,000 troops crossed the historic Rhine and moved into old Cologne, Hitler cried:

"In this historic hour, when in western provinces our reich German troops are moving into their future garrison of peace, we all unite in two holy confessions.

German Equality Sought
"First, in a solemn oath to recede before no power and no force in reestablishing the honor of our people, and to succumb honorably to the heaviest privation, rather than ever capitulate before it.

"Second, in a determination now, more than ever, to help bring about understanding among peoples of Europe, especially among our western peoples and neighbors.

"Thus, after three years, I believe I can consider with today the fight for German equality as concluded."

Before that, Hitler had told the foreign envoys the Rhineland reoccupation by several battalions of the Reichwehr—regular army—would be an unostentatious as possible, a dramatic symbol that Germany at least is free of her bonds of "humiliation."

Soldiers Ready for Work
But with brass band music and anti-aircraft guns, the first detachment marched into Cologne, through narrow streets aflame with waving swastika flags and before a wildly cheering population.

The soldiers had waited for orders at the border of the demilitarized zone throughout the night. In the early morning they moved swiftly into the district. Their first military parade began at 3 p. m., on the square adjacent to the Cologne cathedral.

Der Fuehrer packed into his 2-hour Reichstag speech and diplomatic declaration more action and more proposals than Europe has heard on one occasion for years.

He said:

1. Germany is freed from Locarno because the Franco-Russian treaty violated it.

2. German troops are moving into the demilitarized zone created by the seven-power mutual security pact.

3. Germany is ready to create a new demilitarized territory, provided France and Belgium create one in their territories, too.

4. Germany will sign non-aggression pacts with France and Belgium in the west and with Lithuania in the east providing Lithuania agrees to restore the autonomy of Memel territory.

5. Germany will sign an air pact with her western neighbors and is willing to have Italy and Great Britain guarantee these pacts. Holland, too, may join if it desires.

6. Germany would reconstitute the league of nations if that organization is disassociated with the treaty of Versailles, for with re-entry of troops into the Rhineland and the freeing of all German soil, the reasons for the Reich's withdrawal from Geneva no longer exist.

Last evening, Ray Gillespie, president of the Seaside local Timber Workers' union, called our superintendent by telephone and informed him that the boys had driven the pickets off the job and threatened that he would have enough

pickets on hand this morning to see that the place was properly picketed.

"This morning at 6:15, 150 Timber Workers were out there. Ordinarily we do not operate on Saturday, but the boys drove in—about 35 of them—to do a little repair work. The pickets stoned the cars and some of our boys got out up pretty badly from the glass, but they managed to get through the mob and went into camp. The first thing they knew these Timber Workers converged on them from all angles. They were armed with gaspicks, pick handles, sledges and crowbars, anything they could law their hands on.

"Our men were unprepared for any such violence and were unable to properly defend themselves. The Timber Workers broke the windows in the houses of the camp occupied by women and children. They also tore down the bunkhouse where men were sleeping. Some of our boys were still in bed as they did not expect to work today. The Timber Workers beat some of them up pretty badly and knocked down a few of them and then the shooting started. Two fell—Jim Ray and William Blackwood—they seriously injured another fellow who is in the hospital.

"It was an unprovoked attack by the Timber Workers. The attack was made on private property about a half mile from the public highway. The Timber Workers also cut telephone lines. Jackson, our superintendent, got away and reported from Seaside."

NAZI ACTION BRINGS ALARM TO EUROPEANS

delivered a strong protest against German denunciation of the Locarno treaty.

Soviet Envoy Called
Plandin also called a conference with the Soviet ambassador, and later summoned representatives of France's military allies, including Poland and Czechoslovakia.

He based his statement on the treaty of Versailles and declared that Nazi repudiation of the demilitarized zone kills the military and naval clauses of the peace treaty.

Prior to the session of ambassadors, the French government cancelled all army leaves today as German troops moved into the Rhineland.

The military decision resulted from a conference of high officials which also started drafting a formal protest to the league.

The note was being supervised by Pierre-Etienne Plandin, foreign minister, at the same time that Premier Sarraut called the French "war council" into session.

BRITISH SUMMON LEADERS
LONDON, March 7. (AP)—British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden summoned the French and Italian ambassadors and the Belgian charge d'affaires to a conference today after Germany's action in violating the Locarno pact.

The meeting was summoned suddenly after Adolf Hitler's bombshell, in announcing military occupation of the Rhineland in violation of the Locarno and Versailles treaties, startled the foreign office into a swift pace of conferences.

The French and Italian ambassadors and the Belgian charge d'affaires all represent Locarno signatories.

The telephone line to Berlin was occupied with an urgent government call, while Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden conferred with his colleagues and arranged to see Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin.

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BLOODY FIGHT LEAVES SCORE OF MEN HURT

man C. McLean down and beat him over the head. Albert Anderson was hit over the head with a club as he lay in his bunk.

The pickets overturned one car and smashed windows on several others in the camp.

Recently the unions tentatively agreed that the Sawmill and Timber Workers' union would be given jurisdiction over the camp, which logs for the Crown Willamette pulp and paper mills.

However, the workers at the camp refused to join the Seaside chapter of the Timber Workers' union, and asked for their own local, when this was denied, negotiations broke off.

Jury Called Monday
District Attorney Willis West said he would call the county grand jury Monday to make a complete probe of the bloody battle.

Weedel, shot through the hip, has a chance to recover, hospital attendants said.

Both the slain men were drilled through the heart with rifle bullets. Lila Tuckness, camp cook, said James Ray was going about with a sledge hammer breaking in the front end of automobiles. A sledge hammer lay close to his crumpled body.

The cook seized a piece of gas pipe and knocked out one of the invaders who was grappling with a camp man over a gun. Later she was felled by a rough fist to the nose.

Four Men Beaten
T. E. Patterson, one of the camp men, was battered with rocks and the back of his head was minced by the vicious stamp of boot heels.

The fleeing pickets overturned an automobile containing four workers, and beat them up. Derkacht said the first shot he heard was one which sent a bullet crashing through his bunkhouse, and fired by the invaders. About 50 shots were fired in the heated battle, he said.

A score or more were hurt, and the bunkhouses were reduced to shambles. The casualty list may run even higher, police said, when it is learned how many of the pickets were injured.

The district attorney questioned Weedel, who said he was business agent of the Portland local of the Timber Workers' union, and had come here early today after Ray Gillespie, president of the Seaside local of the same union, telephoned him that "hell has broken loose."

Weedel said after Gillespie called him last night, he and two "carloads" of men from Portland rushed to Seaside and met in a pool room. About "150 others" were there, Weedel told the prosecutor.

The district attorney was told that the men obtained automobiles and drove near the camp, parking their machines across the road. Weedel admitted, said West, that there was "an argument" and "lots" of fighting. Weedel claimed, however, that he was shot as he left the scene.
