Increase in Tax On Low Incomes Sharply Opposed

WASHINGTON, March 7. (U.P.) Sharp administration opposition to "soak the rich" tax proposals and to higher individual income levies in the lower brackets, has been transmitted to the congressional committee considering the new \$1,137,000,000 revenue program. It was learned Friday.

The administration's attitude was made known in an unsigned memorandum accompanying estimates of potential new revenue from seven sources which the treasury suggested congressional tax experts might consider as an alternative to tax proposals recommended by President Roosevelt in his recent message to congress.

The alternative proposals would raise about \$906,000,000 a year, it was estimated. They include higher taxes on gasoline, reimposition of the bank check tax, a tax of 10 per cent sales of slot machines, elimination of present corporation dividend exemptions from the normal individual income tax, and a special surtax on unearned income.

In the unsigned memorandum accompanying the treasury's new suggestions, it was indicated the administration opposed the manufacturers' excise tax, higher levies on tobacco, gasoline and admissions, reimposition of the bank check tax and another blow at incomes in the lower brackets.
