Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, March 7. (AP) — The stock market listened to war talk today, and prices became heavily unsettled.

As Hitler's troops marched into the Rhineland, recent equity leaders dipped fractions to two or more points before meeting support. At the same time, aviation and mining issues developed strength on prospects of military orders from abroad.

The close was irregular. Transfers approximated 1,500,000 shares.

Market analysts, generally, felt that, aside from the disturbing political situation on the continent, the list was due for a technical reaction because of its lengthy advance.

The French franc and other gold currencies were weak in relation to the dollar. Bonds pointed lower.

Gainers of as much as two or more points included Douglas, United Aircraft, Boeing, Curtiss Wright, American Smelting, U. S. Smelting, Cerro de Pasco, Anaconda, Phelps-Dodge, Crown Cork and U. S. Industrial Alcohol.

Most observers, while viewing with some concern the latest German developments, felt that little would be done by the former allies as the result of the Nazi renunciation of the Locarno and Versailles pacts.

Recovery in the average rate of industrial activity, while small, was viewed with satisfaction by the financial district.

Attention was paid to advice from Washington that the federal reserve is seriously considering putting into effect, some time during the next few months, the long-talked-of increase in bank reserve requirements.

Flood Control System Balks Taft Is Ohio's 'Favorite Son'

FARMS AND CITIES IN PATH OF FLOODS SAVED BY CONTROLS

SACRAMENTO, Calif., March 7. — Weirs and by-passes that divert flood waters of the Sacramento, Feather and American rivers — three of California's greatest streams — into emergency river beds have saved countless thousands of dollars during recent flood stages.

Without the emergency outlets which divert surplus waters to by-passes, rivers would have overflowed levees and probably inundated valleys.

As shown by the accompanying map, the flood control system consists mainly of by-passes, weirs and levees. The first weir, Moulton, is several miles north of Colusa, on the east side of the Sacramento River. It diverts water into Sutter by-pass, which parallels the river until it meets the junction of the Sacramento and the Feather rivers.

Major emergency diversion point south of Knight's Landing is the Sacramento weir, five miles north of Sacramento.

During flood stages, the Yolo by-pass west of Sacramento is a river three miles wide, flowing through bottom lands which normally are dry.

The system got its first test during recent torrential downpours and engineers and folks who live in the Sacramento Valley are satisfied that it is a success.
