First Plan Erroneous
Rather than pay such rates to be permitted to put a large share of undivided income into service, it was asserted, corporations would distribute such net income among stockholders, who would pay income taxes upon the dividends.

Hill did say for publication that yesterday's drastic tables were "based on impractical assumptions," since they were drawn up on a basis of either 100 per cent distribution, or 100 per cent retention of net corporate income. No corporation is going to conduct operations along such lines, he said.

Kelley's truck was damaged, but no injuries resulted, according to police reports.

COURT ENJOINS SENATE INQUIRY

WASHINGTON, March 11 (AP)—The supreme court of the District of Columbia today permanently enjoined the Western Union Telegraph company from surrendering to the senate lobby committee messages sent by the law firm of Winston, Strawn and Shaw of Chicago.

The ruling was delivered by Chief Justice Alfred A. Wheat who said a blanket subpoena served by the senate committee upon the telegraph company, "goes beyond any legitimate exercise of senatorial powers."

The court acted after Cramp-ton Harris, counsel for the lobby committee, had hinted that the senate itself might go ahead in the fact of an injunction and order Western Union to produce the telegrams.

Wallace will run again and will be nominated by the democrats. He has, in the opinion of a great many observers, made a good senator, and there is little kicking hereabouts over his service. For that reason, it seems unlikely any Klamath democrat would run against him for the nomination.

That means that if Klamath is to have a state senator contestant, he must be a republican. Andrew Collier, Klamath business man and former legislator, would make a great race of it if he would run, but it seems unlikely he could be persuaded. U. E. Reeder, prominent farmer, is mentioned as a possibility by some republican workers. There is some talk of urging U. S. Bentine, president of the republican club, to make a try for it.

There is some kind of a so-called gentlemen's agreement that is supposed to cinch a majority of Lake county votes for a Deschutes senatorial candidate. Incidentally, in the 17th district are Deschutes, Crook, Jefferson, Klamath and Lake counties.

This agreement is supposedly based on the fact that Deschutes and Lake counties form one representative district. The idea is that if Lake votes for the Deschutes senator, Deschutes will give Lake the legislator from that district. He has been Buck Snyder the last term or two.

Klamath county, under this theory, is supposed to be taken care of by the fact that it has two legislators of its own.

Deschutes county, under this scheme, does pretty well. It has one representative district of its own, the 28th, which sent Dr. J. F. Hoach to Salem last

time.

Any senatorial ambitions that may be generated in this district have to take into consideration this so-called balance of power. Nevertheless, if Klamath county would get solidly behind one candidate, it has the votes to put him across, with only a smattering of help from outside.

There is a feeling here that somebody from Klamath county could make a good race for congress. It is generally believed Mayor Willis Mahoney, had he chosen to run against Pierce, would have had many times the support that he will get from his home county in the senatorial race if he gets the nomination.

Last week the suggestion was made that C. H. or Junior Daggett should run for congress on the republican ticket. Nothing more definite has come from that source.

Klamath county has never gone strong for Pierce. Jay Up-ton, who opposed Pierce, carried this county two years ago.

CONTINUATION OF SUBSIDY OPPOSED

WASHINGTON, March 11, (AP)—The senate today passed the \$975,000,000 treasury-postoffice appropriation bill after eliminating a \$26,500,000 house item for continuation of ocean mail subsidy contracts.

The bill now goes to conference for action on the subsidy and other amendments.

There was no record vote either on the bill or subsidy elimination. Debate preliminary to the action left the impression, however, that should new ship subsidy legislation not be enacted, the money would be provided in a later deficiency bill.

The vote came within a minute after a plea from Senator White (R. Me.) for restoration of the sum to carry on the subsidy, which has in part supported the merchant marine since 1928.

Construction of the Humane society's dog shelter on the Klamath Falls-Ashland highway adjacent to the Klamath View auto camp is progressing rapidly, according to George Kincaid, president of the Humane society and Klamath Kennel club, Inc.

Itax went before the British cabinet tonight to give their views of the crisis facing Europe.

Even as the cabinet convened at Prime Minister Baldwin's call, diplomats of all Europe turned their faces toward London in preparation for conferences which may determine the general attitude to be taken concerning Germany's remilitarization of the Rhineland.

Pierre-Etienne Flandin, foreign minister of France, already was on the way from Paris, reportedly bringing with him a threat that France would resign from the League of Nations if she did not receive Great Britain's backing against Germany.

Maxim Litvinoff, Russia's foreign commissar, was traveling here by way of Paris.

Russian sources stated Russia sides definitely with the French desire for collective opposition to the German action, declaring:

"The Soviets are prepared to take whatever steps are necessary collectively under the League of Nations to check Germany."
