The Lost River Dairymen on Thursday night accomplished what every other basketball team has failed to do this season. Lost River, an underdog at the start of the final contest of the City League, walked away with the decisive battle against the heretofore undefeated Chiloquin Lumbermen. The score was 30 to 27.

The result through the finals standings of the second half schedule into a tie for the leadership. Arrangements were made for Chiloquin and Lost River to meet Wednesday, the winner playing Knights of Columbus, first half champions, for the city title.

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All-Sports Record Book For 1936 Better Than Ever.

Frank G. Menke's "All Sports Record Book," the handsome, 448-page volume covering completely the A to Z in athletics, has made its 1936 debut.

It is the finest, most thorough compilation and arrangement of sport records ever published. Last year's publication was good; this year's is excellent. The book is recognized by newspapers and sport followers as the most authentic of its kind.

There really is no point in reviewing the book from cover to cover. Frank Menke has made certain that it contains everything and that everything is accurate.

Complete, interesting, informative. Those three words are sufficient to tell the story of the 1936 edition.

Bob Ripley, the famous artist of "Believe It or Not," checked through the pages and declared:

"The All Sports Record Book will settle 4,000,000 arguments concerning sports and athletics."

That states the value positively.

The book is fittingly dedicated:

"Dedicated to 'One who plays the game for the enjoyment of keen, spirited competition, and, winning or losing, is alert always to every clause in the rules... Edward VIII. of Great Britain.'"

Menke prefaces the volume with this interesting background:

"If this 1936 edition of the All Sports Record Book definite improvement over that of 1935 the credit belongs to the secretaries, or other executives, of organizations which control, or direct, various sports included in this volume."

### KLAMATH OPENS SPRING SPORTS

Track, Football Drill Gain Attention At High School.

Attention was turned to spring sports at Klamath high school this week as Leslie Avritt, coach, prepared for the track season and spring football practice.

Preliminary organization has been completed in both activities and the real training will be in full swing next week.

Fifty-nine candidates answered Avritt's call for the track squad. Because of a shortage of equipment the coach may find it necessary to cut the squad to about 35 men.

Equipment for spring football practice will be distributed Monday. The coaches, Avritt and George Mabey, expect that the practice campaign will eliminate the need for heavy preliminary drill next fall.

Both the track and field need attention. Minor repairs are also essential in the field house, the coach said.

While last season's track team was strong in the sprint events and the relay, the 1936 squad will find its point-gaining power in the track events from the quarter-mile up. More strength is possible in the field events.

The lettermen returning: Ed Bishop, sprints and relay; Adams, high jump; Musselman, quarter; Reginato, discus, broad jump; Dale Yancey, half mile; George Plovers, mile, and Allan Smith hurdles.

Bishop and Musselman are the only point winners from last year's state meet.

### Election Race Costs Nearly Whole Salary

SEATTLE, March 13, (AP)—Mayor-elect John F. Dore spent \$12,017.13 in his election campaign, he reported in a statement filed Thursday with the city recorder.

His salary during the two years of his term will total \$18,000.

Dore spent \$3,817.67 before the primary election, February 25, he reported, and \$8,199.46 between February 25 and March 10, the general election.

His first objective, after taking office June 1, he said, will be to "put Seattle back on the map of the United States" and to make it a truly "friendly city."

### NORTH, SOUTH TEAMS READY

Close Series Expected Between Huskies, Cardinals.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 13, (AP)—Stanford's greatest basketball team in a decade and a half and a University of Washington quintet which won ten successive games in its sweep to northern supremacy, match court strategy here tonight in the opener of a series to settle the 1936 Pacific coast conference championship.

Powered by three high ranking scorers of the northern division and twice conqueror of Stanford in pre-season games, Washington will line up as the logical favorite, a situation not to the liking of Coach "Hee" Edmondson.

"It should be an evenly matched series and neither team should be favored," the Huskies' mentor said. Coach John Bunn of Stanford expressed similar sentiments.

Three crack shots whose keen basket range enabled Washington to clean up the northern division of the conference with 13 victories and 3 defeats, will carry the Husky scoring challenge in the first of the three game series. They are Ralph Bishop, captain and center; Ed Lovelock and Chuck Wagner, forwards. Among them they scored 410 points of the 111 total of the 16-game schedule.

Stanford's chief scoring threat is Angelo "Hank" Lulseth, spidery-legged sophomore forward, who led southern division players with 172 points in 12 games.

SAN MATEO, Calif., March 13, (AP)—Police Thursday put grayhound dogs on the trail of Frank Mayeda, 39-year-old Japanese gardener, asserted ax-slayer of Mrs. Minna Urabe, 43.

Meanwhile, officers reported discovery of a note left by Mayeda, written in Japanese, which said:

"I am sorry for what I did to my friends. It was a terrible thing."

Mayeda has been the object of a search throughout the San Francisco bay peninsula today since he fatally wounded Mrs. Urabe and viciously attacked her daughters, Shuzuka, 13, and Alice, 7. Both are in critical condition.

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
