

Oregon Fishing Season Will Open April 5

COMMISSION SETS DATES

Angling Year will Run to October 31; Rules Formed.

PORTLAND, March 14. (AP)—Oregon's trout season will open April 5, Sunday, the fish and game commission decided in a surprise session here. Commission rules on open seasons and bag limits on fish and game were not scheduled to be considered until later today. The fishing season will close October 31. The commission yesterday ruled that salmon caught in non-commercial waters by a hook and line cannot hereafter be sold, and denied a request for a larger escapement of fish at racks where adult salmon and steel heads are taken. The two groups also shelved a proposal to disband and create a single five-man commission to handle both the fish and game departments. A Roseburg delegation was told action on an appeal to close the Umpqua river to commercial fishing will be taken April 14, after a thorough study.

North Carolina Coach to Head Cornell Teams

ITHACA, N. Y., March 14. (AP)—Cornell's search for a new head football coach, which began, unofficially, even before "Gloomy Gil" Dobbie resigned under fire February 1, has ended with the selection of Carl G. Snavely of the University of North Carolina. The selection, made from a list of nearly 100 applicants, was announced last night after North Carolina authorities, reluctant to release Snavely from a contract which still had a year to run, failed in a final effort to persuade him to remain at Chapel Hill. Snavely comes to Cornell under a three-year contract, under which he will be paid a salary of \$5,500 a year. After successful coaching terms at North Carolina, where his teams won 15 games, lost two and tied one in the past two, and at Bucknell, Snavely faces the task of rebuilding a team which failed to win a game last year and suffered seriously in morale.

CARDS CAPTURE OPENING GAME

Luisetti Leads Stanford To 60-39 Victory Over Huskies.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 14. (AP)—Stanford's lanky basketball players, a brilliant 60-39 victory over Washington's Huskies under their belts, will face the northern division conference winners again tonight in the second game of their series for the 1936 coast title. Led by forward Angelo "Hank" Luisetti, who collected 33 points in his 33 minutes playing, and displaying superiority in every department, the Indians held a large lead throughout the one-sided battle here last night. At half time the score was 26-14 with Luisetti having scored 19 of Stanford's points. Coach John Dunn sent in his second team with seven minutes to play and held the Huskies on even terms. Stanford even dominated the tip-off, used by Washington all season and not in effect in the southern division. The teams met tonight at Stanford pavilion, Palo Alto. Another victory would give the Indians the conference championship. If they lose, a deciding game will be played at Palo Alto Monday night.

Luisetti led the scoring with his 32 points. Loverich, Washington forward, scored 14, and Art Stoen, Stanford center, accounted for seven. In pre-season contests at Seattle last December the Huskies took the touring Indians into camp twice. Box score:

Lewis Smashes Way to Victory Over Englishman

NEW YORK, March 14. (AP)—John Henry Lewis, a long, brown fellow with lightning in his arms, has thrown a pall over the flimsy hopes of Old England. In 15 bruising rounds last night, Lewis belted out a clean-cut decision over Jack McAvoy, middle and light heavyweight champion of Great Britain. Possessing a sharp wallop that has laid two American fighters low in early rounds, McAvoy had been an even money bet to lift the light heavyweight diadem from Lewis' brow. He met a cleverer boxer, however, and a more durable one, who fed him a continuous stream of leather that cut his nose and ear and for the most part kept him from balancing for a telling shot. Lewis, at 172 1/2, was four pounds heavier than the Briton. For five rounds it was fairly even, but after that the tall, muscular negro stepped out front and stayed there. He led and countered with left jabs and hooks, crossed over straight rights, and then, when the Englishman ducked low to escape the barrage, clubbed him behind the ear like a masher trying to reach the lead dog with his whip. After the fight McAvoy displayed a right hand that was badly swollen and blue. Although he dismissed the battle by saying "a little better fighter won," that right hand, with which he hits his most telling punch, bespoke a handicap that might explain his fading in the latter rounds. He said he hurt it in the fifth.
